


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A Spiritual Journey of a Life Time

As you read this, I will be in the middle of my sabbatical. Initially, it was scheduled for the summer of 2015, but was postponed until now. As luck would have it, the timing could not have been better! My family and I will be able to attend the International Festival, which is only hosted every five years for Okinawan decedents from all over the world.

Part of my sabbatical was to get in touch with my roots in Okinawa, where my maternal grandparents are from. They hail from the Uruma City in Okinawa and immigrated to

Hawaii in the early 1900s. I've also had an interest in seeing the Christian faith from the Okinawan as well as the Japanese perspective. Christianity is believed to have been introduced to Japan in the 16th century, but just recently in Okinawa, Roman coins with the likeness of Roman Emperor Constantine were discovered in the ruins of Katsuren Castle, which existed from the 12th to 15th centuries. So, it may be possible that the Christian faith was introduced to Okinawa even before it made its way to Japan. You may recall from your history books, that Constantine's mother was a Christian and so her son followed suit!

I also plan to attend a Conference for Christians at a church near where we will be staying. The pastor of this church has invited me not only to attend the conference but also to preach at the church on Sunday morning. What a privilege this is. I will also be speaking at a church in Tokyo.

While in Okinawa, if time allows, my aunt and I will head to the City Hall of Uruma City to see if we might be able to find some history of my grandfather's family. My aunt has already done some research on my grandmother and has quite a lot of information about her descendants, but we have next to nothing on my grandfather. It has been intriguing speaking with my mother and aunt about our family history, and I have certainly been surprised at some of the things I've learned! Wouldn't it be amazing if we were to learn more about our relatives on his side?

Coming to faith at 12 years old, I began attending a Congregational Church in Honolulu. Of course, I didn't know it at the time, but much of my development in faith was very western and very European. There's nothing wrong with that mind you because I love our traditions and our worship. But I have often wondered how my own ethnicity and my cultural background could influence how I read the Scriptures or how I worship God. It will be interesting to participate in the church services in Okinawa and Tokyo. I wouldn't be surprised if things were very similar, but I also wouldn't be surprised if I learn something very new about our God through their songs, their testimonies and their worship.



Mount Hermon

Three-hundred members of LOPC, ranging in age from six months to 96, came together at LOPC's All Church Retreat at Mount Hermon to enjoy a weekend of relaxation, restoration and fellowship in early October. We worshiped together each day and then adults, children and youth attended their sessions, which aimed to help us grow deeper in our relationships with God and each other.

Our featured speaker was The Dr. Reverend Lillian Daniel, Senior Pastor of First Congregational Church in Dubuque, Iowa. Lillian, a well respected preacher, teacher and pastor, spoke about her latest book, Tired of Apologizing for a Church I Don't Belong To: Spirituality Without Stereotypes, Religion Without Ranting. In this book, Lillian explored the changing religious landscape, including the rising number of people who list "none" as their religious preference. Her encouragement in her book and during our sessions was to be a church that is rigorous, relevant and real. What does that mean? We, as a church, are called by Jesus to provide a place for rigorous study of the Bible and our traditions, while teaching why these traditions and our faith is relevant in today's world. Or in other words how does the work and teachings of Jesus matter in this currentworld? And how can practicing our faith through service lead to a more just world, inclusive of all of God's people? What does it mean to be a real

church? It means we actually talk about what is happening in the world and our own lives – both the joy and the painful struggles, everything from poverty to addiction to politics and the every day real stuff that makes up our lives. Many of the events at Mount Hermon were intergenerational and provided much opportunity for our members to enjoy time together. These times included Saturday afternoon outside where children and adults alike enjoyed barbeque, participated in ropes course, hiked and played games. Saturday evening highlights included the campfire where the staff skit taught us how the letter "P" in LOPC stands for Pokémon. We also delighted in a special dance one featuring Pastor Gerald Chinen, and songs, jokes and dances from our church members during the campfire. Wonder Time

Because of this, a goal at Seedlings has always been to nurture the spirituality and natural curiosity in our children. In alignment with this purpose, "Wonder Time," our Faith Formation program, was created. Wonder Time gives our children a special time each week to pause, learn, reflect, and share their wonderings together.


