



Primera Pres Needs Your Help!

Six years ago, Don and I signed up to be a liaison to our sister church in Oakland, Primera Iglesia Presbiteriana Hispana, a.k.a. Primera. Over the years we have gotten to know Primera well through the One Sunday workday project and other ongoing mission outreach.

The pandemic has not been kind to our Hispanic brothers and sisters in Oakland. The City of Oakland is facing severe economic challenges, hampering efforts to provide food for those in need. Currently, over 85% of the Primera congregants are unemployed. Primera's top priority is their safety and well-being. Primera has been trying to meet basic food needs by providing a bag of groceries to families on Saturdays. The bag includes a portion of beans and rice, maseca (flour for tortillas), cooking oil and a small variety of fresh produce.

LOPC has responded to our sister church's needs by shipping 1,400 pounds of beans and rice, 150 pounds of sugar, 125 pounds of maseca, cooking oil, and some produce directly to Primera. The food was purchased wholesale from a restaurant supplier. Primera's deacons work to breakdown and re-bag the 50-pound bags of bulk items for distribution to the community. The purchases and shipments were made possible by the generosity of 35 LOPC members who gave \$2,500 in donations to directly support Primera's food bridge. We project that we can provide food deliveries to Primera through August but would like to be able to extend the food bridge until the impact of the pandemic has subsided.

The reality of this situation is grim. In addition to hunger, Primera families are facing evictions and utility shutoffs. Unfortunately, the moratorium on Oakland evictions ended in mid-June. Primera staff are trying to work directly with the congregants' landlords and utility companies by placing "good faith" deposits on rentals to forestall evictions and shutoffs.

This is a time when hope meets caution. Primera continues to look for unexpected signs of hope. We ask that you please pray for Primera. Hopefully, LOPC can continue to make a difference in the lives of those families, at a time when it is most needed.

Warm Winter Nights

LOPC will host WWN this year from Nov. 2 - 16.

Every fall LOPC commits to hosting Warm Winter Nights, a traveling homeless shelter which runs from October to May annually, sponsored by the Interfaith Council of Contra Costa County and 17 faith congregations. This program is vital to our community, as homelessness increases and affordable housing becomes scarcer in the Bay area.

The shelter provides homeless families with a clean, safe and warm place to sleep at night and support programming during the day. Participants either go to work or receive resource services at the Oasis Center in Pittsburg while their children attend school. All participants must be clean and sober, comply to behavioral standards and work toward self-sufficiency and permanent housing. This shelter meets key needs as families struggle to transition back into permanent housing.

Due to the uncertainty that exists, our degree of involvement may vary depending on the Shelter In Place orders that exist at that time but we look forward to helping in whatever capacity is deemed necessary and safe for clients as well as volunteers.

Update from Atfaluna School for Deaf Children in Gaza

Atfaluna, which LOPC has helped support since 2003, has been facing tough challenges during the COVID-19 pandemic, like many other LOPC Mission partners. Of course, even before the pandemic, Gaza's 2 million residents experienced trying circumstances, living squeezed into 40 kilometers of land on the edge of Israel.

Nonetheless, during COVID-19, the school has continued to educate its children via remote learning and materials sent home. It also has provided social support and meals for students' families. The vast majority of the families have been unable to travel to work. In spite of the challenges, Atfaluna continues to provide a beacon of hope to its students, families and the greater community of Gaza.

The Atfaluna Society for Deaf Children, a registered Palestinian NGO located in Gaza City, has been providing education and support services for the deaf since 1992. Literally thousands of deaf children, adults, and their families have received help at the school through deaf education, audiology, speech therapy, income-generating programs for the deaf, vocational training, parent, teacher, and community training and awareness programs, and a host of other services and programs.

The school was the first in Gaza to open its doors to deaf children. Schooling starts at kindergarten and continues onto primary and middle school, grades 1 to 9, in 20 classrooms. The educational process in the school depends on a dual language system which includes speech and Palestinian sign language. The school also houses a classroom for students with special needs in addition to hearing loss.

Atfaluna addresses deafness through four areas:

Education - academic instruction for 300 deaf students, training of teachers, sign language training.

Auditory support - primary and diagnostic hearing screening, hearing aid repair, speech therapy services, early Intervention services.

Vocational support - carpentry and wood working, sewing and embroidery, fabric and rug weaving, wood painting, pottery production and design, vocational training in the café.

Emotional support - community education and awareness, psychosocial and counseling services.

Lasting Legacy of Love

The LOPC Foundation was established in 1993 as a way for LOPC members and friends to support the many vital church ministries into the indefinite future. Over the years, the Foundation has been blessed by many members and friends, creating a lasting legacy of

love in their will, trust, IRA, also gifts while alive.

Gifts to the Foundation are different than annual giving to LOPC. Session approves use of annual gifts to LOPC, through pledges or otherwise, for the operating budget to support LOPC ministries and campus upkeep.

Gifts to the Foundation are lasting. They are invested with an indefinite time horizon. The Foundation has dual investment objectives -- to preserve capital, and to grow invested assets. The investment objectives are achieved by annual support for LOPC ministries in the prudent amount of 4% of the value of invested gift assets, measured as the average of asset values over the past 12 quarters.

