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He is Risen!

The question for Eastertide is not "What would Jesus do?" but "What are you going to do?



Ifter an eventful Lent and Easter Season—we now find ourselves in the liturgical season of Eastertide, and quickly approaching what we call "ordinary time."

In contrast to Lent and Easter, Eastertide doesn't create much excitement. But the disciples and everyone else who were part of Jesus' life or last days were profoundly moved. We learn of their doubts, struggles, and faith in the stories in scripture that immediately follow the resurrection. Eastertide is when we remember the

stories of the beginning of the church and an important prologue that is basically a "where-are-they-now" cover story on the disciples.

What happened to Peter's faith after he denied Jesus three times? Did anyone ever see Jesus again? Was there really a resurrection? What happened with Thomas' doubt?

The questions in scripture change. Instead of stories being centered around what Jesus did—they now ask what did the people do next?

This is a question, I think, that we can all relate to.

In society today, people care less about what you believe and care more about how your beliefs motivate you to act and participate in the world and in your neighborhoods. Society is asking us as Christians, "what happens next?"

When I ask myself this question, it affirms my desire to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world—I challenge myself to give more of my time and my money, and it calls me to be a better listener to the stories I hear of those in our neighborhoods that need to be voiced.

The question for Eastertide is not "What would Jesus do?" but "What are you going to do?"

Seeking New Church Leaders!

Officer Nominations Needed by May 5

One of the cornerstones of our Presbyterian heritage is election by the congregation of church officers to provide leadership for the church, as well as loving support for those in the church community. Each year we elect officers to serve for the following year, drawn from nominations from the congregation.

We are now in the process of selecting new officers and leaders for LOPC for terms beginning January 2020. It is a great privilege and responsibility to nominate members who will serve LOPC as elected lay leaders. It is also necessary for us to participate in the essential process that will influence our church in the near future.

The primary qualifications for nominees are:

- Strong commitment to Jesus Christ and the church's Mission Statement.
- Active participation in worship and in other ministries at LOPC.
- Stewardship commitment of time, talent, and financial resources.
- Leadership ability and organizational skills.
- Compassion in human relationships.
- An open-minded approach to ideas and problems.
- Spiritual depth and maturity.
- Ability to equip people for ministry and work in a team-based leadership role.

Elders, together with the pastors, lead and direct the ministry of the church.

They are persons of faith, dedication, and good judgment. Elders serve on Session, the governing body of the church. They also chair various church teams through which all ministries are conducted. Eight elders are ordained to serve three-year terms.

Deacons, as set forth in Scripture, are leaders who serve as the caring, compassionate arm of the church.

They provide loving support to all those in need within the church community. The primary area of Deacon service is care of members. Ten deacons are ordained to serve a three-year term and two deacons of high school-age serve a one-year term.

The Congregation Nominating Committee (CNC) members receive and renew nominations for church officers.

They select candidates to present to the congregation. They are elected for a one-year term.

Foundation Trustees serve on the LOPC

Foundation. This nine-member foundation receives gifts in various forms and designations, manages investments, and provides funding for LOPC needs that cannot be accommodated in the church's annual operating budget. Trustees serve an initial term of four years and are eligible to be re-elected for one three-year term. Members who have served in the past can be nominated for a two-year term.

Nomination forms will be available until May 5 in the Ministry Center and Sanctuary pew racks, or send an email nomination to cnc@lopc.org. We need your nominations, so please fill out and submit at least one nomination form.

First Friday Forum: May 3, 1:30 p.m.

Evangelicals and Protestants: Divided or Not?

Refreshments, Fellowship Hall at 1 p.m. • Speaker, Sanctuary at 1:30 p.m.

On May 3, First Friday Forum (FFF) presents historian David A. Hollinger speaking about global Christianity and the ecumenicalevangelical divide. The lecture begins in the Sanctuary at 1:30 p.m. with refreshments served in Fellowship Hall at 1:00 p.m.

Prof. Hollinger says, "The ecumenicalevangelical divide in American Protestantism is more significant than ever as a result of the increasing influence of the Global South on what counts as Christian witness in the North Atlantic West. The recent guarrels within the United Methodist Church about same-sex relationships dramatize a portentous consequence of treating Protestant denominational bodies as global, rather than national or regional. The Methodists from the Global South are decidedly more conservative on LGBTQ and other issues than most Methodists in the United States. The new strength for conservative Christianity presents several challenges to the more classically liberal, ecumenical Protestants affiliated with the National



Dr. David A. Hollinger

Well-equipped to discuss the controversies of these issues, Prof. Hollinger is the Preston Hotchkis Professor Emeritus of History at UC Berkeley. He specializes in the intellectual and ethnic racial history of the United States since the Civil War and is past president of the Organization of American Historians. He is a member of the American Philosophical Society and American Academy of Arts and Science and has been a Guggenheim Fellow and a Fellow of the Center for Advances Study in the Behavioral Sciences.

