God's Providence

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"Trust in the Lord with all of your heart and lean not on your own understanding, but in all ways acknowledge God and God will direct your paths." Proverbs 3:5-6

Providence: a manifestation of God's care and direction in your life.

Although I am not one for New Year's resolutions, I do have an annual practice of looking back at the previous year and finding times God was active in my life. This is

one of the spiritual practices that draws me closer to God every time I practice it.

Now, I have to confess, I am a person who likes planning, certainty and to know exactly what is going to happen next, so you can probably guess that I sometimes struggle with trusting God. This is why I have found this practice to be a meaningful experience for me. Sometimes when I am in the thick of things, due to busyness or being in a challenging time of life, I need to look backward in order to remember how to trust God and that God is trustworthy. I experience providence in this practice, meaning I can look back and see where God has been present in my life.

As I enter my fourth year of ministry as a pastor at LOPC, I spent some time thinking about how God directed me here and how incredibly thankful and grateful I am to be a pastor here. Six years ago, I was doing work that I loved, found rewarding and very much felt led to when I started in that position five years earlier. Then, after six years at the organization, things began to shift. I still loved the work, but after much prayer and thought, I knew it was time to leave. So after giving one year's notice, I left the organization. I decided to take a little time off and after six months, I shifted between panic and peace. During my moments of panic, I thought to myself, I had worked so hard to build a career and I left it. What was I thinking? And in the peaceful moments, where I remembered God had called me to take a break and rest, I trusted all would be well.

One year after leaving my last position, I received my call to LOPC. It wasn't something I was expecting or planning. I had been an ordained minister for 10 years, but I never envisioned myself as a pastor at a church. I thought I would work in non-profits or hospitals forever. As I look back, I am thankful for God's providence in leading me to LOPC. I hope you will try this practice and experience how God is working in your life.


The Answer to Bad Religion is Not No Religion!

In light our changing national landscape, it is important to think about what we believe, and represent, as Presbyterians in 2017.

This Lent we will be using the book by Martin Thielen to reflect on how "toxic religion dismays...and how to get into the clear about what good religion is and can be." Thielen reminds us that "Christians need not be sexist, anti-Semitic, literalistic, antievolution, or judgmental; they do, however, need to believe in and embrace Jesus and his message." Journey of Faith

Eli Olson begins his story with this. "There's no denying I've lived an amazing life so far. I've been blessed with great friends, family and opportunities throughout my 17 years of life. My grandfather has been a special influence in sharing his faith journey with me,

and inspiring me to go through the confirmation process. I've made some of my best friendships in middle school at LOPC and although I go to a different high school than those friends now, I'm thankful to LOPC for helping me strengthen those friendships through mission trips and weekly meetings and prayers.

Eli says that without a doubt the most important events for his faith journey would be the weekly BTW (By The Way) meetings held every Sunday night. "It was there that I developed friendships with not only like-minded Christian peers, but also with outstanding adults, namely Keris Dahlkamp, Larry Rose and Tom Scovel. The latter two are the leaders of our small groups during the BTW meetings. These meetings have taught me lessons about the value of compassion and how to be a better Christian.

"BTW has shaped me in ways nowhere else could, and although as a junior in high school I often find myself stressed and weighed down by my work, it's comforting to know I can always rely on LOPC to provide a good laugh and lesson at the end of the day. I honestly believe that I wouldn't have much of a faith journey, if at all, if it wasn't for BTW.

"On top of that I've enjoyed being able to develop my faith journey through a mission trip two summers ago. We spent a week in Seattle working with churches and Christian organizations in their efforts to help homeless and low income families. It was an eye-opening experience to help so many people in such a short span of time."

Eli selects as a very important opportunity in his life his involvement with the Boy Scouts of America, and recently reaching the rank of Eagle Scout. He explains, "As an Eagle Scout, we're taught to honor our country, our God, and our fellow man. "For my Eagle scout project, I built sensory tables for a school in Concord called the George Miller Center. The George Miller Center focuses on helping both children and adults with physical and mental disabilities. The tables have Tupperware bins built so they are flush with the surface like a sink. The teachers then filled the bins with differently textured materials like sand, beans, and uncooked rice. Not only are the tables fun for the kids, but they also help develop the sensitivity in their hands.

"Going through confirmation and the beginnings of my faith journey at the same time as my career in Boy Scouts has given me more meaning to what it is I'm doing as both a Scout and a Christian," Eli says. "My connection to God has given me a deeper appreciation for the scouting organization, and has helped me better recognize the importance of loving my neighbor and serving a community under God.

"Each and every Monday night scout meeting the senior scouts would open the meeting with the scout oath; 'On my honor, I will do my best - To do my duty to God and my country and to obey the Scout Law; To help other people at all times; To keep myself physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight.' I think this oath sets a good standard for not only Boy Scouts, but also for Christians in general. Overall, my experiences the past three years at LOPC have made me a better Scout, and my experiences in the Boy Scouts has also made me a better Christian. I'm truly blessed to have been given the opportunity to make both Eagle Scout and Christian titles I'll hold proudly for the rest of my life."

This Bible verse is meaningful to Eli; Matthew 7:12 "So, whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets."

