sometimes we need a GOOD RAINSTORM

California's recent rainstorms have been a welcome sight! Our drought may still have longterm impact, but the rain was truly a blessing.



In 1977, I moved to Pasadena, California, to begin my seminary

education. Then, there weren't sufficient laws or guidelines about exhaust fumes, so it was often very smoggy. On high-smog days, an alert was issued warning those with respiratory problems to stay indoors. The smog was so bad I had no idea the San Gabriel mountains were outside my back door because I couldn't see them! That is, not until a rainstorm and winds cleared the air, and there they were -- not very green, but still beautiful!

Rainstorms can be dangerous, but also helpful. Sufficient rain, the good kind of rain I call it, nourishes our planet. It keeps us human beings alive. And there are heavy rains that cause damage and unearth all the junk which needs to be cleared out. I liken it to the "storms" we face in life. Our life challenges will stir up things that have often settled, and we've been only too happy to simply ignore. When things begin to surface, however, we must do our best to remove the debris that obstructs the health of relationships and the good we can do.

I appreciate the gospel's account of Jesus asleep in the boat as his disciples not only try to stay afloat in a storm but keep their wits about them. I think the disciples remembered this event the rest of their lives because it must have been quite the storm to terrify these seasoned fishermen. Besides remembering their fear, they also remembered the composure and confidence of Jesus as he calmed the storm. If Jesus could help them through one of the fiercest storms they faced, Jesus could help them weather any storm.

As individuals, and collectively as a church family, we've had to weather quite a few storms recently, and it appears there are more to come. Let's lean upon each other. And let's be open to the changes we need to make in our lives, getting rid of obstacles which prevent us from living with hope, grace, and love.

Over the past two years our mission work has been central to how we have responded to the needs of our community in the middle of a pandemic. Last year, while sheltering in place, our congregation rose to the challenge of making an impact while staying safe. In fact, part of our service last February led our congregation to receive the Rosie-Mullen Award for exceptional volunteer support at Stand! Poppies

he Poppies students (24 to 36 months) and teachers were busy during December! They did numerous art projects in just a few weeks, including painting big trees as a group and using various materials to make ornaments and gingerbread people. Teachers Miss Mari and Miss Meghan said, "When the Poppies create art, they are also working on strengthening their fine-motor skills. For example, students strengthen their skills while peeling stickers and placing them on their papers, while holding paintbrushes, while squeezing glue bottles, and when picking up beads or jewels.

"The students also enjoy circle time very much, [which is] a time when the children often share what they would like to do or sing." The teachers reported that other fun included monthly themed yoga (December's yoga theme was 'Winter Animals') and movement songs such as Reindeer Pokey (just like 'okey Pokey'). In December, students especially loved singing "Old Mac Donald had a Christmas Tree."

n one of the upper-age classrooms, teacher Dawn and her four-and fiveyear-old students have been learning about Community Helpers, and talking about what careers the kids want to have when they grow up. The Tulips have also been learning about fire safety and firefighters.

In December, the Tulips finished their "Star Student" project and continued their Alpha friends curriculum.

For the holidays, the Tulips first celebrated with a Halloween party followed by a Friendsgiving Feast, and they finally wrapped up the season with the annual Pajama Day hot cocoa movie party.

Jenny Barnett Champion's memories of her faith journey go back to her junior high days. "I absolutely loved the junior high program. The leader, Tim Mooney, was really cool. We learned about the Bible through music. I remember singing 'King Jesus is All' and loving the inclusiveness of the junior high crew. That was how I built my faith as an early teenager. I felt like I was part of something bigger than my tiny self.

"Faith, in my estimation, is a combination of spirituality and having love in your heart. That leads to having compassion for people who are not like you and for people who don't have the resources you have. I was influenced in my faith journey by my parents at an early age as they were both very active at LOPC. Currently, my mom [Sandy Barnett] is a deacon."

Indeed, Jenny has been a part of LOPC since she was a baby. She has a special place in her heart for the cupola in the Chapel as her brother, Christopher James Barnett, died as a baby and the stained-glass windows there were placed in his memory.

She says one of the biggest reasons she continues to be a part of the church is the focus on service and mission. "It's important that LOPC supports so many organizations and provides resources and funding to people in need in such countries as Zimbabwe with Mama Stella and the children, or meals for those in Contra Costa County through the Monument Crisis Center. We have bins always ready to be filled with essentials for them.

"Since mothers are really important to me, as are children, anytime I can be involved in service with them I look for a place. LOPC's Children's Ministry program is outstanding. My daughter loved Vacation Bible Camp and the reminders we get every month on 'virtues' and how we can carry those into our lives."

Jenny is concerned about the current state of our world and the difficulty people have experienced because of the pandemic, including so much personal loss. "As I go out into the world, one of my beliefs is to try to be empathetic for people living on the street. Although for some it's not popular to engage with people who are homeless, from time to time I bring water or a few dollars when I go into Oakland or San Francisco because I always encounter somebody who needs something. Whether it's small or big, showing them you care when they are down and troubled can help them know that not all hope is lost."

Knowing it is important to be involved, Jenny is glad that IOPC offers so many opportunities. "Jesus would be happy to see the work we do shining through our congregation. My most cherished memory with my daughter, Stella, was serving families through Winter Nights Shelter. We prepared a meal and

had conversations with the children living at our church. Kids were simply playing with kids, and it was special to see them bonding without any previous friendship.

"Our Family Ministry Team, led by Pastor Jaime, spearheaded a book drive twice through Super Stars Literacy, whose mission is to disrupt the cycle of poverty. It was an amazing success. Our community stepped up and donated thousands of books for children in Alameda County. While I appreciate serving people in other countries, it is important to remember that people in need are not far away from the LOPC campus."

Speaking of Stella, Jenny says her daughter worked with Youth Director Allison Kunz and Children's Ministry Director Ryan Timpte last year to create a sermon around Jesus and the Good Samaritan. "I believe she tries to live her life as a person who cares for others. Her time at LOPC has helped teach her that, for which I am grateful."

Jenny's favorite Bible verse is Philippians 4:15, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." "It seems God magically appears in my life when I really need Him and gives me courage to face the world when I am scared and questioning why the world is sometimes upside down. God's love is everlasting. When we know He is going to be there for us, we can face any challenge with an open heart."

What is Per Capita?

Der Capita is a Latin phrase that means "for each head". We use it to refer to an annual fee that our congregation pays to higher levels of the Presbyterian Church based upon the number of active members in LOPC. For 2021, the Per Capita amount is \$38.00, or \$76.00 per couple. We encourage members to make an extra contribution to help defray this expense in addition to their other gifts.
