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## Sueños (Dreams)

In October, I travelled to Guatemala to participate in a pastor's trip with International Justice Mission and to check in on our other partners Fotokids and Amigos del Lago. It's hard to know how to talk about a trip that exposes the hard truth about a place and about humanity. I don't really know how to answer when people ask me how Guatemala was. "It was good," is what I've said to some of you, but perhaps a more accurate answer is that my heart again has been changed, and I know, with even more detail, my dreams for the people I met in Guatemala when the Kingdom of God has fully arrived.

When I was in Terra Nueva, one of the small, impoverished communities outside of Guatemala City, I met a boy named Homerio and his mother. Homerio is a student in Fotokids, and Nancy McGirr, the executive director of Fotokids, took me to visit them in their home. Homerio lived in an alley between two homes. For a roof, they had attached a piece of sheet metal that poorly connected the sides of the two other homes. The sky peeked through the roof through holes in the sheet metal. Homerio is made fun of at school because he lives in an alley, he dreams of one day being able to provide for his mother and sisters.

Later in the week, IJM took me to a home for victims of child sexual assault. Most of the girls there were around 11 years old and had been abused by people closest to them, including their fathers. I met a girl there whose mother had been sending her to her uncle's house to bring him food on a regular basis for years, and every time she visited she was abused. She told us that she felt like she had to go because she wanted to be obedient to her mother. Because of her therapist and social worker, she now dreams of helping other girls like her when she grows up.

Perhaps the work our mission partners do, can be best summed up in one more story about someone else who I met on the trip whose name is Evelyn. She was one of the first students of Fotokids, and grew up living in the dump. Through Fotokids she had help and encouragement to stay in school and went on to complete her undergraduate degree. She is now married with two children and is currently transitioning to the role of Fotokids executive director. I asked her what Fotokids meant to her through all of these years, and with tears in her eyes, she told me it helped her to dream—even in the dump.

These are the dreams that I have brought back with me from Guatemala. By telling these stories, continuing our partnerships and remembering those who live far away, I believe that we are one day closer to the fulfillment of God's beautiful dream when all children are protected, have access to clean water, food and healthcare, and when children are free from poverty and dream audaciously. 
What brings you the most joy during the holidays? Maybe it is engaging in special family traditions or seeing old friends at festive parties. For most of us, it is not the things, but rather the connections that bring us the most joy. For this reason, the holidays are also a time for giving back, a time for connecting with others in need. At Seedlings, the

holidays are certainly filled with ample fun within our little community, but this time of year is also known as the "Season of Giving." Therefore, a goal is to instill within our children a desire to give, so that they can both connect with, and bring a little joy to other children who deserve the same.

Each year, the LOPC community looks forward to welcoming new guests during Warm Winter Nights. This year, Warm Winters Nights (November 7-21) gave families without a home the opportunity to have warm meals and a place to stay, and also to build relationships with members of our church community. This November, our older students helped make a beautiful welcome banner to put up in Fellowship Hall, welcoming the visiting families with paint, color and love. We learned that within these visiting families, there were several young children. Therefore, many Seedlings families contributed to a toy drive, so their parents and church tutors could play with them during their time here.

This month, the Seedlings Outreach Team will set up a "Giving Tree" in our Seedlings lobby. The tree will be filled with paper ornaments, each one representing a foster child in the Bay Area. Our students will be able to take an ornament, read about the age, gender, and Christmas wish of that child, and provide him or her with that gift. The donated gifts and cards will go to foster children through Alternative Family Services. The simple acts of purchasing a new toy and making a heartfelt card for another child give our children the hands-on experience of giving back. The tree will be in our lobby from December 1-16.

Even when we start small, service learning teaches kids that they can make a difference in the world. We might not be able to help everyone, but we can, in some small way, help someone. Hopefully this holiday season brings you both many moments of joy, as well as opportunities to serve and share your countless gifts with others. As Christian author J.R. Miller once wrote, "Nothing else in all life is such a maker of joy and cheer as the privilege of doing good."





Night in Bethlehem is LOPC's annual outreach event for families, from 4:00 p.m. – 7:00 p.m., during which kids and their families explore what a marketplace in Bethlehem might have looked like the night of the birth of Jesus. # Primera Iglesia Presbiteriana Hispana (AKA Primera Pres.)

La Posada, the journey of the Bay Area's "newest" Presbyterian Church. Each year during Advent, a posada, "a journey," a candlelight procession, winds through the Oakland Fruitvale neighborhoods. The congregation commemorates the journey of the founding of the church and the journeys of its members. In the mid-90s, Presbytery recognized that a church serving the Hispanic population was needed in the East Bay. A small group began the process of planting a congregation, to be led by the Presbyterian minister Pablo Moratoya.

Throughout the year Primera programs follow the Presbyterian liturgy, with Deacons and Session providing leadership. What is unique is that each week, Monday through Wednesday, English as a Second Language classes are provided, as well as computer classes, and annual citizenship classes. This past year, Nancy Henderson, a LOPC member, held sewing classes twice a month, using donated sewing machines. To date, this little group has sold almost \$250 worth of merchandise, with proceeds going to the food pantry.

