## lenten BLESSINGS

<sup>44</sup> It's the most wonderful time of the year," is not the song refrain that people share as we head into Easter or celebrate the season of Lent. Lent tends to carry a more serious tone and focus, than the joy of a baby and gift giving.



Lent is an important season in the church calendar. Preparation leading up to Easter can remind us of the importance of Easter as well as the remarkable events of Holy Week that conclude Jesus' earthly ministry.

#### But...

Lent also can feel holy, really holy, and we can feel as if we don't know our place in the season of Lent. We are separated by the life and teachings of Jesus as well as the events of Holy Week by more than 2,000 years. So, why is this arguably the most-important season of the year as Christians?

Because the events of this season remind us that God works through the ordinary—ordinary things, ordinary people.

Jill Duffield, the author of this year's Lenten study book *Lent In Plain Sight*, writes:

"Often it is in hindsight that God's providence becomes recognizable and events previously considered mundane become evidence of God's presence and work in our lives. The question for us becomes: Do we have the eyes to see God's near presence?...Will we open ourselves to the holy not only in heaven but also on earth and right in front of us? Can everyday objects remind us to stay awake and pay attention?"

Lent has saved you a seat. I invite you to join one of our Lenten study groups to discover what holy things God is up to in what seem to be ordinary around you in your life.

### MISSION Atfaluna Update

A tfaluna Society for Deaf Children in Gaza City, Palestine, empowers children with hearing disabilities of every faith to have a fulfilling life through preschool, education, rehabilitation, advocacy, vocational training, and employment opportunities. LOPC has been a partner and supporter of Atfaluna since 2003, helping build relationships with our brothers and sisters in this part of the world.

The Atfaluna School has an average enrollment of 170 students annually, ranging in age from 6 to 17. Most of the children come from families below the poverty line, and many have additional disabilities. The curriculum includes hearing-loss rehabilitation (auditory training and auditory speech training) and a well-rounded general education curriculum. Class size is limited to no more than 12 students, allowing teacher and student to have close one-to-one communication. Atfaluna employs 137 permanent staff, 60% of whom are deaf. The school features:

- Development of special educational curriculum tailored to the needs of hearing-impaired students.
- Non-curriculum activities including library sessions, arts and crafts classes, and recreational field trips.
- Healthy meals for all students to mitigate deteriorating conditions in Gaza affecting most of their families.
- Social support and counseling for deaf children and their families.

Approximately 15,000 persons are served annually through a myriad of programs.



#### Early Intervention Program

This program works to guide and assist families of newly diagnosed children with hearing disabilities during the early critical days through individually implemented plans. The early intervention program consists of a group of educational, rehabilitative, and protective services offered to children with and without disabilities in need of extra developmental and educational assistance and is linked to early identification of problems or disabilities among young children.

#### **Atfaluna Inclusive Nursery**

Newly established in 2017, it offers the necessary healthcare, personal hygiene, and nutritional and behavioral guidance for 15 children with and without disabilities aged younger than three years.

#### Sign Language

Palestinian sign language is considered a cornerstone for deaf culture in Palestine, which helped establish their independent identity. Year after year, the language develops, carrying with it the history of generations of people with hearing disabilities.

The school's sign-language-training program welcomes all persons of the community, with special emphasis on family members of people with hearing disabilities and other service providers, including doctors, social workers, private and public-school teachers, police officers, and university students.

#### **Vocational Training Program**

The program offers short- and longterm training courses in a range of fields, including product design, sewing, embroidery, carpentry, furniture production, furniture painting, upholstery, painting on wood, pottery production, pottery paining, arabesque design, jewelry making, photography, fabric and rug weaving.

#### **Audiology Clinic**

The Audiology Clinic, which offers its services to the local community, employs audiology specialists in evaluating and diagnosing hearing problems and hearing-aid fitting.

#### **Community Center**

The Community Center provides technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) and building employability skills based on local market needs.

#### **Crafts Production Unit**

The crafts production unit includes carpentry, sewing , embroidery, pottery production and design, painting on wood, and rug and fabric weaving.

