
The Answer to Bad Religion is Not No Religion!

65,000 - More than 65,000 pastors, church staff, and lay leaders have attended a Leader's Training Course, where Stephen Leaders are equipped with the knowledge and tools they need to lead Stephen Ministry back home. At LOPC a team of six leaders plus our Care Pastor Gerald Chinen administer our ministry.

600,000 - Stephen Leaders have trained more than 600,000 Stephen Ministers in their local congregations since the ministry began in 1975 – and that number continues to grow every year. Our congregation is served by approximately thirty active Stephen Ministers and well over 100 have been trained over the years.

Millions - Millions of hurting people – congregation members and people who have no church home – have been blessed by the care and support of a Stephen Minister. Over 200 people have received care from the Stephen Ministers at LOPC over our 14 years of service to this congregation.

Warm Winter Nights Warming the Hearts of Many

Tents occupy one half of Lafayette-Orinda Presbyterian Church's Fellowship Hall. The other half serves as the dining room. The entire building is used as the Fireside Room is where tutoring takes place while they can play games or just relax in the Davies Room.

"We want this to be as near a home-like place as possible," says Teri Lundvall, on-site supervisor. "Each family having a tent to call their own is a great step up from when there just used to be sheets hung to partition spaces. The guests do form a community, even though they move from place to place, and that's important. I feel it's my responsibility for our families to build relationships, with me, and with each other. Also, I want them to know I'm here for them 100%. I was in the program in 2004-2005. I think this gives me a real perspective on what these families are going through now. I believe most all our clients are intent on bettering their lives. If we give them a hand up now, they can master the tools to lift themselves out of homelessness."

Resident, Ursela R., works part-time at St. Vincent de Paul and is in a training program which teaches her work skills, how to write a resume, and will help her find a full-time job. Her husband is now working for a friend on a remodel job but has applied for a carpenter's apprenticeship and says, "I want to move up in the world."

Though they have housing and food, it's not an easy life style. The families get up at 5:30 a.m. weekday mornings, eat breakfast, pick up the lunches they prepared the night before, and at 7:00 a.m. they all head out in the program's van - the parents to job sites or classes, while all the children are taken to the schools they regularly attend. Returning sometime after 5 p.m., children do homework with volunteer tutors. At 6:30 p.m. dinner is served by church members, who cooked the food, and then they eat with the guests. Lights out at 8:30 p.m. A volunteer from LOPC sleeps there during the night in case there are any problems which need handling.

Warm Winter Nights is a project of the Social Justice Alliance of the Interfaith Council of Contra Costa County. They can provide services for 30 people. These include, a warm, safe place to sleep; tasty meals; friendly volunteers; daytime service center; showers; laundry; case management; budgeting and parenting classes; tutoring for students; and van services to schools, bus and BART. Bedding is provided and a professional staff sees that the shelter is supervised 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The program runs from October to May. Faith communities from throughout the area serve as hosts.

"We don't just look at those families as homeless but as those with aspirations," says Bill Shaw, program manager. "We're trying to lay a foundation so when they leave here they have a better sense of purpose of what they can do to move forward and stay out of this rut."

Robin Freeberg, who oversees the program at LOPC says, "Each year we look forward to the arrival of our guests on the LOPC campus and the opportunity to serve and build relationships with those whom we often overlook in our community. When we do run across these neighbors it is often hard to know how best to help. Warm Winter Nights gives us an opportunity to serve them in a positive way, using our gifts to 'love God with all of our heart, mind and strength, and to love our neighbors as ourselves.' NAEYC Conference

Sometimes in life, opportunities arise that have the ability to enrich both your life, and the lives of those around you. Recently, the Seedlings staff experienced such an opportunity, as they traveled to the annual National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) Conference in Los Angeles. NAEYC is a professional membership organization that works to promote quality early childhood education. Seedlings director Coleen Moulton has described the NAEYC as, "the largest and most influential organization working on behalf of our nation's youngest learners."

