

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The Good Steward

Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path.

Psalm 119: 105

When I was growing up, my Grandma Polson could often be found sitting in her favorite chair in the living room reading the Bible. As a teenager, I was just beginning to attend church and think about my faith. I had a lot of questions, and I asked my grandma what reading the Bible meant to her.

She shared Psalm 119:105 with me: "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." My grandma said that the Bible helped her make decisions about how to live her life, how to love and treat all of God's children, and it helped her connect with God in all sorts of ways throughout her lifetime.

My grandmother modeled a few very valuable lessons for me about building a relationship with God through studying the Bible:

- My grandma dedicated herself to reading the Bible almost every day, and when it got confusing, frustrating, or maddening, she would study the Bible in community or meet with her pastor for guidance about reading the meanings of those texts.
- 2. She accepted that there were stories or messages in the Bible that she might not ever understand or like, but still held it as inspired. If you have studied the Bible, you know there are some strange and mysterious things you may never understand or very possibly stories of mistreatment that make you cringe. She made her peace with that reality and didn't give up on reading it, even when it was difficult.
- 3. My grandma read the Bible through the lens of a person who embodied St. Augustine of Hippo's idea of faith seeking understanding. She genuinely sought to learn and understand the Bible and what it could teach her in her daily life.
- 4. She loved the Bible and, over a lifetime of study and prayer, held it as a way to know God and to be known by God.

When I was sixteen, I saw my grandma for the last time, sitting in that same chair, smiling as she read the Bible. I will never forget that memory of her. After a short four month battle with brain cancer, she still kept the Bible and God close to her heart. I know the Bible was a lamp to her feet and a light to her path throughout life. I am thankful for all the lessons she taught me about how to stay close to God, even during the hardest times. I have found God's word to be my light, too.

As you look through FOCUS and various small group offerings at LOPC, you will find many different opportunities to join a group and study the Bible in a community of faith. If you study the Bible, I am most certain it will bless your relationship with God and others.

Seedlings Outreach Programs

You may have heard that Seedlings Preschool is a wonderful place for toddlers to develop and learn. You may also have heard that their students gain social experiences and confidence through play and exploration. But did you know that Seedlings offers their

students a wonderful outreach program as well?

In addition to social and academic development, Seedlings teachers and staff have made it a priority to expose their young learners to outreach opportunities. In September, Seedlings and LOPC teamed up to host a blanket drive for local homeless shelters. They collected fifteen blankets and made even more after church services on September 9th.

In October, Seedlings students were each asked to bring a new or gently used book to school. During their Wonder Time session, a special monthly meeting where students explore their spirituality and faith, the children learned about LOPC's mission trip to renovate a preschool in Zimbabwe. Students were able to add a personal touch by each making a card to place inside their books. The children look forward to seeing photographs of their new friends from across the world when the mission work is through.

Coming up from November 18 through December 10, Seedlings and LOPC will host a toy drive and have a "giving tree" set up in the foyer of the preschool building. Families are given the opportunity to choose an ornament from the tree that has a child's age and wish listed. All collections are then taken to Harbor House in Oakland, a place where families in need go for support and resources.

In February, Seedlings will host a diaper drive. A collection box will be in the preschool foyer, and donations will be packaged by children and volunteers for LOPC's Love Does event. The diaper packages will then be distributed to Monument Crisis Center in Concord.

In March, Seedlings families will be able to participate in Grateful Gatherings, an outreach program that provides housing supplies to those in need. Volunteers can help by donating housing goods and furniture, or be there to set up the new home for the family.

Seedlings is proud to offer their students many opportunities to give back, both locally and abroad.



Fuego Volcano Update

On June 17, LOPC took a Disaster Relief Collection for victims of the Fuego Volcano that erupted on June 3 in Guatemala.