First Friday Forum

Prof. Henry Brady is the featured speaker when First Friday Forum (FFF) convenes at Lafayette-Orinda Presbyterian Church, February 3, at 1:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary. He is Dean of the Goldman School of Public Policy (GSPP), at U.C. Berkeley. (UCB) and titles his talk, "Public Policy and Politics Going Forward"

Brady says, "These are exciting times for the Goldman School, and for the public, because the world, the nation and the State of California are facing thorny and complex public policy problems that rouse us to action."

The genesis of Brady's passion for politics and public policy can be traced to the 1960's when he was an undergraduate studying math and physics. "I became involved with student organizing at the Claremont Colleges. Through these experiences, I became intensely concerned about race relations and public policy in America and about how we might better live up to our fundamental beliefs about equity and freedom."

After four years of working in Washington D.C., including a stint as a staff member for a White House Council led by General Bernard Schriever, Brady's interest in politics and public policy led him to graduate school at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology where he completed doctorates in political science and economics. His first

teaching post was at UCBerkeley in the fall of 1978 of what was then called the Graduate School of Public Policy. Now, more than thirty years later, he is dean of the Goldman School.

Prof. Brady has written numerous books, including "Voice and Equality: Civic Voluntarism in American Politics" which won the Philip Converse Award for a book making a lasting contribution to public opinion research. He has served as President of the American Political Science Association and the Political Methodology Society of the American Political Science Association and director of the UCB Survey Research Center. He was elected a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2003 and a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2006

"We welcome visitors to our lecture series, "says Caroline Giers, a co-chair of FFF. "Our average attendance has grown to over 200 because of the high quality of our speakers. Having heard Dr. Brady speak several times, I highly recommend our February meeting. As usual, refreshments will be served at 1:00 p.m. in Fellowship Hall."

Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration at LOPC

"Love is the only force capable of transforming an enemy into a friend." —Martin Luther King, Jr.

On Sunday, January 15, LOPC welcomed Rev. Floyd Thompkins, Director for the Center of Innovation in Ministry at San Francisco Theological Seminary, to preach in our morning services in celebration of Martin Luther King Jr. Day. The celebration was also attended by Rev. Dr. J. Alfred Smith, Sr. for whom the Center's Smith-King Initiative is named, and by Jim McDonald, President of SFTS. Rev. Thompkins spoke powerfully on the legacy of Dr. King first as a Christian minister, and second as a man who had civil rights leadership thrust upon him. The Incarnation of God was working through King, and Rev. Thompkins encouraged us to follow in his legacy of faith and optimism in challenging times, saying "... what is important is that God believes in us."

After the services, our congregation joined Rev. Thompkins for a lunchtime discussion and presentation on the Center as a catalyst for building bridges toward racial reconciliation. Participants engaged in a thought-provoking dialogue about how to humanize each other, and to recognize that we are all connected. Harm to others is harm to ourselves, and bearing the weight of hate is more of a burden than bearing the lightness of love. At the end of the event, Pastor Whitelock presented Rev. Thompkins and the Center for Innovation in Ministry with a \$10,000 donation on behalf of LOPC. Rev. Thompkins and SFTS President Jim McDonald were deeply appreciative and extremely grateful!



Students and advisors will assist local contractors on construction and beautification projects, help tutor the children in English, and worship alongside the COF students and staff in their church. There will be an LOPC led vacation Bible school in the afternoons, along with plenty of time to simply play and fellowship with the children and staff residents there. Please reflect on how you can be involved whether through prayer, a donation, or both. We will have opportunities to sign up as a prayer partner for various youth, which is an incredibly powerful way to support the team going on the trip.

In March, our youth will kick off a fundraising effort to help subsidize students and advisors that would not otherwise be able to participate, help fund sustainable projects at the orphanage and ultimately increase the standard of living for the children who live there. Our goal is to raise \$23,000. We are also collecting children's books, iPads/Tablets/Notebooks. We will be on the plaza accepting donations on March 12th, 19th and 26th.

As you discern how you will support the youth, please think of the following passage from John; As the Father sent me so I send you. John 20:19-30. Use this as your inspiration to help these youth on a mission as they go to do God's work.

This includes reaching out to other success programs elsewhere in the country and partnering with other faith groups in the community to share resources. LOPC Foundation Finances - A Snapshot

The LOPC Foundation closed its September 30, 2016, fiscal year with \$9.5 million of invested assets, the largest ever due to receipt of a \$5.2 million estate gift endowment from Jean and Craig Gregerson, restricted for facilities and capital equipment and limited annual disbursements.

The investment rate of return on the two Foundation investment portfolios for the fiscal year was 7.98% for the Facilities Fund Portfolio, 10.18% for the Primary Portfolio.

Based on the September 30 fund asset values, Foundation trustees appropriated \$272,000 for 2017 fiscal year from these funds for Session and Deacons grants to support LOPC ministries. In addition, in October, \$100,000 was paid to the Sanctuary Capital Campaign, and for future facilities and capital equipment projects, \$60,000 was added to the Facilities Unexpected Projects Account and \$150,000 was added to the Facilities Reserve Study Projects Account.

You will hear more in 2017 about rekindling initiatives for encouraging Foundation estate and other gifts, after several years of quiet time due to successive LOPC capital campaigns.

Family Faith Formation - Talking with Your Children about Communion - 3/12 9:00 a.m. - 10:30 a.m. in the Davies Room


