Atfaluna

Atfaluna provides education for 250 deaf children and serves more than 5,000 hearing-impaired people and their families annually through its speech pathology and clinical audiology programs as well as community outreach activities. To accomplish this, Atfaluna provides a variety of services including early intervention and diagnostic testing, speech therapy, sign language, and academic education, in addition to providing hearing-aid repair, vocational training, and counseling services.



Children of Faith Missions

Children of Faith Missions provides a secure home and valuable education to more than 120 vulnerable school-age children in Visakhapatnam, India. Many of the children come from broken homes and are at risk for living on the street if not for the home provided by COF. Most are in the care of extended family, are orphans with no parent present, or are semi-orphans just one. COF provides shelter, nutrition, health care, and a Christian-based education to all the children it houses.

You dropped off vital cleaning supplies; our youth wrote wonderful notes of inspiration to their staff; you thoroughly cleaned and organized several of their housing units, turning them into welcoming homes, in preparation receiving traumatized families; you purchased much needed supplies for their housing units; and you rebuilt their outdoor garden area to create a peaceful and beautiful setting for their clients. And your generous donations allowed us to continue to financially support their very effective programming needs.

A big thank-you goes out to all of you who were willing and able to help STAND! during what has been a very difficult time for all. Your efforts were so very meaningful and significant to the staff at STAND!, as well as the victims of abuse they serve.



journey of aith

r. Patrick Chen remembers a mission trip to Mexico when he was in high school as life changing. "Our youth group did outreach at local churches and parks. We developed a play that highlighted the gospel message, and I was cast as the lead actor. I'm an introvert without a performing arts background, so I was quite uncomfortable in this role. However, despite my insecurities and lack of talent, I observed how audiences responded powerfully to the message. I felt an overwhelming sense of gratitude that God gave me the privilege to do his work and serve."

Patrick continues, "Since my experience in Mexico, I have had a passion to work with Spanish-speaking communities. Currently I am a primary-care physician in a clinic dedicated to serving Spanish-speaking patients. I feel this is part of God's plan for me to make a positive impact with my colleagues and my patients.

Patrick began his faith journey as a member of a strong Christian family with loving parents and two older brothers. "All of us went to church every Friday night and Sunday morning. My parents frequently served as both leaders and teachers at church. I feel very fortunate that I was surrounded by such positive role models."

While a freshman at Cal, Patrick found another calling. "I had the heart to encourage the various campus Christian fellowships to support each other and work together. I felt that

unity was something Jesus truly cared about, especially in such a challenging environment as Cal. I quickly learned that some fellowship leaders felt threatened by this idea and became critical and suspicious of me. It was hurtful and disorienting to experience believers attacking each other. However, we persevered, and the unity movement gained momentum quickly.

"By my sophomore year we earned commitment from eight campus fellowships that sent representatives to meet weekly to support one another in our common goals. Our mission statement was to open the hearts of our individual fellowships to what God was doing in the larger church by sharing prayer, praises, and promoting each other's outreach programs. We officially established the campus group, Unity in Christ, which still functions with its original purpose twenty-seven years later.

"Also in college, I had the opportunity to volunteer on the mercy ship, Anastasis, in Eastern Europe. I was assigned to be a galley cook. In my off-hours I joined the healthcare outreach teams and spent time learning from the medical missionaries. I felt how rewarding it was caring for people holistically. It was powerful to meet believers from all over the world coming together for a common purpose."

The Chen family became members of LOPC in 2018. "My wife, Patty, and I were truly touched by LOPC's warmth and friendliness toward us

and our three daughters. Patty is a rheumatologist at Kaiser Oakland. My daughters are Noella, 8, Adalyn, 6, and Kaia, 4. We feel very safe raising our children in this nurturing community.

"I am grateful that I have been elected to become an elder, and I want to help others find faith, family, and a home at LOPC. Another group that I am happy to be in is the Monday night men's group. It is a great bunch of guys who care about each other."