#### Hygiene Kits for Harare Children's Hospital Are Needed

Children's Hospital in Harare, Zimbabwe, is striving to gather hygiene kits for its young patients during their stay. It is the country's sole children's hospital with over 250 pediatric beds available for seriously ill children. Most of the patients come from rural areas, and a parent often stays with them in the hospital.

Anyone interested can help out by purchasing supplies listed below and assembling care kits. The kits will be delivered to LOPC's mission partner, JF Kapnek Trust, which will ship them as part of a larger-relief container to the hospital. This is a great hands-on project for a family with kids to help other kids a world away.

#### **Hygiene Kits for Pediatric Patients and Parents**

All contents should be placed in a gallon size Ziploc bag.

- Adult toothbrush
- Child toothbrush
- Travel size tube of toothpaste
- A full-size bar of soap, preferably Dove or similar
- A travel-size container of shampoo
- A travel-size container of hand sanitizer
- A simple get-well message or drawing

The congregation enthusiastically responded to *love does* this year by working at home assembling breakfast and hygiene kits and polar-fleece blankets, as well as in the community at two LOPC mission partners: White Pony Express and the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano Counties. The focus of *love does* this year is helping those agencies that are classified as "essential" and therefore must support the community 365 days a year. Both the Food Bank and White Pony Express fall into this category and rely heavily on volunteers to accomplish this feat. Similarly, organizations like the Trinity Center and Operation Dignity support those experiencing homelessness and benefit from the breakfast and hygiene kits that were made.

Additional *love does* opportunities focused on helping children. The 70 polar-fleece blankets that volunteers finished will be delivered to Calico and given to sexually abused children for comfort and support while testifying against their abusers. LOPC youth focused on helping newborns by sorting and packaging gently used baby clothing for Loved Twice, which distributes them to hospitals and clinics for low-income mothers throughout Oakland.

## Racial Equity & Engagement Team Survey Results

A s part of the Racial Equity & Engagement Team's charge from session to examine and strengthen justice, equity, diversity, and inclusion work at LOPC, the team invited the congregation to complete a survey addressing interest and top priorities in the areas of social justice as they impact racial equity.

Thank you to all who have responded. As of January 31, there were 186 responses. You may still complete the survey at lopc.org/racialjustice. Paper copies are available at the front desk in the Ministry Center.

Respondents marked their top three choices from a list of nine areas. Education, Housing and Voting Rights garnered the most interest.

Three major choices plus a space for Other were given. Engagement/service with racially diverse communities was first, followed by Education/Speakers about racial justice; third was Advocacy on issues that primarily affect racially diverse communities.

The team is conducting interviews with a sampling of respondents for greater understanding and depth. Based on this information, opportunities for the congregation to work with community partners will be forthcoming.

Tom Welte's faith journey has been one of adventure. When Tom was a teenager, he, his parents, and three siblings took a trip around the world an amazing thing to do in those days, and maybe even now. "It was a life changing trip for all of us," Tom says. "It really inspired me to go into the Peace Corps in later years after seeing all the hunger and poverty in India, Thailand, and the Arabian Peninsula."

Fast forward, and on his first date with Mary, he found they both had a passion for joining the Peace Corps. It took four years, but they married in the spring of 1968, and by fall, they were on their way to becoming volunteers. They went to Louisiana for language training where they shared a one-room cabin with three other newlyweds. "There were no doors on our 'rooms' nor bathrooms. Plaster-board partitions part way up to the ceiling separated us. One could call this quite a honeymoon trip!

"We flew to Malawi, completed our final month of training, then took a two-day bus ride toward Mponela, where we would live and work for the next two years. The bus driver let us off in the middle of nowhere, but after a few minutes several young boys arrived and motioned for us to follow them. We walked through six-foot-high grass and soon came to a clearing. They had taken us to the office of the headmaster of the school."