Prof. Hollinger has authored seven books including Protestants Abroad: How Missionaries Tried to Change the World but Changed America and After Cloven Tongues of Fire: Protestant Liberalism in Modern American History. Along with UC Berkeley, he has taught at the University of Michigan, the State University of New York at Buffalo, and the University of Oxford. "This is a rare opportunity to hear a professor speak on the state of religion in the country today," says Nancy Holtzapple, chair of FFF. "Come with your questions - and bring a friend."

Just the Facts...

As one of the newest members of the LOPC Foundation Board of Trustees, I am writing my first article about some basic facts. If you Google the word "foundation," you get about 3.3 million results in 0.58 seconds. Included are choices such as cosmetic make-up products, Isaac Asimov's science fiction series, a dictionary definition,

and names of numerous organizations that support various causes financially and otherwise, such as the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

The LOPC Foundation is an organization separate from the church that provides significant financial support for LOPC's operations, facilities projects, and specifically endowed causes. For fiscal year 2019 (October 1-September 30), it has appropriated \$271,000 for the church's operating budget, and, among other items, has distributed \$100,000 to satisfy its third and final pledge installment for the Sanctuary Retrofit Campaign, to LOPC.

For many years, the Foundation funded specific requests for special projects and temporary funding of new programs. Several years ago, it changed its procedures. Currently it appropriates a total amount from which it disburses funds during the year to reimburse the church for expenses it incurs, as authorized by budgets approved by Session and managed by the church's teams and staff, restricted in some instances by the terms of specific endowments created by donors to the Foundation.

The Foundation is funded by outright immediate gifts and by planned legacy contributions from estate plans of church members and friends. The funds and their investment returns are intended to provide reliable, significant support for LOPC in perpetuity. March Session Highlights

Session approved LOPC's updated Vision, Values, Methods, Obstacles, and Measures statement (V2MOM) presented by Peter Whitelock. The update added Worship to the church's existing priorities, which include: 1) Sharing the good news of The Gospel and making disciples; 2) Breaking down barriers of separation to be an inclusive community; 3) Mission; and 4) Providing ministry onsite, offsite and online.

The Church Nominating Committee (CNC), chaired by David MacKenzie, will start its work of seeking candidates for 2020 church leadership positions including Deacons, Elders, Foundation trustees, and the next Church Nominating Committee. Brochures describing the criteria for candidates for these positions are in the pews and in the Ministry Center. I am very pleased to announce that Paul Koenig was elected as Clerk for 2020 and has graciously accepted. Session elects next year's Clerk now so the CNC may fill the vacancy created when the newly elected Clerk takes office.

Lynn Trowbridge provided an update on the operation of the Kurth Memorial Garden. The Garden is in solid financial shape with an operating surplus and reserve for ongoing maintenance. Please see the website for additional information about how LOPC members and their family may purchase a memorial plaque or niche.

The Diversity Task Force, led by Gerald Chinen, presented information and impressions gathered from its work to date, having sought input from the congregation (through a third-party survey), the church staff (individually and in groups), and the study of scripture. The input reflected a spectrum of views, when considered together, identified areas the Task Force believes will be worthwhile to consider. The Task Force will present specific recommendations for the church to consider at an upcoming Session meeting. The Diversity Task Force was convened in 2016 when Session established Diversity as one of LOPC's areas of priority.

Fotokids Offers Disadvantaged Kids a Future

Fotokids, a Mission partner of LOPC, is a remarkable organization that is transforming the lives of young people in poverty-stricken areas in Guatemala. In March, we visited its programs in Santiago Atitlan and in Guatemala City. Over 200 kids, ages 9 to 23, participate in classes to learn photography and graphic arts.

We sat in on classes where the students were learning to use software to create web pages and printmedia marketing materials. We witnessed the close attention teachers gave the students and the students' enthusiasm for their work. Some were learning to take studio portraits or showing photographs they had taken of places in their community.

These assignments help students develop communication skills and self-confidence, in addition to the creativity in using the photography, computer, and graphic design skills. The program is supported by social workers who work with each family to support the kids' success. Many of their photos have been shown in numerous U.S. and international exhibitions.

Particularly gratifying was a unique opportunity to have lunch with two young men who had stayed at our home when visiting LOPC 10 years ago. Then just 16, David and Abdias now work using skills they learned in Fotokids. David is a film editor for Fox sports in Guatemala City, and Abdias is a photographer for the government newspaper. Abdias had a photograph published on the front page of the New York Times last summer. It was such a privilege for us to see these two young men again and learn about the success they are enjoying. We were moved by stories we heard that demonstrated how educating and training one member of a family can improve the situation for others in the family, having a "ripple" effect. We are pleased to support Fotokids and to have had this opportunity to see contributions at work.

Girls' English & Computer Skills Class

Last Christmas, many LOPC members and friends contributed to the Girls' English and Computer Skills Class in Congo. The church was able to send \$9,300 to the program -- \$5,500 from necklace sales and \$3,800 from other individual donations including the Congo Mission budget. The nine-month class, which meets after school, costs about \$18,000 for the 40 girls. Thus LOPC gifts funded over half of what was needed.

