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Finding God in the Wilderness

In late February, I co-led a sea-kayaking trip with a few others from LOPC in the Bahamas. Needless to say I was excited for this opportunity since I love to be out on the water and knew that this would provide for many special moments to take in the beauty of the environment and to grow closer to God.

There is always something special about getting away. There is something more special about getting away to a remote desert island, by kayak, surrounded by teal oceans. There is a simplicity to life when you are

in places like these and certain things in life become more clear. Our days were spent setting up camp, cooking, kayaking or snorkeling, learning about tides, lightening, and coral, doing pertinent devotionals, and of course chatting! For five days we did not see anyone else, except for one sailboat that passed by our island. We became community to each other and needed each other's help from doing everything to helping you get a drink of water from our water supply to setting up a tent.

Out in the water and on the island, the simple things take longer, but the things that don't matter—don't matter. I didn't get sucked into any social media, I wasn't thinking about any sales that were happening at my favorite stores, or any achievements that were waiting for me upon my return. Instead, we were all face to face with the beauty of the place, the God who created it all, and the joys and sorrows that were still on our hearts.

That kind of simplicity is clarifying. You are aware of God in the wildness and beauty of nature, the strengths you bring to the group and the things that irk you, the things that make you—you, and the person that you are (with God's help) working to become. Everything else slips away...

Rev. Steve Harrington, who has been leading these trips for years, says that it isn't uncommon for people to make major life changes after these sorts of trips, and I am not surprised based on the clarity that I found with God's help on the trip.

As for myself, I am trying to choose more simplicity in my life. I am striving to put first things first. Anne Morrow Lindbergh, who was referenced in many of our devotionals, said it best when she said: "I must remember to see with Island eyes."

ONE Sunday 2017



In spite of countless days of unending rain this year, ONE Sunday 2017 was a sunshine-filled day of service. Over 400 people, many from outside the LOPC community, participated in helping 14 different agencies throughout Contra Costa County, including Bay Area Rescue Mission, Children of Faith Missions, Contra Costa Food Bank, Contra Costa Interfaith Housing, Creek Kids, Foster A Dream, Las Trampas, Loaves and Fishes, Habitat for Humanity, Loved Twice, Monument Crisis Center, Primera Iglesia, Shelter Inc. and STAND.

Though the focus of ONE Sunday is service in the community there is an equally important aspect of meeting people where they are in their journey. Participants at Habitat for Humanity worked alongside Bianca and Girma, two new homeowners; putting in sweat equity to their new homes at the Muir Ridge development in Martinez. At CCIH, Kenny, a longtime resident, worked alongside LOPC participants installing two new planter boxes in the vegetable garden. His enthusiasm and commitment to the garden has inspired fellow residents to help tend it, and the result has not only been an increase in the residents eating fresh produce but also a sense of community from the maintenance of the garden. At Loaves and Fishes, an employee who was once homeless described how vital Loaves and Fishes has been to her transformation from living on the street to becoming employed and obtaining a place to live. These stories demonstrate the impact our service has on people and the change it can make in their daily lives. Though it is only one day of service for LOPC participants it can make a lasting difference in the daily lives of those we serve.

One Sunday is one way our church aims to be a blessing in our community, and teaches us how we can love our neighbors. Our hope is that, through One Sunday, participants will receive a greater introduction to our mission partners and local nonprofits as well as participate in something that is beyond mere service as we provide an opportunity to learn why our faith calls us to action.

Grateful Gatherings

A goal at Seedlings is to provide outreach opportunities that our children can truly connect with and that will raise awareness within them. We want our students to learn about other kids in need and recognize, "I know we may live in different circumstances, but

deep inside we all want and deserve the same things: safety, happiness and love." We were so excited about a recent outreach project called "Grateful Gatherings" that allowed our students to learn about others in need, and that provided an opportunity for many of our Seedlings families to give in a very impactful way.

Grateful Gatherings is an amazing organization that helps provide families in transition with a furnished, comfortable, and safe home. On March 13, a Grateful Gathering donation drive took place here in the LOPC parking lot. Here, families could donate new bedding, furniture, cleaning and cooking supplies, and other household necessities. Prior to donation day, the Seedlings community learned about St. Raymond's House in Concord, a new transitional home for pregnant women, mothers and their children that Grateful Gatherings will be sponsoring. Four families in need were selected to move into the house at the end of March. With the help of Grateful Gatherings, they were able to move into a fully furnished home filled with household items donated by Seedlings families and many other generous individuals throughout the East Bay. Chipman Relocation and Logistics (owned by a wonderful Seedlings family), was our volunteer workforce for the day and delivered all of the items to St. Raymond's House.

