BELOVED of God

Back in October of 2020, in the middle of the pandemic, I was happy that we could hold a memorial service for my mom, although it was on Zoom. It felt intimate though, because I was able to see people's faces, and it felt like they were all in my living room! But I still wanted the opportunity to have my family be together in person to say goodbye to mom. So, I purposely kept mom's ashes at her home and made plans to return to Honolulu when it was more open again. I had that chance this summer when about 50 of my relatives gathered in the beautiful Hawaiian Memorial Park to lay my mom's ashes in her final resting place here on earth.

I wasn't prepared, however, for the task of finalizing the words that would go on her headstone. It felt almost monumental, choosing just the right words that would be inscribed for the rest of our earthly existence. It took me until the last day before returning to California to settle on the words: "Let love and faithfulness never leave you." That was mom, a person of godliness, love, and faithfulness. She lived with those virtues till the very last breath.

I was also able to choose a phrase that would encircle the flower vase which will be permanently installed at the graveside. I chose the words: "Beloved of God." This, too, is what mom was and always will be, beloved of God.

Do you know that you are the beloved of God? Not only know that intellectually, but do you feel that deeply in your soul? That identity, stamped upon our spirit, is what gives us the courage and the strength to live out our lives with love and faith. When we forget that we are beloved, it can shake our faith, and it can test the love we have, not only of God but also of others.

I wish we were out of the pandemic and completely safe, but we are not. Challenging days are behind us, and challenging days still lie ahead. Whatever lies before us, however, remember that you are loved. In fact, you are the beloved of God. Your identity is secure. Knowing this then, let love and faithfulness never leave you, and live thoroughly and courageously into them.

JF Kapnek School Supply Update

hank you, again, LOPC! In the past few years when presented with the opportunity to help The JF Kapnek Trust, our Mission Partner in Zimbabwe, LOPC has generously responded. Two years ago, Cyclone Idai caused tremendous flooding, claiming over 600 lives, and a cholera outbreak ensued. Kapnek was asked by the national government to help with the health assessment. Last year, COVID disrupted delivery of the daily nutritional porridge to preschoolers, but Kapnek found a work-around while schools were closed. (Under normal circumstances, Kapnek serves porridge at its preschools for three cents a day per child to more than 22,000 children.) In each instance, LOPC has given generously to help Kapnek manage through a crisis.

This time, it wasn't a crisis but simply an opportunity. In mid-July, LOPC

learned that the Kapnek Trust was preparing a container of medical supplies to be shipped from Oakland in mid-August and had room to add pre-school supplies. When the LOPC community heard of this opportunity over 60 families responded with a range of school supplies which Kapnek will distribute at the Harare Children's Hospital and in Kapnek preschool classrooms through their Early Childhood Development and Health program. Local high school students volunteered to help pack the massive response of the supplies for shipping. High-schooler and LOPC member, Dillon Morrissey, commented, "Books and school supplies are things we take for granted here, so it felt good to pack and send those things to kids who really need them."

When word about the shipment went out, an LOPC member solicited donations from friends. In this instance,

the friend was a retired audiologist from UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital and familiar with the value of hearing aids to help language growth needed for learning. Facilitated by Kapnek staff, a series of communication exchanges confirmed that there were Children's Hospital staff available to help screen children for hearing loss, help fit hearing aids, and follow up to ensure improved language skills were attained. With this knowledge, a donation of 20 sets of hearing aids with care kits and batteries to be included in the container shipment.

The range of generosity of school supplies, packers to prepare materials for shipment, efforts to confirm skilled audiology technicians, and ultimately the donation of hearing aids is a wonderful reminder that the LOPC community expands beyond its buildings at 49 Knox Drive.

LOPC to Host Winter Nights Family Shelter

Winter Nights Shelter (WNS) is a traveling homeless shelter that moves among faith communities throughout Contra Costa County from September to May. Many of its clients have explored all options of staying with family and friends and rely on the Winter Nights Shelter program to provide a temporary home.

Every year, LOPC hosts families on campus in the fall for two weeks and provides meals, tutoring, and other activities, with the help of LOPC volunteers. As many probably remember, last year due to Covid, LOPC was unable to host clients on campus but partnered with Walnut Creek United Methodist Church, providing meals during their two-week stay.

