




### High School Yakima Trip: June 20-27

Youth who complete 9th-12th grade in May 2020 will travel to Yakima, Washington to partner with an indigenous led organization: S.L.A.M. (Students Learning About Missions). S.L.A.M. is based within the Yakima Nation and focuses on teaching outside groups how they follow 'The Jesus Way' through their native traditions. Youth service teams will witness various ceremonies, learn about the history and culture of the Yakima people, and provide basic housework service in tribe elders' homes. The trip will be mainly relational aiming to deepen our understanding and connections to the larger body of Christ from a different cultural, historical and spiritual perspective.




## **Foundation Vision**

### We need you! Housing Crisis in Contra Costa County

#### November 10 in the Library at 10:15 a.m.

Recently, reports about or reference to "affordable housing in the Bay Area" often describe the issue as: a crisis, complex, or feeling of "NIMBY" (Not In My Back Yard ). NIMBY implies people want to help lowerincome families find homes but don't want low-income housing in their neighborhoods. The San Francisco Presbytery is offering \$1 million total in grants to churches to help address the housing crisis in Contra Costa County.

On November 10th LOPC will hold a meeting to hear some ideas we have generated but other ideas are welcome.

Would you be willing to:

- Help find ways to build smaller manufactured homes in Contra Costa County?
- Help reach out to better identify families at risk to become homeless?
- Seek out private and philanthropic funds to rehabilitate vacant or underused properties for housing?
- Find and support homeownership counseling agencies to support people to incrementally save for a down payment?
- Seek local programs to educate current homeowners to build small homes in their backyards?
- Seek local programs to connect workers who need affordable housing with housing owners looking for increased returns?

At the meeting we will discuss applying for a grant to implement one of these ideas or others that might be brought forward. The funds could be used to help expand an existing program or partner addressing this issue. Here is a chance to get involved to help formulate an action plan that helps others. Join us to share your ideas and suggestions to help fight the affordable-housing issue in Contra Costa County.

# Turning the Tide on the AIDS Epidemic and Improving Child Health in Zimbabwe.

December 5, 7:00 p.m., Oak Room

Pamela Magande, MD, MPH, program manager for our FACE (Families and Communities for the Elimination) of HIV Program of the Kapnek Trust, will provide a progress report on AIDS prevention and treatment in Zimbabwe. She will discuss the program's significant health and social impact on Zimbabwe culture as a result of the diminishing incidence of HIV and AIDS in Zimbabwe and Southern Africa. Dr. Magande and other Kapnek Trust staff will report about their exciting and lifesaving work.

LOPC made a decision over eight years ago to help in the fight against AIDS by supporting the J.F. Kapnek Trust in Zimbabwe. The Trust has been on the front lines of the battle to reduce the impact of the pandemic with their effort to reduce the mother-to-child transmission of AIDS.

In her talk, Dr. Magande will address policies and practices contributing to the success of reducing the incidence of HIV in children by over 90% as well as the challenges remaining. She will also provide an update on Kapnek's strategies to improve child health through their Preschool Program and their work to assist children and their families with disabilities. And, yes, with our help the Kapnek Trust still feeds more than 17,000 preschool Zimbabwe children daily.

AIDS has killed over 32 million people worldwide as of 2018. But through years of international efforts the death rate has dropped to 800,000 from a high of 1.7 million deaths per year. An additional 37 million are living with AIDS. The disease is not the death sentence it once was. New HIV infections have been reduced by 40% since the peak in 1997.

# Fifth Annual Interfaith Picnic 2019

# Session Highlights

September 2019

Peter Whitelock reported that the Volunteer Task Force is close to completing its work and will share its findings and recommendations with Session at the October meeting. The Task Force provided copies of *The New Breed: Understanding and Equipping the 21st Century Volunteer* as one of the best sources they discovered in the course of their deliberations.

Chris Baldwin presented information that has been collected regarding the composition of the church's membership to identify trends and potential areas of focus. LOPC is fairly unique in that it enjoys a healthy distribution of age groups in its membership. We are working on how to involve our members in the life of the church in ways that are meaningful to them and to support them in the development of their relationship with God.

In anticipation of the start of the annual budget planning process, Char Casella provided an overview of the overall process, the Foundation's role in supporting the church's finances, and the Finance Team's approach to long-range planning.

Gerald Chinen provided an update on the Diversity Task Force initiatives that have begun and will continue to expand including training of the staff, leadership and congregation. The Task Force will share its recommendations that were formed by considerable discussion and discernment within and beyond the Task Force members. Jaime Polson reported that she is leading a detailed safety review with a member of Homeland Security and local officials to ensure we are taking appropriate measures to provide ongoing safety of our campus.

New Deacons, Elders, and Foundation members were elected unanimously at the September 15 Congregational meeting. The Leadership retreat for all new and outgoing church leaders will be held January 24-25 at LOPC with Jake Metcalf, pastor at Hayward Presbyterian Church, sharing his experience and insights in redeveloping Hayward Pres.

Dave MacKenzie shared that his wife Jane's ordination service at LOPC was a very special occasion not only for him and Jane, but also for those who attended to support Jane. Craig Barnes, President of Princeton Theological Seminary, officiated and brought together those in attendance who have church relationships and those who do not which made for a very moving service.

We continued our spiritual formation series where Session members shared their faith journeys, and Tom Scovel related how God has shaped his extraordinary life's journey. A very powerful story.

Katie Weaver says Jesus has always seemed the most real to her when she is helping others. "I feel like when I am doing this, I am connecting to Him better and am carrying out His mission," she says. "I also have this same feeling when I see others showing their compassion for others

In reflecting on her faith journey Katie explains, "I think my faith journey began when my family joined LOPC when I was five. 