During the month of March, our older Seedlings students were able to learn about the families who will live at St. Raymond's House. Wonder Time Leader, Bobbi Cassettari, talked to our children about the gift that has been given to these four families who didn't have a home to live in. She asked the students questions like, "What would it be like if you didn't have a place to live?" and "Would you need someone to show kindness to you and offer you help?" Our students considered these questions, had thoughtful discussions, and Bobbi helped them make colorful placemats as welcome gifts for these families. What makes organizations like Grateful Gatherings so special is that they help those in need in a very practical way, but also raise the awareness in our children that there are many others in our community not as fortunate as they are, who can benefit from help and kindness.

How Congo Mission Team Helps the Congolese

In 2016, the Congo Mission Team, with the invaluable help of many members of the LOPC family, continued its work to assist the people of the Democratic Republic of Congo.

Regarding financial aid to the Congo:

- \$26,000 was raised at the Special Offering at Easter to fund the training of facilitators to implement a trauma healing curriculum for children in the violence-ravaged eastern part of the Congo.
- Necklace sales and other donations raised \$12,000 for Build Congo Schools and Computer/English program for girls, both programs sponsored by PC(USA).
- Some funds were donated to Presbyterian mission co-workers to help them with their work in the Congo.

A significant amount of effort went into training on being effective advocates for the Congolese people and then encouraging government and church representatives to take specific actions. Building relationships with the Congolese community is another goal. We will continue to use our voices to help the Congolese.

In 2017, we are especially excited that LOPC will host the annual meeting of the Congo Mission Network on Sept 22-23. This event will bring together Presbyterians from the Congo and the U.S. who are devoted to helping the people of the Congo.

Listening to Emerging Adults on the Future Conversation of Faith and Science: many today see religious faith and science as two titanic forces

Journey of Faith

"As with any journey, sometimes you go fast, sometimes you go slow. And sometimes it is never-ending," says Herb Long. "My journey started at a young age. I grew up in Texas (still use 'you'all') and went to church with my parents. My first memorable faith moment was at around 10 years old when I went to

camp. I did the usual stuff there – played sports, rode horses. Then, one night we went up on a mountain, and, lo and behold, it was a faith revival setting. That was a surprise! We were asked to accept the Lord as our Savior, and I remember going forward to do so. Did I realize what was going on? I am not sure. While I did not go home and start preaching on the corner, obviously it had an impact on me, as I still remember it well. I have always assumed that, at least subconsciously, I accepted the Lord that night."

During middle and high school, Herb attended church with his parents in Connecticut and was in various Methodist youth groups. His parents were always supportive of his participation. He suspects such times get tucked into one's brain and are more steps on the journey. In college, he still attended church at times and even remembers reading the Bible at night, much to the surprise of his fraternity brothers!

"I married my high school sweetheart, Randi, after college," Herb continues. "We followed the saying, 'go west young man' and headed off to San Francisco. We started a family, moved to the suburbs, bought a station wagon and got a dog – not an atypical routine! Our journey was blessed by adopting two wonderful children, Melissa and Kent. We had prayed for years for children and are forever thankful that God brought them to us to raise as our very own." Early on, the Longs found LOPC. They did some Sunday school teaching, joined Voyagers ,and while they went to church, admittedly, sometimes on Sundays, it was a question whether they had time to go. The journey slowed down. Career aspirations sometimes got in the way.

"Later, with our two children now moved out of the nest, I got a call from Bill Rolland to be a Deacon," Herb recalls. "I told him he must have the wrong number but he assured me he did not. This was a significant first step to speeding up on my journey. As a deacon, one becomes exposed to others who are role models for serving the Lord. I still exchange 'deacon hugs' with fellow Deacons from that time."

"It was the next step that, as I look back, started to put me in overdrive on my journey. I was asked to join the search committee for a Head of Staff at LOPC. Again, I was very surprised to be asked, but I assumed it was because I was complaining that it always took so long to find new pastors. This would never happen in the corporate world!"

"I still remember the first few meetings – the time spent on 'spiritual formation' was frustrating as we had 'a job to do'. But I soon came to appreciate this time of the meeting because I learned so much from others. When you have people like our leader, Phyllis Bell Stover, and the others on the team, you learn so much about what it means to be a Christian.

My next steps revolved around Mission at LOPC," he says. "It started with LOPC's response to 9/11 and the decision to support the Atfaluna School for Deaf Children in Gaza. Before going to Gaza, there was some concern about safety but I still remember Peter's words that sometimes the Lord's work is not accomplished without some risk. (As stated with the Beatitudes, disciples must 'be unafraid'.) The trip to Israel was another opportunity to learn from others -- from Jim Szeyller, our team and the staff and children of Atfaluna. Mission at LOPC has become my focus whether it was as Mission Elder, heading up the Atflauna team, working on One Sunday, or now as team leader for the passionate Congo team.

"The bedrock of my journey is my wife, Randi, as we have taken this journey together," Herb states. "Having that support is so meaningful and a necessary component to continuously move forward on the journey.

A common thread of the journey is learning from others. I continue to be amazed and encouraged at the passion, commitment, and sacrifice of the people around me at LOPC as they follow Jesus' direction to help those in need. There is not enough space in FOCUS to list all the people I have encountered who help others in so many ways. The journey continues, sometimes challenging, but always rewarding. There is the comfort of knowing there are so many others with me as we journey together."