This annual conference is an exciting event where professionals and specialists come together to focus on how young children develop and learn. Here they share ideas for best practices, network with professors. discuss current issues, and learn about the most cutting edge approaches in the field of early child development. At this year's conference, the Seedlings team joined over 10,000 other educators from across the country. This group of dedicated teachers was able to learn from the many notable presenters and workshops that were available to them. At the conference, there were over 500 sessions for our teachers to choose from. With 20 Seedlings teachers present, they were able to attend 100 sessions! Some of the Seedlings staff's favorite sessions were: "Using Loose Parts with Infants and Toddlers to Promote STEM (Science Technology Engineering Math) Concepts," "'My brain is full of ideas!' Unleashing young children's creative thinking in an exciting learning environment," and "Promoting Kindness & Empathy by Developing Skills that Benefit All Children." It was a truly informative and collaborative environment, where our teachers learned so much, and were also able to share their invaluable ideas and experiences with their fellow colleagues.

As Coleen Moulton, Director of Seedlings Preschool, has shared with our Seedlings community, "Studies have shown that educators who stay up-to-date on the latest research in child development are best equipped to make a difference in the lives of the children they serve and their families." The Seedlings staff makes a difference in the lives of our children each and every day. This experience was a chance for them to enhance their own professional lives, while they continue to foster our children's optimal learning and development in their amazing classrooms. Many staff members have said that their experience in Los Angeles was all that they hoped it would be, and so much more. Sunflowers teacher Noelle Isenberg told us, "The entire experience was electric and with every session and speaker, there was something unique which spoke to my heart. It's a powerful energy when you get so many like-minded individuals who care so deeply about what they do together. You leave with the power to change the world, one classroom at a time." At Seedlings we are so fortunate to have a staff devoted to enriching the lives of our children, one classroom at a time.

Atfaluna School for Deaf Children Early Intervention Program Year 2 for Sanctuary Funds



One of the beneficiaries of the three-year Sanctuary Funds program is the Atfaluna School for Deaf Children in Gaza because it provides sanctuary to those in need. In 2016, your generosity enabled LOPC to send \$10,000 in support of the

school's "Early Intervention Program", as a sanctuary related project.

Specifically, in the Gaza Strip, disabled persons, including the deaf and hearing impaired, belong to the poorest of the community. Due to the present political conditions, local government is only able to provide very limited social welfare services such as education, psychosocial and health care for young deaf children ages 0-5 years.

In response to the lack of services for deaf young children, Atfaluna Society for Deaf Children (ASDC) has developed and implemented a comprehensive Early Intervention Program throughout Gaza. It includes deployment of specialists to conduct home visits once a week for each deaf child for one year to provide emotional and social support. The goal is to help the children develop language and communication skills,



assist parents to deal with their deaf children in the home environment and to help parents, especially mothers, to understand their child's hearing loss so that they are better equipped to raise, support and communicate with their deaf young children.

Children between the ages of 3 and 5 receive in-home education sessions focused on cognitive, creative, social and communications activities. The program also provides sign language and finger spelling training for parents.

Finally, the program includes a social work intervention component, including home visits and family counseling. This addresses the importance of a positive, enabling family environment, and to combat stigmatization and the lack of acceptance within the family and broader community.

The school recently reported that "within weeks following the commencement of the program, improvement was reported in both the deaf children and their mothers:

- Over-active children began to concentrate for longer periods during the sessions.
- The children began to use some signs to express their needs and their feelings.
- Mothers were taught how to handle their deaf children and how to better communicate with them.
- Mothers were completing home activities with their children as requested by the early intervention social workers.
- Better understanding between mothers and their children were noticed.

Sanctuary Fund Update - Children of Faith Missions



Five percent of the total contributed to the Sanctuary Renewal project was earmarked to create "Sanctuary" for several of LOPC's mission partners. As a result of the generosity of the congregation during the Sanctuary capital

Program of 2015, LOPC donated \$40,000 to Children of Faith Missions. Fulfilling the intent of the funds to provide Sanctuary, the money will be used to build a much needed third level to the previously LOPC funded boy's dormitory.

The third floor will provide sleeping space for 20 of the oldest boys at Children of Faith as well as a common room for recreation and devotional time. In addition, the third floor will offer additional bathroom space complete with tile flooring, and ceiling fans and windows for ventilation. The dorm currently houses 60 boys in a space designed for 40.