Lasting net effects: The invested value of gift assets has increased over the years after providing 4% support for

LOPC ministries. The value of a gift to the Foundation continues to increase indefinitely. The blessing is that, as the value of your gift increases, annual support for LOPC's vital ministries increases.

Gifts to the Foundation are for loving ministries. Annually, Foundation support for specific LOPC ministries is determined by Session, in consultation with Foundation trustees. In 2020, there are 30 grants for LOPC operating budget expenses for over \$300,000, including eight mission projects, children's ministry, youth ministry, family ministry, senior adults, Thursday Fellowship, spiritual formation, deacons emergency fund, communications, worship media team.

Peter also advised the Session regarding the Congo Team. He then discussed the on-line programs for the next month addressing diversity and anti-racism, an important focus for all.


Jaime reported on other planning going forward that she has been working on with team members, including programs and classes to be conducted on Zoom.

journey of FAITH

Jackson Wheeler says his passion for God and for football are intertwined in his journey of faith. Here is this part of his story.

"Growing up I was very involved in both football and basketball. I played them at Campolindo High School. I wanted to do my very best so I practiced consistently and constantly.

"In my sophomore year, football season ended, and I moved on to varsity basketball, but soreness in my quads [leg-muscle group] began to surface. Weeks passed. It got worse and worse. Every day I gave it everything I had, intensifying the pain. New Year's Day my mom noticed my difficulties doing an easy hike and knew we needed to seek medical attention. I put a pause on all my activities as the long quest to discover the problem began."

Late spring, Jackson was diagnosed with mitochondrial myopathy— which meant his muscles weren't functioning properly, causing them to become weak and worn out quickly after exercising. Since it takes a long time to recover, overall energy is greatly depleted, and he discovered the condition affected the muscles throughout his body. But they did not know why or how to fix it.

"Searching for the root of my problem was when I began growing closer to God," he says. "Throughout my life, I had believed in God and gone to church. But now, the many unknowns of my situation and my burning desire to be a great football player led me to truly seek God. As I continued practice through spring and summer, I was propelled by a Bible verse, 'I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

The more he trained, the more he ran, the worse his quads became, but he did play football. However, on a key play he didn't make the catch, and that did it. Hopelessness overtook him. "I became depressed. My



health issues left my body so exhausted and depleted I could hardly focus on school. I lost faith in God and struggled to keep going. Luckily, there were mentors who supported me. At LOPC's By the Way (BTW) high school group, Keris [Dahlkamp, Youth Director,] provided guidance, and I learned to reconnect with God. My football coach and my dad were with me every step of my journey. I decided to fight back."

His condition worsened during his junior year. He became manager of the football team, continuing to attend practices, handing out equipment. As the season progressed, his coach had other ideas and told him to suit up, which he did, began practicing, and then went into a game.

"I grew closer to God and relied on Him for my strength, reminding myself that anything is possible if you do it through Christ. Every time I took the field, I repeated II Timothy 1:7, 'For God has not given us the spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind.' It reminded me not to fear or be anxious about my quads. If I trusted in the LORD and poured out my heart on the field, then he would take care of me. Whether I was suffering during the weekend after playing, or ready to take the field on a Friday night, I relied on God for 'my strength and my salvation."

It won't come as a surprise that Jackson was named the U.S. Bank Inspirational Player of the Week or that his coach called him the moral compass of the team.

Jackson and his family began attending LOPC when they moved to Lafayette six years ago. His older brother, Hunter, graduated from UC Berkeley this year and attended LOPC's youth group, as Jackson and his younger brother, Charlie, do now. They have a 10-year-old sister, Grace, adopted from China at age 10 months, who, they say, is the adorable princess of the family.

"I enjoy our Sunday sermons, which are a weekly reminder of the need to devote time to God. In attending BTW, Keris has been amazing in his support of me. He truly helped me keep fighting through my struggles and, more importantly, reestablish my relationship with God and make it stronger than ever," Jackson says. "Tom Scovel, a BTW advisor, has also been inspirational to me. His life story, growing up with missionary parents in China, being in internment camps, and other trials, helped me keep going, and reminded me that God gives us strength through all our problems."

Says Tom of Jackson, "He is an extraordinary young man. I discerned him as remarkably mature and impressively deep in his quest to become a more faithful disciple of Christ. I will miss him but look forward to following his progress in college."

Jackson will attend UC San Diego this fall, studying computer science. "I look forward to joining Christian organizations so I can share my knowledge of God in a way that will, hopefully, lift others up to do great things in their lives," he says. For now, he has been doing more volunteering, most recently with the Salvation Army in San Francisco delivering meals to the homeless.

He concludes, "Knowing how helpful it is to have a connection to God when going through difficult times in life, I want to utilize my own religious foundation to help others overcome their life obstacles. I know God has been with me all the way and will continue to guide me."

Layette Project

The COVID-19 pandemic hasn't slowed LOPC's Quilters



and Chicks with Sticks organizations. Remarkably, they've continued to sew, quilt, knit and crochet at home, contributing their product to what is known as the Layette Project.