Primera is located in a cluster of low-income neighborhoods, mired in poverty. Unemployment is the highest in the Oakland area. Primera has a food pantry, stocked by the members, and distributed to those who are in distress. A 50 lb. bag of beans will provide a meal for 60 adults and 18 children. If you can help with the food pantry, or if you have fabric for the sewing group, or gently used clothes, your donations would be appreciated.



## Micro Business Mentors Partner with Children of Faith In India



Micro Business Mentors (MBM) has established a lending program in Visahakapatnam, India. They are working with Children of Faith to create a network for small business owners to get an interest-free loan to start or expand their businesses. This adds to MBM's existing programs in Uganda and the Philippines.

Since its inception in 2008, MBM has made over 800 loans, impacting over 5,000 individuals and their families in reaching economic stability. MBM's vision for 2025 is to expand its work to 10 locations, 10 new mission partners, and impacting 100,000 people. In India, they have just begun, making 20 loans last September. The borrowers' businesses vary-vegetable stalls, tailors, goat herding, small cafes and more. These borrowers work closely with an on-site mentor who is supervised by the organization's Board of Directors. This mentor meets and talks with the borrowers from the beginning of the application process till the loan is paid off. The loans, varying between \$300-\$600 are repaid in six months. New loans will be made as these initial loans are repaid. Borrowers are identified through the growing Christian Network that Children of Faith is part of. MBM has a repayment rate of about 85%. Funding for these loans is from donations to the organization. Overhead costs are very low; in the U.S. the program is run entirely by volunteers. LOPC members Del Olson and Vince Wirthman serve on its board.

Alex Aruliah, LOPC Elder

Alex Aruliah found his passion early in life. In high school, he became involved in Children's ministry, and he's been active in this field ever since. On his first Sunday attending LOPC he volunteered to help. "I'm very passionate about

youth," he says. "My desire is that when high schoolers graduate and go off on their own they have a relationship with Jesus. If they don't find a good community, God might slowly recede from their lives. My hope, and belief is that a strong faith enables them to continue on their own."

Alex began his walk of faith in Chennai, Madras, India where he was born into a Christian family in a country where only 2% are Christian. "I was raised by a single mom as my parents separated the year I was born. Technically we were quite poor growing up, but we did have a house my father had purchased. I and my three sisters were sponsored by Compassion International, an organization which concentrates on education for children. I actually met my sponsor when I came to the states as they lived in Los Gatos."

"Mom made sure we kids went to church school every Sunday. I'm grateful I was raised in Chennai as there was not the religious conflict which occurred in the North where Christians were persecuted. In fact, I was free to express my faith and even had a sign in my office later on which said 'Try Jesus.' Interestingly, when I came to the states my office didn't like it.

"There was a vibrant youth group in my church. I knew that just being born into a Christian household didn't make me a Christian. In my freshman year in high school I accepted Jesus at an alter call. It was a very important day in my life. During my last two years in India I became Children's Ministry Director, a volunteer position, and also had a full-time job. There were 150 kids in the program.

"God blessed me with work in a fast-paced growth company. My job was to speak with insurance

companies to follow up on health care claims. There was an office in Lafayette, and Char Parrish, who became my mentor, felt someone in the company should learn about how health care insurance works in the United States. I first came to Lafayette in 2003 for a month and advanced quickly. When I went back to India, Char approached me asking, 'Do you want to come back here for good?' I did in 2008. There were times when I asked, Why me? Why was I born in a poor family, why did my father leave us? Why was there a switch in companies? I see now God always had a purpose, which was revealed later. I realize I shouldn't care if it's later. I put my full faith in God."

Alex asked Char about a Presbyterian Church. She knew of LOPC and his first questions was, "Do they have a Children's Ministry?" Yes, they did and needed volunteers so he began with elementary school children using Godly Play. When the FUSE program began and he was asked to take it over as a paying job. "I said, I'll take it but I don't want to be paid. I have a good paying job and want to give back." Then he began working with the middle school kids on Wednesday evenings. Wanting to do still more he added high schoolers in the Sunday evening program, By The Way. He has been on every mission trip since 2009.

Serving first as a deacon, Alex is now an LOPC elder. He credits the Stephen Ministry program for helping him through a difficult time in his life. Happier times came when he met Sugthani, here on a one-month business trip from India. They had a two-year long-distance relationship before they married in her home town of Bangalore. This past summer Suganthi also went on a mission trip and she volunteers with the high school kids.

"Although my faith has matured I still sometimes ask, "Why me?", Alex reflects. "Then I remember, perhaps I can't see what your purpose is, God, but I have faith. You have brought me safely thus far, taking me through many ups and downs. You do have a plan for me. Yes, God is good." His favorite Bible verse, Romans, 12:12, "Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayers."