The addition of the third floor will not only ease crowding, but free space on the second floor for a "computer" room and study space where the boys can use computers for research, and work collaboratively on school work. The roof of the addition will be accessible to the boys, providing additional outdoor space for them for study and leisure. The roof also serves as a "utility platform" for the fresh-water tank.

The work has begun and photos have been sent documenting the progress. The third floor will not only help the daily challenges of space for 60 boys but will provide living space for LOPC high school students who will be serving the orphanage in 2017. The international high school trip is scheduled for July 15-31, 2017. Sixty-five students and advisors will visit Children of Faith Missions and continue to deepen the relationships that have developed as a result of the last trip in 2014.

Trauma Healing in the Congo Showing Results

At Easter time, the LOPC congregation generously donated funds to initiate the training of facilitators to implement a trauma-healing curriculum for children devastated by the violence in the Democratic Republic of Congo. The training took place in August, and since then, 28 facilitators have been working with groups of children throughout eastern Congo.

The facilitators are required to send in reports on their progress. The LOPC Congo team recently received some of the reports. We have been impressed with the commitment of these people, the detail of the reports and the progress that has been made to help heal the children. As part of the training, the children are encouraged to write their feelings. Below are some examples from the reports.

One child writes, "I am an orphan that has been left behind by my father and mother. I am very sad to see that I have no father and mother. And I pray for healing of my heart and that God may continue to bless these teachers who continue to help us and to heal the wounds of our hearts."

A girl of 12 years old, Emerance Kanyere, has lived through a sad moment when houses in her village were burnt down by rebels in an ethnic conflict. Because of the fact that she saw this happening with her own eyes, the images often come back, wherever she is and at any time. This is affecting her intellectually and psychologically, and her school results have since been poor. It was in lesson three, during the demonstration of what happens when we keep our feelings inside, that Emerance involved herself. She took one of the facilitators aside and only then shared about the events mentioned above. From that moment on, she started to regain herself again. Once arrived at lesson 9, Emerance decided to forgive the rebels."



Lori MacLeod says having moved numerous times, which can make life difficult, she found the best way to make friends and to feel a part of her new community has been to join a church.

Raised a Presbyterian, that's the place she headed. She said, "I've found each church community to be welcoming and a help to me in my

continuing faith journey. They are 'rocks' which have nurtured me. My mother taught me to get involved and contribute and that's good advice." When Lori and her husband, Tommy, moved back to Lafayette, where Lori was born, they set out to find a church home. She explains, "My mom said, 'I think there's a church that has Mother's Day Out.' There was, LOPC, but by that time it had grown into the Seedlings program. We attended LOPC and from the moment we set foot there we felt at home."

After being on the wait list for a while in the fall of 2008, Anna was admitted to Seedlings Preschool and Lori has been involved ever since. Lori explains, "It's a place that has a remarkable administration and staff. There are state of the art classrooms. Twenty of the 23 teachers attended a conference of the National Association for Education of Young Children, which is the premier organization for this age group. They learned the latest techniques to apply at Seedlings, yet still manage to keep the feel of a small, loving community."

A Seedlings program of which Lori is very proud is Wonder Time. Begun about three years ago, headed by Bobbi Cassettari, it is the faith component of Seedlings and is focused primarily on the 3, 4 and 5-year-old students. Meeting weekly, it's different each time. The first Tuesday is called "Big Wonder Time" as all three groups gather in the (big) Sanctuary to sing songs and learn about a specific virtue for the month, such as honor or respect. The following weeks of the month, in smaller groups, they continue to talk about the virtue of the month, but also discuss feelings, joys and concerns, and ways to participate in mission and outreach projects. Lori now serves as an Elder, representing Seedlings.

Journey of Faith

"It's difficult to know when my faith journey began as my family always went to church. I received many perfect attendance pins while in Sunday School," Lori remembers. Her great grandmother laid the cornerstone of their Presbyterian church Plum Creek in Pittsburgh, PA. When it was rebuilt, her grandmother laid that cornerstone too. Her grandmother became one of the first women elders.