The teachers say that many students in Congo fail because they don't learn enough English, and because most of the schools don't have computers in the classroom. The additional challenge for girls is that for most families in Congo, parents pay school fees only for the boys, and the girls must drop out and are expected to get married at a very early age. This class is especially important for these girls because it gives them the resources and skills to do more.

There are many stories from girls in the Girls' English and Computer Skills class relating how that experience had such a positive impact on their lives. Since 2011, when the class started, 40 girls each year are chosen to attend. Willie and Douglas, who teach the class, report that 35 girls from the first class got state diplomas and 12 earned bachelor's degrees. Now, 14 have returned to university to study for their bachelor's or master's degrees. Each class has had similar successes.

Kapingo Pasue, a student at the University of Kananga, says, "My subject is Administrative Science. The skills I learned while attending the class -- training in English and computer science -- helped me improve my scores at university, and at the end of this year, I will have my degree." Another student, Majuni Lunkamba, says her father is very proud of her because she is paying her own way through university by tutoring fellow students in English and computer skills because she learned so much in her high school class.

On March 14, Cyclone Idai hit the port city of Beira, Mozambique, before moving inland to Zimbabwe and Malawi, bringing devastation with winds over 100 miles an hour, followed by flooding. The UN estimates Cyclone Idai affected 2 million people (dead, missing or displaced) in the eastern part of Africa. Mozambique has recorded 417 deaths with 1,400 feared injured (as of this writing), while in Zimbabwe, 259 have been killed and 200 injured. Malawi reports 56 dead and over 500 missing.

Many LOPC members have asked if LOPC's mission partner, JF Kapnek Trust, was hit. Fortunately, the answer is no, as most of their work on AIDS prevention and assisting vulnerable children is focused in other areas of the country.

The impact was felt mostly in the eastern part of Zimbabwe along the boarder with Mozambique, about 150 miles from Harare, Zimbabwe's capital. Harare and the town of Kadoma, where the LOPC Mission team went this past fall, received little rain. A drought there continues.

The Mozambique port city of Beira, which also serves Zimbabwe, Malawi and other East African land-locked countries, was decimated. One estimate reports that 90% of the city was destroyed. The damage includes the pipeline carrying fuel and natural gas from Beira into Zimbabwe, worsening those shortages for the country.

Other relief organizations have sought JF Kapnek Trust's help with getting supplies to the impacted areas, and it is sending personnel to assess the situation. But even this limited effort means it is using more fuel than expected and at a higher-than-budgeted prices. That, in turn, has pushed the Trust to re-examine its aid priorities in the region.

Journey of Faith


Katie Chivers says, "I am a very relational person, and for me, the relationships I have with other Christians have been the most influential on my faith journey. It goes all the way back to the fourth grade when I accepted a personal relationship with Jesus at Redwood Camp in Mt. Hermon. I had a small discipleship group of girls as special friends then and with whom I went through middle and high school. With our amazing leader, we conquered so many topics and everyone was so supportive and encouraging through challenging times. Five of us are still in contact today.

"I also had a small group of girls in my sorority at UC Irvine (UCI) that were my help and support through college, and once I graduated, I formed another small group of young adults. We have stuck together over 20 years and have been there for each other through jobs, marriage, and kids. We continue to meet monthly."

A member of LOPC for 15 years, Katie continued finding relationships. She and her husband, Matt, participate in three small groups -- FISH, couples and Sowers.

"The Sowers, which is a family group, has been a unique experience for me and my faith journey as I am guiding/helping my kids with their own faith journey," Katie explains. "I am learning a lot by teaching them and being reminded of simple stories and lessons I learned as a child. I find I am looking at my faith again with a more childlike view and almost experiencing things for the first time, just through my children."

Katie grew up in a strong Christian family and attended Community Presbyterian Church in Danville from the start. "My sisters and I were baptized, grew up going to youth groups, volunteered, and were married there. Church has always been a part of my life." Katie met



"LOPC has provided me with a sense of community and belonging," Katie continues. "I have met some of my closest friends here—again a y. relational piece — and have been challenged in new and different ways. The pastoral staff are incredible teachers, and I find it very easy to apply sermons to my daily life.

"Our church has also provided me with the opportunity to start some new programs: Mom's Night Out, Parents' Night Out, and a baby play-group. All of these programs were a way to allow people to connect. I feel God really uses me to build relationships among young families here."

Katie says being a Christian has given her a sense of peace. "We struggled to get pregnant for almost two years and that led to a lot of questions about God's plan for us. It was an incredibly emotional time and now that we have been blessed with two children, I see what God's plan and timing was for us. Whenever I begin to question or doubt, I really think about that experience and reflect on it. I know God is good, and I do trust in his plan for my life."

Katie chooses as her favorite Bible verse Jeremiah 29:11: For I know the plans I have for you, declares the LORD. Plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. "This verse has been huge for me, particularly in my adult life, trusting in God and His plan for me."