# **Christmas Special Offering**

Lafayette-Orinda Presbyterian Church has a tradition of illuminating the need that exists for children globally during Christmas. This need is highlighted by acknowledging two LOPC partners whose mission focuses on helping children. This year the two organizations that will be the recipient of the Christmas special offering are JF Kapnek and FOTOKIDS. Both organizations are dedicated to helping children thrive, despite the challenges they face daily.



The JF Kapnek Trust is led by local Lamorinda pediatrician Dan Robbins. His organization responds to the most urgent threats to child survival in Zimbabwe including HIV/AIDS, hunger and access to education.

The Trust continues to prevent over 15,000 cases of HIV/AIDS in newborns every year, creates pre-school programs serving over 18,000 children at 200 preschool sites and provides services to families with disabled children. JF Kapnek successfully partners with the local government and communities to implement meaningful change, ensuring ownership of the programs remain with Zimbabwe's local communities therefore increasing the chance of sustainability.

Fotokids was founded by award-winning, former Reuters news photographer Nancy McGirr in Guatemala in 1991. The organization began with a group of six children who lived and worked in Guatemala City's vast garbage dump.

Today, Fotokids continues to break the cycle of poverty through training children from violence-stricken communities in Guatemala in visual arts and technology. Fotokids provides a tool for self-expression, creativity, leadership and vocational training experience to hundreds of youth from poor rural and urban areas. The majority of our students, in addition to learning employable skills with Fotokids, receive scholarships to study in traditional schools from primary education through university.

# **Giving Your Gifts to LOPC**

As the Advent candles light the path to Christmas, I feel the rising spirit of Christ and Christmas. I am so grateful to be a part of LOPC, where we celebrate differences, but are bound by our belief in God, and a commitment to respect and love one another. As part of the LOPC Finance Team, I witness the dedication of the staff and volunteers who make the church work, provide the spiritual programs and reach out to thousands of people in the communities around us with the love and comfort of Christ.

I am also grateful for the financial gifts from all of us, which enable such a vibrant church. And with those gifts comes an unspoken covenant that the money be used effectively. We take that trust to heart, and I can assure you that your church is healthy and growing. For the 10month period ending October 2016 (current, as of this writing), we are on budget and feel confident in the outlook for the remainder of the year. Still, it's hard to predict the year-end results since December is such a large part of the budget year. Income is ahead of plan by 7%, due in part to a special mission gift and to pledges. The special mission gift was deployed (shown as an expense), but otherwise expenses are right in line with the budget. So, at this point our net is ahead of plan. Regarding the Sanctuary project, campaign pledge receipts are ahead of expectations. We expect to collect the remaining funds over the next 1-1/2 years of the campaign. Thank you for all of the ways that you support LOPC. Merry Christmas!

# Deadline to Beat the Tax Man is Near

The end of the year is rapidly approaching. Anyone who plans to make tax-deductible donations to LOPC in 2016 is reminded that the church must either receive your gift by 5:00 p.m. on December 30 or receive your mailed gift postmarked December 31 or earlier. Sorry, we can make no exceptions to these IRS rules. For those giving stock,

please note that these gifts must be in LOPC's brokerage account no later than December 31. Please notify Lidia (x229 or lidia@LOPC.org) or Char (x253 or char@LOPC.org) if you are making a stock gift, what stock(s) you're donating and how it should be applied. That way, we'll be on the alert for this gift and will know who it's coming from.

Year-end statements will be mailed in January. To insure the deductibility of your gifts, do not file your 2016 tax return until you receive this statement. Some of your gifts may not be tax-deductible if you file your tax return before receiving a written acknowledgement of your gifts to LOPC.

## **Another Kind of Autumn Harvest**

Fall is my favorite time of year. While enjoying the fruits of the autumn harvest, I find it also to be a time of renewal as we enjoy clear days, anticipate the rainy season, and begin preparing for Advent and the New Year.

The activities of the LOPC Foundation at this time mirror the harvest cycle. The Foundation's fiscal year ends September 30, three months before LOPC's year-end. By late October, we have a report from our investment advisors of how the portfolios have fared during the prior 12 months. From these results we can determine how much we can "harvest" from the Foundation to support the various ministries and maintain the campus of LOPC during the following year. (The law pertaining to foundations as well as our desire to see the campus grow in order to support both planned and unplanned needs of the Church limits the amount we withdraw.)

Some of the funds we manage are restricted in usage because they are part of endowments, established by donors, but a large portion of the funds are unrestricted and can be used by Session wherever they are needed.

We tell Session's Finance team by the end of October what amounts will be available from the Foundation to assist in meeting operating expenses. During November, Foundation Trustees attend meetings with the Finance team to hear the plans of the various ministry teams for the coming year. The more we understand the work of the church, the better prepared we are to respond when a need arises.

Please know that none of this is possible, sharing the harvest, without the continuing support of Friends of the LOPC Foundation to grow the plantings from which we can reap a generous yield for years to come.