Lori remembers, "My mom, Margaret Ann Fowler, taught Sunday School so she has had a lot to do with teaching me about God, Christ, and their love for me. So, it seems like I've always been on this journey. I think attending a Young Life Camp in North Carolina was a special time when we talked about a personal relationship with God. I guess I'd never really thought about it before, but I realized He was someone who was beside me all the time and knew everything about me, and no matter what, He loved me. I'm still in touch with the man who was the leader there as he was a big influence in my life."

A graduate of Vanderbilt University, Lori moved to San Francisco where she was a member of Calvary Presbyterian. "I remember asking for a meeting with my pastor to talk about my relationship with Christ because it didn't seem as strong as it once was," she said, adding, "He explained it was a dynamic relationship, ever changing and I should look for new ways to grow. I've found this good advice and have certainly discovered many ways to grow through programs at LOPC, and my association with the church community. It's also been a remarkable place for my children, Anna, 10, twins, Jon and Oliver, 8, and Teddy 5. Anna is in the choir and the middle school program, FUSE. The boys attend Kids' Rock and Vacation Bible School is important to them. They love the church. Sometimes I think almost too much as they are comfortable here and run around like it is their home." Lori looks forward to going on mission trips when her children are older.

Concluding, Lori says, "For me the best way is to learn about Jesus, the life he lived, and try to follow Him." Bible verses that are important to Lori are: Philippians 4:5, "Let all men know your forbearance, and Philippians 4:9, "The Lord is at hand. What you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, do; and the God of peace will be with you."

Another Kind of Harvest - Part Two

These are exciting times for the LOPC Foundation. As Trustee Kristi Haigh wrote in the December issue of "Another Kind of Harvest," with a fiscal year that ended September 30, now is when we learn how our investments fared during the prior 12 months. And that determines the size of our financial "harvest" to help support LOPC's operations. Kristi went on to explain how the whole harvesting process works during the fall months. If you didn't have a chance to read her piece, I commend it to you.


What she couldn't include in the article, because of the Focus deadline, was the actual size of the "harvest." Now the results are in, and the amount is \$205,000! That's approximately 10 percent higher than the prior year, a bountiful product, by any measure. (In addition, unspent amounts from the prior year will swell the total Foundation 2017 contribution to an estimated \$269,000.) Since Kristi wrote, the Foundation Trustees have had the opportunity to meet with the staff and Session to hear about their ministry hopes and plans for 2017.

Those meetings produced an exciting list of more than 40 different opportunities where Foundation assets can be put to use this year (2017).

During the next few weeks the Trustees will be sitting together, going over that list, praying, choosing, and hopefully discerning, where the Holy Spirit wants to lead LOPC in the months ahead. Our November Session meeting proved to be a reminder of how alive and in the world LOPC strives to be. We heard an inspiring update from Lauren Gully on her recent trip to Guatemala to confer with our mission partners in that country. Our outreach there provides hope for families who live and work in the Guatemala City dump, clean water for families that live at Lake Atitlan (Amigos del Lago) and vocational skills for kids who learn about photography through FotoKids. She shared with us the great work that International Justice Ministry (IJM) does to rescue girls and young women from abuse. This work got launched in Guatemala with a substantial donation from our church several years ago.

These examples of just some of the many ways LOPC strives to reach out and serve the community provided a good segue for updates from our Stewardship Finance Teams. Our Stewardship campaign is off to a very promising start. The Finance Team reported very productive meetings with our LOPC working teams as they continue to develop next year's budget. This will be presented at our December meeting with a goal to finalizing it at our first meeting in January. Although budgeting is always challenging, the response to our Stewardship campaign holds promise that Finance will be able to produce a budget that can continue the high commitment to outreach that LOPC has traditionally set for itself.

Peter reported about the ongoing efforts that he and other members of the staff are pursuing to build bridges to connect our church community with other faiths and ethnicities. Given the divisiveness of the months of the presidential campaign there was a consensus that pursuing these opportunities was very important. We look forward to hearing more as these opportunities unfold.