This year, we look forward to having the Shelter back on campus for two weeks and will need volunteers to help. For the safety of all, both volunteers and clients will be required to be fully vaccinated. In addition, everyone will be required to wear a mask per County guidelines.

Food Bank Needs Your Help

Many things have changed in the past few months -- opportunities to shop, eat in restaurants, attend church, and kids returning to school. However, one thing remains the same: there is still a great deal of food insecurity in our community.

While the number of people being served each month has dropped from the highs of winter, the Food Bank still sees 240,000 additional people in need each month – 80,000 more than before the pandemic.

Most of the clients are food insecure, or on the brink of it, and continue to bear the brunt of hardship. Many seniors, for example, live on fixed incomes. Others in need have been displaced by the wildfires. The Food Bank is responding by sending ready-to-eat food, water, and kitchen-free boxes. In fact, it has already shipped more than three truckloads of food and water to fire and drought-ravaged regions. Key partners working with it include Feeding America, Raley's, and other partnering-distribution organizations. These partners work to ensure the Food Bank's response can be quick and will provide the most-needed items.

"Our greatest needs right now are donations and more volunteers. We urge you to talk to every group you are a part of – neighbors, friends, and family – and help us to meet the needs of hunger in our community," says a Food Bank official. You can learn more about the food bank at foodbankccs.org.

Primera Iglesia Presbiteriana is **Building Bridges**

ne definition of a bridge is a structure erected over an obstacle allowing the obstacle to be crossed. The LOPC Primera bridge is not made from concrete or steel, but instead from care and concern, and from friendship, spanning two sister congregations. It is a symbol of prayer, generosity, and concern for the Primera Community, and has grown over time to serve the needs of the community.

The Food Bridge

Begun in May 2020 between the two congregations to provide tangible assistance in the form of food. Since then, more than six tons of food has been provided to the Primera community. The Bridge started by serving 22 families; now it serves 87. In June 2021, after significant lobbying, the Alameda Community Food Bank recognized Primera and its community outreach. Primera now relies on the Alameda Food Bank for the bulk of the food it distributes. The LOPC Primera Food Bridge is sufficiently funded to continue to supply food to Primera that isn't available from the Food Bank. Periodically, Primera will contact LOPC for a specific food item.

The Book Bridge

This past spring, LOPC asked Primera, "what do you need?" The response was that children in their community were struggling and had lost, from a bilingual-language perspective, a year

or two of reading fundamentals and practice. In May, we were encouraged to apply, on Primera's behalf, for a reading grant sponsored by the Oakland Literary Foundation. LOPC wrote the grant, submitted, and waited, but heard nothing. Last week, when Primera opened its church offices after many months, an envelope from the Oakland Literary Foundation was found



among the mail. Our grant request had been approved! Primera Pres was awarded \$1,000 to buy a book for each child in the Primera community.

In June, an LOPC member again asked how to help and was told of the need to have books to encourage children to read. In response, 12 new books were dropped off, and they became the start of the Children's Library at Primera! There is now a hybrid project that will provide a book for each child and eventually complete the Children's Library on site at Primera.

LOPC will continue to work with the Oakland Literary Foundation for advice on book titles specific to Primera's needs. The rest of this year and the beginning of next will be focused on building a Children's Library at Primera, initially for kindergarten to third grades, then fourth to sixth grades, and finally sixth to eighth grades.

In addition to children's books, LOPC has been providing volunteer tutors to work with Primera children on reading skills. Currently nine tutors from LOPC meet with children once or twice a week online. The project is wonderfully rewarding for all, and more tutors are needed. A tutor needn't be bilingual or speak Spanish at all! Anyone interested in helping may contact coordinator Robyn Dean at r2dean@ sonic.net.

journey of Haith


Cyndy Jacobsmeyer's faith journey story demonstrates the power of prayer in many situations in her life. The most recent involves Cyndy and husband, Jake, and a trip they took to Australia.

The day before we were to leave for home, we learned one couple in our group tested positive for Covid-19. Then 19 of the 20 tested positive. Two were hospitalized, and Jake's was the most severe case. He was in the ICU for 20 days, 12 of those on a ventilator fighting for his life," Cyndy recounts. "When he called to tell me he was going on life support and could no longer talk to me, I started praying to God harder than any time in my life. For a couple of weeks, news got worse. A blessing was when Peter Whitelock called and prayed with me. I had never felt God's presence as strongly as then. I knew God was with us.

