

have to admit that most years I feel that all the trees, lights, ornaments, and other things that are a beautiful part of Christmas come too quickly. They arrive in the stores before I even have a chance to take care of Halloween costumes and plan our Thanksgiving for family and friends. But this year, I have found myself (yes, in September, maybe even a little before that) just waiting for Advent and Christmas – feeling a longing for the peace I often feel during the Advent and Christmas season.

As a pastor (and person), I know how very hard the holidays can be for many of us. We are missing family members or friends who are no longer with us. We experience surprising grief that comes out of a place we thought was healed. We see what is happening in our world, and we feel we are carrying heavy burdens. The Art of Coziness

LOPC invites all families to join in celebrating the season of Advent with Hygge devotional tent cards. Hygge (pronounced "hoo-ga"), sometimes translated as "the art of coziness," sums up the aspects of Danish life that help bring about happiness. At once an antidote to over-busy consumerism and a lovely reminder of what matters most, hygge is a perfect way for families to live into the season of Advent, lighting candles and snuggling in to what the Danes call "the duvet of darkness."

"Advent and Hygge: The Art of Coziness" consists of five devotional table tents, one for each week of Advent (Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love), and a fifth for Christmas Eve/Day. Each tent features a lovely little table devotional, including a scripture reading, reflection, suggested practices, and a prayer.

Turning the Tide on the AIDS Epidemic and Improving Child Health in Zimbabwe.

December 5, 7:00 p.m., Oak Room

Pamela Magande, MD, MPH, program manager for the FACE (Families and Communities for the Elimination) of HIV Program of the Kapnek Trust, will provide a progress report on AIDS prevention and treatment in Zimbabwe. She will discuss the program's significant health and social impact on Zimbabwe culture as a result of the diminishing incidence of HIV and AIDS in Zimbabwe and Southern Africa. Dr. Magande and Dr. Dan Robbins, the Kapnek Trust's Executive Director, will report about their exciting and lifesaving work.

LOPC made a decision over eight years ago to help in the fight against AIDS by supporting the J.F. Kapnek Trust in Zimbabwe. The Trust has been on the front lines of the battle to reduce the impact of the pandemic with their effort to reduce the mother-to-child transmission of AIDS.

In her talk, Dr. Magande will address policies and practices contributing to the success of reducing the incidence of HIV in children by over 90% as well as the challenges remaining. She will also provide an update on Kapnek's strategies to improve child health through their Preschool Program and their work to assist children and their families with disabilities. And, yes, with our help the Kapnek Trust still feeds more than 17,000 preschool Zimbabwe children daily.

AIDS has killed over 32 million people worldwide as of 2018. But through years of international efforts the death rate has dropped to 800,000 from a high of 1.7 million deaths per year. An additional 37 million are living with AIDS. The disease is not the death sentence it once was. New HIV infections have been reduced by 40% since the peak in 1997.

Warm Winter Nights Update

Presbyterian Church is one
of 17 faith communities
throughout Contra Costa
County that host the
Interfaith Council of Contra
Costa's traveling homeless
shelter. This year LOPC
was host to eight families
comprised of 10 adults and 15
children ranging in age from
17 months to 17 years old.

This year's program faced a number of significant hurdles—the loss of electricity for more than two days, and the general disruption caused by the presence of fire danger. Despite these barriers, the LOPC community rallied under the leadership of Jim Reiter, Rick Silvani, and countless other volunteers. Warm Winter Night's Program Director, Bill Shaw, commented that LOPC was the perfect spot for his clients during an especially challenging time as LOPC consistently offers a safe and comforting environment for our guests.

More than 250 volunteers provided home-cooked meals, tutored children, shared fun activities including movie nights, animal therapy, bingo night, and even a Halloween Carnival. LOPC's annual commitment to provide shelter and hospitality to the guests of Warm Winter Nights continues to be embraced by congregation and greater community and is vital to combatting the increasing amount of homelessness in the Bay Area.

This was the first year that LOPC has hosted Warm Winter Nights over Halloween. We really wanted to make the children feel special so with the help of Laura Lowell and Elizabeth Ball we rallied volunteers to operate six carnival stations with games like Boo-Bowling and Witch's Hat Ring Toss. Everyone got to get dressed up in donated costumes and play at the carnival. Thank you for everyone who donated goods and volunteered to make this a special event!

S.L.A.M. is based within the Yakima Nation and focuses on teaching outside groups how they follow 'The Jesus Way' through their native traditions. Youth service teams will witness various ceremonies, learn about the history and culture of the Yakima people, and provide basic housework service in tribe elders' homes. The trip will be mainly relational—aiming to deepen our understanding and connections to the larger body of Christ from a different cultural, historical, and spiritual perspective.

Seedlings Outreach Programs

You may have heard that Seedlings Preschool is a wonderful place for toddlers to develop and learn. You also may have heard that their students gain social experiences and confidence through play and exploration. But did you know that Seedlings offers their students a



wonderful outreach program as well?

In addition to social and academic development, Seedlings teachers and staff have made it a priority to expose their young learners to outreach opportunities. In October, Seedlings hosted their annual Wheel Day event. They earned almost \$2,000 in proceeds and were able to donate it all to Grateful Gatherings, an outreach program that provides housing supplies to those in need.