The Weltes were pleasantly surprised by their living conditions, which might

not seem all that good to most but were good for Mponela. "The building was cinder block. There was no gas or electricity, but we had running water in the bathroom and kitchen. However, we had to boil and filter all the water before drinking it because of widespread disease there. We cooked with a wood fire and relied on two kerosene lamps for light at night.

"During our time there we felt we were carrying out the vision of Matthew 25:40: 'And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, inasmuch as you did it unto one of these my brethren, even these least, you did it unto me.' God wants our lives to be filled with mercy, love, and compassion. This was our way of doing that for the impoverished people of Mponela, Malawi."

Tom joined the board of directors for Friends of Malawi on his return. It's a non-profit group which provides financial assistance to the people of Malawi for their welfare, health, and education.

Growing up, Tom remembers his family worshiping at a large Lutheran church in Long Beach, California, as the beginning of his faith journey. "The six of us sat in one row, and I remember it as a very formal, ritualized process. However, the youth group, led by Associate Pastor, George Johnson, was a different story. He had an engaging way with the youth and used stories to bring God's and Jesus's messages to us. He became

an important person in my life in later years when he contacted us wanting to learn about our experiences in the Peace Corps. We were intrigued by his church's global interest and focus on social justice issues and joined there. In later years, I traveled around the Los Angeles area with George to raise consciousness about social justice issues."

Other influences on Tom's spiritual journey were observing the spiritual lives of people of all faith traditions. "Early in my adult years I read all I could about Mahatma Gandhi. I was intrigued by the way he integrated his Hindu faith with other faith traditions. Now I'm looking forward to getting involved in the interfaith efforts at LOPC with our Muslim and Jewish community members. I believe we can learn so much from others.

"My faith journey also has been enhanced by the numerous opportunities LOPC has offered to get out into the community and work with others, to improve all our lives. It helps us see the world through other people's eyes and better understand their concerns.

"I especially remember when LOPC had meetings with members of Oakland's Allen Temple Baptist Church. We were to meet alternately in their church and ours. Members of Allen Temple shared their concerns that they would be pulled over by the police in Orinda, because they didn't 'look right.'

That brought a new awareness to me in the realm of social justice, or lack thereof."

Tom adds that he and Mary participated in several mission projects through LOPC, working to rebuild homes destroyed by tornadoes or fires in Moore, Oklahoma, Joplin, Missouri, and Weed, California. "We sometimes had the opportunity to work alongside the homeowners and learn more about the harrowing experiences they'd endured. Again, we hope they felt our Christian love and compassion."

In his adventuresome life, Tom has stepped out all over the world to put his faith into action – a lesson for all of us.

For Tom's favorite Bible verses, he chooses Matthew 5:3-12, the Beatitudes.

#### **Financial Update**

We are truly fortunate and thankful for everyone who has given of their time, talent, and treasure to LOPC this past year. LOPC is blessed to be in a strong position financially, after another very difficult year. The Finance Team has had a challenging time, but also a rewarding one. The LOPC staff has done an incredible job. pivoting to hybrid programming and reallocating our resources to meet the needs of the congregation and our mission partners. We are truly thankful to have a great staff in the way it has used our resources.

Overall, net income came in strong with an \$80,947 surplus. Total income was \$3,816,773 and exceeded budget by \$340,175. Congregational giving was \$171,499 stronger than planned. LOPC also received unbudgeted Employee Retention Credits from the federal government of \$329,809, which were used to offset some one-time expenses. Because of the higher income, LOPC was able to cover an unexpected loss of (\$59,896) for Seedlings, related to the pandemic, and didn't have to draw on the Session Emerging Needs Fund of \$110,505, which was originally budgeted to supplement income shortfalls.

Expenses of \$3,735,826 were higher than planned by \$259,228. Mission giving and expenses were stronger by \$97,068. Personnel and Worship expenses were higher than budget, related to several transitions in 2021/2022 and the impact of the pandemic.

Our congregation generously contributed \$195,663 for the Faith Component as well as \$175,771 in higher Pledges, both of which helped LOPC finish in a solid position to start 2022 and allow us to do more in all areas of our ministry
