



Warm Winter Nights

November 5 - 19

Every fall LOPC commits to hosting Warm Winter Nights, a traveling homeless shelter which runs from October to May annually, sponsored by the Interfaith Council of Contra Costa County and 17 faith congregations. This program is vital to our community, as homelessness increases and affordable housing becomes scarcer in the Bay Area.

The shelter serves homeless families with dependent children. Homelessness is defined as having no access to traditional or permanent housing or finding temporary or occasional shelter in cars, on the street, in places not meant for human habitation, or even staying on a rotating basis with friends or relatives.

The shelter provides homeless families with a clean, safe and warm place to sleep at night and support programming during the day. Participants either go to work or receive resource services at the Oasis Center in Pittsburg while their children attend school. All participants must be clean and sober, comply to behavioral standards and work toward self-sufficiency and permanent housing. This shelter meets key needs as families struggle to transition back into permanent housing.

LOPC will host Warm Winter Nights this fall for two weeks from November 5 – 19 under the leadership of Jim Reiter and Rick Silvani. There are opportunities for LOPC members to help in a variety of ways with meal preparation, tutoring, entertaining or playing games with the children while their parents do laundry or simply take a moment for themselves. Small groups, Voyager Ships, Bible study groups, and families are all encouraged to serve a meal together. There are opportunities to help serve dinner Monday – Sunday or a hot breakfast or lunch on Saturday or Sunday. Additionally, tutors are needed Monday – Thursday and entertainment including crafts, games, therapy pets and sports activities are always welcome.

Evolution from Creation to New Creation

October 15, 7:15 p.m. Oak Room



The title of this program is also the title of a book by Ted Peters, a recent speaker at LOPC, and his friend Martinez Hewlett, a biologist and emeritus professor at

the University of Arizona. Many of the topics central to the Science and Religion discussion are connected with creation (What has God done?) and evolution (What has God been doing? What is God doing now?). Consideration of these questions is part of creating a theology of nature, including Divine Action and the issue of God's relationship to Nature.

Following the authors of Evolution from Creation to New Creation, we will consider the programs put forward by several scientists and theologians on the subject of Theistic Evolution. Included in that discussion is consideration of the position and role of humanity in the ongoing process of creation and the development of the natural world. In particular, we will consider the ideas of theologian Phillip Hefner, who writes of how we are "Created Co-Creators," in respect to God and the natural world.

Journey of Faith

After losing her husband, her home and becoming an empty nester, all within a year, Ibis Schlesinger was confronted with this question: how does one create the life one wants when your world has fallen apart?

"I had come to Lafayette because I had fallen in love with

a wonderful man, John James. Now he was gone," she says. "My life became like the book of Job. He, too, had lost everything he loved. Yet, his faith remained strong. Mine did too. I was determined to create a new canvas with my life. With faith in God and determination, I believed things would turn for the good. But they became more challenging. It wasn't only me -- the world was going crazy. I had to make sense of what didn't make sense. I had to ask questions about God and faith and why bad things happen to good people.

"It wasn't right and I didn't know how to fix it. I went for hikes. My soul found joy when contemplating the ever-changing facets of the Lafayette Reservoir, Tahoe, mountains and lakes and oceans in distant places. When my heart cried from the harmony and beauty, I knew God was real and only the artist in God could create such magnificence. It brought me peace.

"Thankfully," Ibis says, "LOPC has become like my second home. Our people are people of mission and action; our pastors are not only bright but also compassionate, and each one brings a uniqueness to fill our souls with human faith."

Born in Guatemala, Ibis went to an experimental American School. "As I look back, it was probably where my education in diversity and faith began. My schoolmates were Christians, Jews, evangelicals, atheists, Catholics. Our student body had students from Germany, South and North America, Europe and, of course, Guatemala. In our classes we were encouraged to debate difficult topics, participate in music, sports, languages and mission projects. But I didn't realize our school was different. We never discussed tolerance; we learned it. I am thankful for this interfaith experience. Currently, I am a member of the LOPC interfaith group. Its work and understanding of faith and tolerance are crucial for community and world peace."

"Because of the mission emphasis at LOPC and the work it did in Guatemala I started a non-profit called Ties To The World. Our mission is to help orphanages become self-sustaining. Having to support myself, I started a women-owned business, GG2U and Associates. We sell safety supplies to utilities and corporations. This year I was given a scholarship at the Stanford Graduate Business School Latino Entrepreneurship. The mission is to help Latino businesses and prove they can grow and make the USA economy stronger.

"I believe what Peter Whitelock says, 'Love is action.' So I want to follow where my faith leads me, showing me how to put it into action. I am still working on creating the life I want. I try to live in the here and now. It is all we have. The past is gone and the future is always a mystery filled with hope."

When The Time Is Right....

Timing is everything. The time is right. Perfect timing. So many common phrases describe how important timing is in our lives, and so it is also with the LOPC Foundation. The time is approaching when the Foundation determines how much financial support it will be able

to commit to the church next year to supplement the operating budget and planned maintenance.