And what is that, you ask? Coordinated by Hillcrest Congregational Church in Pleasant Hill and support by LOPC, the Layette project has provided basic infant supplies to the neediest families through the Contra Costa Public Health Nurse Perinatal Staff for 60 years. It contributes about 25 layettes a month, year-round, more in economic hard times. To meet this need they rely on the support of organizations and individuals outside of their congregation.

Layette bags are packed full of clothing, sizes through 18 months, blankets, and other baby essentials. Typically, a bag holds 60 -70 items. A large stuffed animal peeks out from the bag, and a tote bag often completes the layette.

Both Chicks with Sticks and the LOPCided Quilters have been supporting this project for about 10 years. "We provide handmade quilts, afghans, receiving blankets, sweaters, hats and tote bags," says Louise Tanno. "We also provide a large quantity of new and gently used baby clothes, new stuffed animals, and other baby essentials. The entire congregation has supported this effort, in large part by donating during our annual Baby Shower, which is held every May.

"This year we were unable to have the baby shower. However, the need is still there, possibly greater than ever due to the current economic situation. We welcome any donations of new or gently used baby clothes and other items."

vbs goes virtual!

The COVID-19 pandemic has upended many things in our world, affecting even the youngest among us. From online school to canceled sports, our children have had to cope with a number of radical changes with almost no preparation. Luckily, our kids are incredibly resilient, but we were still heartbroken when we, the Children's Ministry team, had to make the decision to cancel all in-person summer programming this year.

Even as we made the right decision, we knew that our kids were going to need to learn new coping strategies to deal with our upside-down world. That's why we set to work immediately creating something entirely new: a virtual version of Vacation Bible Camp, where we could give kids the tools to ask questions about the world they live in.

That idea turned into our theme: Asking the Big Questions. We wanted to teach kids that not only is it okay to ask questions about why the world is the way it is, but those questions can bring us closer to God and closer to each other. We decided to do it over Zoom, structuring the program in such a way that kids would be able both to hear the message and to talk about it. And so, for 75 minutes each day over five days in June, we gathered as a community online to be in ministry with our kids.

Our Large Group team recorded a series of videos that we showed the kids as a way of opening our time together. From singing upbeat songs, to asking the daily Big Question, to teaching about the Bible story, our team created, in essence, five half-hour episodes of a children's television program. The amount of work that went into producing these videos shows how much our Family Ministry staff loves and values children.

During Small Group time, our kids were broken up into groups in Zoom, with one adult Shepherd and

three to four other children.
Our Shepherds this year were nothing short of amazing.
Composed of longtime dedicated Children's Ministry volunteers, former volunteers who answered the call to serve, and brand new recruits who decided to dedicate their time to

something completely new, our Shepherding team led the kids through an incredible curriculum written and produced by Associate Director of Children's Ministry Lori Robinson, which she designed to give kids the space to voice their own concerns about the world. The groups first talked about what they heard in Large Group, and then they learned to do Spiritual Practices, like creating a sacred space or making prayer beads, that would give them tools to grapple both with the daily Big Question and with the questions that they might have themselves.

We were joined in this effort by kids and staff from two other churches: Hillside Covenant Church in Walnut Creek, led by Director of Children's Ministry Cheryl Garlick; and St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in Danville, led by Associate Rector Susan Geissler O'Neil. We believe the

Bay Area is stronger when we partner together with other churches, and we were thrilled both to be able to share this curriculum with their kids and volunteers in Small Group and to have them create their own videos for our Large Group sessions. Overall, we served 130 kids and 26 adults over three churches – an effort made all the more impressive by the fact that we pulled everything together in less than six weeks' time.

Altogether, the program helped kids navigate a broken world by remembering that God loves everyone, no matter what. We have made the curriculum and the videos we produced available for free to the community and to other churches at LOPC.org/virtual-vbc. When I am asked about why I treasure the monthly Companions gatherings here at LOPC, my answer is simple: I come away from each month's meeting feeling closer to God with a greater awareness for how he can impact my life. And with that realization comes a better understanding for how God is transforming me into the person He intends for me to be. I have learned so much about listening and the powerful impact it can have on my life and others. It is a skill I have taken into my everyday life that has changed, in a positive way, how I see, hear and respond to others.

Companions is a contemplative program intended to provide people an opportunity to intentionally slowdown in order to experience, see, and feel how God might be working in their lives in a small-group environment. It allows each of us to explore the Word of God in the Bible with others in a way that gives us insight into whatever might be impacting our daily lives! Some would say it is countercultural. It differs from a regular Bible-study program in which one learns to better understanding the meaning of the stories; rather, it invites us to listen to scripture to hear what words or phrases might attract our attention that day. It differs from a social gathering in that we aren't trying to figure out how to 'fix' each other's problems.

Rather, God is encouraging each of us to notice something unique going on in our own life. The Companion's confidential process lends itself to making the time and space to reflect on whatever might come up for you. Then, in turn, it helps to develop a closer relationship with each other and our Creator.