In December, Seedlings and LOPC will team up to host a holiday toy drive. After Thanksgiving a "giving tree" will be set up in the foyer of the preschool building. Families are given the opportunity to choose an ornament from the tree that has a child's age and wish list. All collections are then taken to Harbor House in Oakland, a place where families in need go for support and resources.

In March, Seedlings will once again team up with LOPC to offer families the chance to participate in the afterschool drop-in service project, Love Does. Children will be able to put together food boxes and organize school supplies into backpacks for the Monument Crisis Center in Concord.

The cost is \$1,000 (airfare and pre/post-trip lodging extra). The experience is for novices and is only moderately strenuous. This trip is led by the Rev. Dr. Steve Harrington, former pastor at Sunnyvale Presbyterian Church and Livermore Presbyterian Church, who is an ACA certified Sea Kayak Instructor. Steve has guided for many years around the world as an instructor for both NOLS and Outward Bound. Participation numbers are limited.

Session Meeting Highlights

October 2019

The highlight of the October meeting was a report from Jody Black who has been leading the Task Force on Volunteerism. He provided an overview of the Task Force's approach that included discussing the theological mandate for lay ministry, the current state of volunteerism at LOPC, and brainstorming ideas for enhancing the church's volunteer strategy and efforts

The church benefits from a very active volunteer community that numbers in the hundreds who are involved in long and short-term ministry activities. Current LOPC volunteers were surveyed and provided very positive and affirming responses about their experiences. Yet we still have room for improvement in some areas with regard to organization, being clear about volunteers' roles and purpose, and ensuring we do not burn out volunteers.

The greatest challenge is the continuing need to add and replace volunteers, particularly in the Children, Family, and Youth Ministry areas. The Task Force made a number of recommendations regarding recruitment and retention of volunteers, effective matching of volunteers to needs, and supporting and celebrating volunteer contributions.

Jaime Polson introduced Session to the process that the Communications Team is undertaking in working with the outside marketing firm that will be helping us to align our communications with the church's mission. The marketing firm will be seeking feedback from a variety of sources so they may better know and understand LOPC. The question Jaime posed to Session was, "What makes LOPC unique?". Responses included the quality and relevance of the sermons, music ministry, authenticity of the church community, interfaith involvement, mission outreach, seniors ministry, and much more. No doubt each of us could add to the list.

To launch this year's stewardship campaign, the Stewardship Team completed a series of 10:10 programs on Talent – how your gifts and abilities can change the world; Treasure – how to share yours in a way to reflect God's love; and Time – how to use it to create impactful and compassionate change. More information about this year's campaign will be presented during services, in *Focus* and on the plaza between services. I had the opportunity to lead spiritual formation, a powerful and humbling experience.

Foundation Reports Strong Fiscal Year Results

LOPC Foundation closed its September 30, 2019, fiscal year with \$10.3 million of invested net assets (also called equity), after deducting \$376,000 of commitments to LOPC. Legacy estate and other gifts in the amount of \$273,000 were received. The comparable year-earlier amount was \$23,000.

A 1.2% investment rate of return for the fiscal year was earned on the two Foundation investment portfolios made up of 23 diversified mutual funds and exchange traded funds.

Foundation trustees appropriated \$271,000 for church ministries, an increase from \$268,000 a year earlier. They also appropriated \$100,000 for the third and final installment of a three-year pledge to the Sanctuary Campaign, and \$149,000 for facilities reserve study project expenses.

As we enter the last part of 2019, LOPC has a great deal to be thankful for. Year-to-date income through September is \$2,001,366 which is \$50,962 better than budget. Mission and Other Special Gifts is \$30,537 better than budget due to additional deployment of special gifts. The remaining income lines are \$20,425 better than budget due to lower Pledge Income offset by higher Non-Pledge, Loose Offerings & Other Giving. We are still \$67,000 or 3% short on our Pledge Commitments compared to budget, so please take a look at your giving. The staff continues to do a great job managing the expenses, as they are just slightly higher than budget by \$12,674, mainly due to higher Mission Giving and lower personnel expenses.

As in prior years, the 2019 budget includes a Faith Component. This represents giving beyond pledge commitments and historical non-pledge trends that is needed to cover the expense budget. This year's Faith Component is \$200,000. All contributions you make to the church in time, talent, and treasure are appreciated. Thank you to everyone who has given so much to help support all of the great ministries at LOPC.

Anyone who plans to make tax-deductible donations to LOPC in 2019 is reminded that the church must either receive your gift by 5:00 p.m. on December 31, or receive your mailed gift postmarked December 31 or earlier. For those giving stock, please note that these gifts must be in LOPC's brokerage account no later than December 31. Please notify Lidia Jesionek (x229 or lidia@lopc.org) or Char Casella (x253 or char@lopc.org) if you are making a stock gift, what stock(s) you're donating, and how it should be applied.

Year-end statements will be mailed in January. To ensure the deductibility of your gifts, do not file your 2019 tax return until you receive this statement. Some of your gifts may not be tax-deductible if you file your tax return before receiving a written acknowledgment of your gifts to LOPC.