Fotokids, our longtime mission partner in Guatemala, has connections with many of the communities that were in the path of the eruption. The people of LOPC contributed over \$3,000. These are where some of your contributions were distributed so far:

- Vamos Adelante (\$500) Deployed first responders after the eruption.
- Help Victims of Volcano Fuego (\$330) Provides care to children who were burned.
- La Lucerna (\$1,135) Provided 48 families in a remote village with basic foodstuffs.
- Constu Casa (\$550) To construct new homes for four families.

Many thanks again to the LOPC community who compassionately reached out to help the many victims of the eruption that left more than 1,700 people without homes and 319 people dead.

In his book Quarks, Chaos, and Christianity, Templeton Award winner, theoretical physicist, and Anglican priest John Polkinghorne explores the gap between science and religion as he shows the ways that both science and religion point to something greater than ourselves. In writing about science and religion as "intellectual cousins under the skin" with a common interest in understanding, Polkinghorne notes the first tries to comprehend physical reality and the second focuses upon divine reality.

Journey of Faith

Alex Paras was born in the Philippines, the youngest of four siblings. He grew up in a Catholic family and started elementary school in an all-boys Catholic school in the Philippines. Believing in God the Father, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit was a given for him, as was the premise that all good things were from

the grace of God. It was as certain as the sunrise. He was also taught that science was a witness of God's creation. His parents encouraged him to see the beauty in the world around him. It was all God's creation, they told him. As a child, they would go on family road trips, and he was awed by the grandeur of the mountains or lakes.

His family moved to the United States in the early 1980s when Alex was six.

"Attending a public elementary school instead of a Catholic School, I didn't know that it was inappropriate to talk about God," he recalled. "When a teacher would ask, 'Where did the fish come from or how were the mountains or seas formed?', I felt like a star student when I said it was all attributable to God."

Alex says of his faith journey, "Through various life events and people, God had a way of inviting me closer. During childhood, my parents encouraged me to reconcile questions I would have about faith by reading the Bible. The Bible we had was difficult to read. A friend introduced me to an NIV Study Bible, and it felt like a whole new world was opened up to me.

"During college, I stopped regularly attending Sunday services. A few years after starting my career, I received a wake-up call. I had a car accident that I should not have survived. The message was loud and clear. It was time for me to get back with Christ, and I did."

Alex remembers being inspired by Paul's message to the Colossians in chapter three: "We clothe ourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues, put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity."

Alex reflected that it takes a conscious effort in daily interaction with family, friends, or strangers, to follow this guidance.

"It seems to me," Alex continues, "Jesus is most real when I encounter a stranger. I may not know where the person has been, what they believe, or where they are in life. What I do know is that in front of me is a beloved child of God, a person in His own image that we should treat with grace, love, and humility."

Alex also gives thanks for how God challenges him. "Jesus also taught us the importance of fellowship—being in contact with others. As an introvert, it was a step outside of my comfort zone to approach new visitors in the plaza between services, or to organize large church events so that we could be in fellowship with each other. Joining a small group and allowing me to be 'out there' didn't come naturally. However, it has been rewarding to meet new people, learn about them, and learn something new about myself and my faith."

Alex met his wife, Ida, in college. They married and moved to Lafayette to start a family.

"Conceiving was much more arduous than either of us imagined," he recalled. "We were both very prayerful during the journey and decided at one point to take a break from 'trying.' Chloe was conceived within a couple of months. We learned that God's plan and blessings are always perfectly timed and purposeful."

Alex has learned and grown in the roles he has taken on at LOPC.

"When Pastor Gerald asked me to become a deacon, without full knowledge of what it meant, I prayed and trusted I would be able to fulfill the duties," he said. "Serving communion at church services was special. It was an honor to serve shut-ins when we were invited into their homes in their twilight years. In some cases, their last communion.

"As an Elder," he continued, "I learned to be more prayerful about what God calls us to do in ministry. It has helped me focus on the fellowship needs of the church. I'm involved in a small group of men at a similar stage in life. We've built relationships where we sharpen each other through study and discussions. Having diverse perspectives allowed me to wrestle, challenge, and renew what I know about my faith."