DR. DAVID VASQUEZ-LEVY



"A World on the Move"

1:00 p.m. Refreshments – All Are Welcome 1:30 p.m. Speaker – Free A very popular series of outstanding speakers on topics of current interest Dr. David Vasquez-Levy, President of the Pacific School of Religion (PSR) will speak at First Friday Forum (FFF), April 7, 1:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary. Focusing on immigration issues his title is "World on the Move."

"Discussions and realities about immigration are reshaping the political, social and economic reality of our world. How we understand migration matters greatly and religious traditions, which capture our understanding and aspirations about the most significant aspects of our lives, have much to say about migration. In fact, migration is at the core of the biblical narrative," Vasquez-Levy states.

He is well equipped to discuss immigration issues. Following the devastating May 12, 2008 immigration raid in Postville, Iowa, at the time the largest single-site immigration raid in United States history, Vasquez-Levy

served as part of the Postville Relief Effort core team. This work has led him to serve as a consultant on various documentaries and contribute a faith perspective to the national conversation on immigration including speaking at a congressional briefing and participating in two immigration consultations at the White House.

Vasquez-Levy is the author of various publications that explore migration stories in sacred texts and in people's lives. He has lived in four countries, taught courses and led international study and service trips across the globe. His international experience has also included refugee resettlement work in Canada and studies at the Ludwig Maximilian University in Munich, Germany.

Vasquez-Levy received a bachelor's degree from Texas Lutheran University, Summa Cum Laude, and Master's and Doctor of Ministry degrees from Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago. One of his assignments was on the Lutheran Refugee Committee at St. Stephens Lutheran Church in Ontario, Canada.

He has served at President of PSR for two years. Darlene James, co-chair of FFF comments, "The school is described as a progressive, interdenominational Christian seminary committed to preparing theologically and spiritually rooted leaders for social transformation. Dr. Vasquez-Levy is a committed pastor, a nationally recognized immigration leader, and a sought-after speaker. Please join us in this free event. Nominations for 2018 Church Officers needed by May 7, 2017



One of the cornerstones of our Presbyterian heritage is election by the congregation of church officers to provide leadership for the church, as well as loving support for those in the church community. Each year we elect officers to serve for the following year, drawn from nominations from the congregation.

We are now in the process of selecting new officers and leaders for LOPC for terms beginning January 2018. It is a great privilege and responsibility to nominate members who will serve LOPC as elected lay leaders. It is also necessary for us to participate in the essential process that will influence our church in the near future.

The primary qualifications for nominees are:

- Strong commitment to Jesus Christ and the church's Mission Statement
- Active participation in worship and in other ministries at LOPC
- Stewardship commitment of time, talent and financial resources
- Leadership ability and organizational skills
- Compassion in human relationships
- An open-minded approach to ideas and problems
- Spiritual depth and maturity
- Ability to equip people for ministry and work in a team-based leadership role

Elders, together with the pastors, lead and direct the ministry of the church. They are persons of faith, dedication and good judgment. Elders serve on Session, the governing body of the church. They also chair various church teams through which all ministries are conducted. Eight elders are ordained to serve a three-year term.

Deacons, as set forth in Scripture, are leaders who serve as the caring, compassionate arm of the church, providing loving support to all those in need within the church community. The primary area of Deacon service is care of members. Ten deacons are ordained to serve a three-year term and one deacon, a high school age person, serves an 18-month term.

The Congregation Nominating Committee (CNC), members are elected for a one-year term. Their duties include receiving and reviewing nominations for church officers and selecting candidates to present to the congregation.

Foundation Trustees, serve on the LOPC Foundation. This seven-member Foundation receives gifts in various forms and designations, manages investments and provides funding for LOPC needs that cannot be accommodated in the church's annual operating budget. Trustees serve an initial term of four years. They can be re-elected for one three-year term. Members who have served in the past can be nominated for a two-year term.

Nomination forms will be available early March, and will continue to be available through May 7, in the Ministry Center, the Sanctuary Pew Racks and on-line at LOPC.org. We need your nominations.

At our February meeting, Session approved the board of the Kurth Memorial Garden. This was preceded by a presentation on the recent improvements that were undertaken to take advantage of the downtime during the sanctuary upgrade. This wonderful asset will be available for years to come and serves as a lasting memorial to our church community.

Budget constraints were the topic of some discussion. While recognizing the remarkable generosity of the congregation, Session wrestled with the reality that our current "flat" budget leaves little room for program innovation and by freezing our personnel budget we run the risk that we will be less competitive in retaining our wonderful church staff. Session agreed that while the budget we approved at our January meeting is fiscally responsible we should apprise the congregation of its impact and provide opportunities for additional giving for those who may be in a position to respond. The Stewardship Team is developing an outreach program to let the congregation know of the opportunities for giving beyond our annual pledge drive.