As to his vision for the future for himself and LOPC, Patrick says, "It's an increasingly challenging and complicated world, and it's easy to feel lost. I hope we continue building up our community so everyone can feel like friends and family. I still feel strongly about supporting unity in the church and promoting peace in our community. As a primary-care physician, I feel the challenges daily of working in this world with my colleagues and patients as I try to live out my faith."

A Season of Care

oyfully, this event took place in person on October 23 for A Season of Care retreat with Ray Campton, MFT, entitled "In the Valley of the Shadow: The Spiritual Impact of the Pandemic." Participants shared their reactions to the pandemic including fear, powerlessness, weariness, isolation, and undefined anxiety. Possible antidotes included focusing on what we have with gratitude, relaxing to let life unfold at its own pace, truly listening with love to others to the point where we can articulate their positions, and taking time for considered perspective about life and community.

Multiple kinds of loss were identified such as material, relationship, dreams,



roles, and abilities. Some primary losses also generated secondary losses such as a widow being uninvited to couples' gatherings. Grief happens when we accept loss while also reinterpreting life so that the positive value of the lost person or object survives.

We need to allow ourselves to lament and then remember that God's mercy is new every morning. It's a life-long process to learn enough about our inner workings to build integrity and live authentically to God's purpose. When we ask for God's help, we can take small steps, such as giving back to the next generation, meeting outside with neighbors to create a new community, and learning how to minimize racial and judgmental tendencies. If we recognize that we are God's beloved and there is nothing we can do to change it, we can learn to accept that every single person is also God's beloved. Slowing down enough to saturate ourselves in God's overflowing love will help us become the people we were created to be, bringing God's kingdom more fully into the world.

Financial Update

ristly, the Finance Team thanks everyone for their contribution this year of time, talent, and treasures to make LOPC the church it is. The finance team wants to let you know that as we roll into the fourth quarter, we are very fortunate to be in a very solid position financially.

We ended the third quarter with a surplus of \$60,482, well ahead of budget due to unbudgeted income from the Employee Retention Credits (ERC). The credit flows from mandated government pandemic restrictions that directly impacted LOPC in the amount of \$329,809. This surplus is offset by pledge income which is ahead of budget offset by lower non-pledge and loose offering giving.

Special Gift funds of \$80,285 were deployed ahead of budget to various local partners, including Contra Costa Food Bank, Congo, Disaster Relief, Harbor House and Sojourner Truth, Habitat for Humanity, as well as for pastor education and Livestream worship enhancements, offset by a refund and lower-than-expected deacon spending.

Our staff continues to be great stewards of expenses. September year-to-date expenses totaled \$63,544 over budget, which included deployment of \$80,284 in special gifts expense. Most ministry areas are trending at or below budget due to delays in spending related to the pandemic. Expenses included the replacement of the failed Sanctuary sound system and a new pastor camera, which is to be funded by the Foundation.

LOPC is well-positioned as we enter the final 2021 quarter with the benefit of the ERC offset by a \$59,896 budget shortfall for Seedlings 2021 school year, due to the impact of government restrictions. 2021 non-pledge and loose offerings are forecast to be significantly below budget for the year; however we are forecasting the budgeted faith component to offset this.

We are grateful for our staff and faithful congregation during the past 18 months. If you have already pledged and given, thank you. If not, please consider a pledge and know any contribution is greatly appreciated.

Giving from IRA's May Offer Seniors Tax Advantages and the Ability to Give More to LOPC

There are many ways to give of your time, talent, and treasure to LOPC. As seniors, we found that recent federal income tax law changes provide an even more tax-efficient pathway for our giving from our IRAs.

Seniors may now benefit more directly from these recent federal tax law changes because qualified contribution deductions directly reduce adjusted gross income. We are now able to increase our pledging because of these new income tax benefits:

Higher standard deductions are available to all taxpayers, which increased concurrently with limitations on certain itemized deductions.

New qualified-contribution deductions are available to taxpayers who are required to take age-related distributions from their IRAs.

Suggested next steps:

Confer with your tax advisor to learn if it is advantageous to fund your LOPC giving out of your required IRA distributions.

Contact your IRA custodian to arrange for your qualified contributions.


Derek Farnung & Courtney Keefe