"My sprits lifted when a friend sent me Psalm 56:9, 'The moment you pray, the tide of the battle turns.' While I was alone, I never felt alone. Prayers were coming to me from all over the world. Then on Good Friday, while listening to Joy's violin playing 'There is a Balm in Gilead' the phone rang. The ICU doctor said, 'I have some good news; the tube is out, and Jake is breathing on his own.' For this I thank all the wonderful people at LOPC and for all the love and prayers. Prayers work and God is good." For this we all are thankful!

Cyndy says her strong faith was initiated by her mother, a woman of deep Christian faith, which stemmed from a great grandparent, a Mennonite pastor. Her family was Presbyterian, and she and her two sisters were baptized in that faith.



The test in her faith came when she was in grade school and her parents told her they were divorcing. "I started to cry but Mom said, 'Have faith. God has us in His hands, and everything will be okay.' And it was. My mother remarried, our stepfather adopted us, and we moved to Las Vegas for a fresh start. In seventh grade, attending a youth group and Sunday School, I was inspired by my teacher explaining to us



the mystery of Jesus being the Son of God and being God coming to Earth to 'straighten us humans out.' At least that was what I heard as an 11-year old."

After college in Reno, Cyndy made several moves, always seeking a Presbyterian church and joining. "I never doubted God's presence during those years when many do. In my late 20's, I discovered First Presbyterian Berkeley with the outstanding pastor, Earl Palmer. His sermons struck a much deeper chord in me, and I realized I'd been going to church but really hadn't studied the Bible. I began to dig deeper, thanks to his sermons, and to build a closer relationship with God. I volunteered with Young Life and began daily prayers that weren't just for something I needed or wanted but praying for others in our world.

"Then came a move to the East Bay where, through the Singles Group, I was introduced to and joined LOPC. With Peter's sermons, his knowledge of the Bible and history to go with it, I got closer and closer to God. While I didn't meet Jake in the Singles Group, we were married at LOPC 32 years ago. Jake was raised a strict Roman Catholic and had never even been in

a Presbyterian Church before. We started teaching the Godly Play program, which strengthened our faith, and one day, after about 10 years, Jake said he wanted to join LOPC officially. Another answer to prayer."

Still another amazing answer to prayer was to come. "We wanted a family together and after nine attempts, we were able to adopt our daughter, Kelsey, 28 years ago. Our faith in God continued to strengthen with the miracle of her in our family."

The Jacobsmeyers wanted to give back to LOPC because of all they had gained from the church. Their first opportunity came when Barbara and Dick Abel, LOPC members, told them, "Chairing the all-church retreat program at Mount Hermon is easy." "We laugh about that today. Maybe it wasn't exactly easy but certainly rewarding." Cyndy has served as an elder to the youth, and Jake has been a deacon. They found these experiences "powerful and meaningful."

Cyndy concludes, "The power of prayer in my life grows every day. I am thankful to God for listening to my prayers and sending me his grace in listening to them. For my Bible verse I choose one I say daily in my morning prayers, Psalm 118:24. 'This is the day which the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it.'"

This year the LOPCided Quilters are celebrating their 20th Anniversary. The group was started by Franki Kohler with just a few members. The original focus was providing quilts for children at the Bay Area Crisis Nursery. In the beginning, members brought their own fabric and equipment. Gradually, through generous donations from the church and others, we now have sewing machines, fabric, and batting. We also have a wonderful storage closet to keep all our supplies.

After 20 years, members have come and gone, but two charter members, Marietta Champlin and Ann Gimbel, are still active. It's a wonderful group, mostly women, who help each other with quilting designs and techniques and support each other in life. We laugh a lot.

As the group grew and more quilts were completed each year, their mission expanded to include the Layette Project, Winter Nights Shelter, and several other groups based on their needs for children's quilts. The first year, 23 quilts were

created and donated, and as the group has grown so has the donation total. Currently approximately 200 quilts a year are being donated.


Spiritual Direction at LOPC