In recent years, Wonder Time groups (children ages 3-5, divided by class) have had a scheduled time each week in the Chapel. During this time, they join our amazing Seedlings Wonder Time Leader, Bobbi Cassettari, to sing songs, listen to stories, learn about virtues and mission, and to pray and wonder together.

New this school year, we will also have a monthly school "I wonder where my Spider-Man shirt is?"

assembly called "BIG Wonder Time." On the first Tuesday and Wednesday mornings of each month, teachers will bring their classes to the beautiful LOPC Sanctuary. There they will meet the Wonder Time Team: Bobbi, Children's Ministry Director, Ryan Timpte, Associate Director Lori Robinson, and Director of LOPC's Preschool Ministry Susan Wentworth. As Bobbi has shared, "The team will be there ready to lead our kids in fun songs, a Bible story to illustrate that month's virtue, and some simple mindfulness activities."

In Children's Ministry at LOPC, the children learn that a virtue is something that God gives us in order to change the world around us. We hope that our young Seedlings students will learn to be more aware of the incredible virtues in them, and in those around them. The virtue introduced at each month's BIG Wonder Time assembly will always be discussed in small group gatherings during the remaining weeks of each month. It is always a joy to hear the children's ponderings, both big and small. November's virtue is Honor: letting others know that you see how valuable they really are. It is certainly a fitting virtue for the Wonder Time experience at Seedlings. Our students learn to honor the wonderful teaching staff and community around them, and within this community, they also learn how valued they are.





Night in Bethlehem is LOPC's annual outreach event for families, from 4:00 p.m. – 7:00 p.m., during which kids and their families explore what a marketplace in Bethlehem might have looked like the night of the birth of Jesus. This interactive, intergenerational gathering is meant to simulate the intensity and chaos of a nighttime festival. There is no set schedule; rather, families are welcome to come and go as they please. While at Night in Bethlehem, they will encounter shopkeepers, Roman soldiers, and beggars, all of whom have gathered in Bethlehem in accordance with the Roman census – and maybe, just maybe, these families will catch a glimpse of the holy family whose journey to Bethlehem gives our own journey to this city all the meaning in the world.

Whether you're a shopkeeper running a booth, a census taker helping families sign in, or a helper who sets up and takes down the city, you are an integral part of our community. Through you, families in the Lamorinda area will experience a piece of the Christmas story in a real and tangible way.

Interfaith Women

"We ourselves feel what we are doing is just a drop in the ocean...but the ocean would be less because of that missing drop." - Mother Teresa

Meeting monthly with my Interfaith Women's Group has been one of the most significant parts of my spiritual journey during the last few years. As I have learned the basic tenets of my Jewish, Muslim and even Christian sisters' religions and listened openly to their personal spiritual journey stories, I have been able to go deeper into my own Christian faith and deepen my conversation and walk with God.

In July, our group discussed how our faith has blessed and brought light to our lives during hard times which then led to possible ways we could brighten the lives of other women needing a lift. We resolved to put a simple idea into action, and the result was exponentially greater than we imagined. Our resolve was to assemble 12 purses filled with toiletries, scarves, socks, make-up, and nutrition bars. and hand them out to 12 women without homes. A few of us asked others to donate supplies at the workplace or church, and we posted on just one "Next Door" neighborhood website. At our August meeting, we found ourselves surrounded by the generosity of coworkers and neighbors, as we assembled almost 100 purses with supplies left over to donate to shelters.

A wonderful "God Happening" began when we started to discuss how to distribute our assembled treasures. An especially enthusiastic member of our group determined that she wanted to give them to the women she passed by on her way to work, and she filled her car trunk with purses. The next day she was surprised and touched by the positive responses of the women she encountered who seemed grateful just to be acknowledged. Soon others in her office wanted to participate as well. Next, she was planning to ride along with a police officer to hand out more bags. The rest of us were inspired... realizing the personal connection can be as important or more than the gift itself, so we began to deliver the purses directly to individuals as well.

We are still basking in the glow of the generosity of others who helped us. We have also been blessed by interacting with "the other" and feeling the presence of God in the personal connection. We are energized beyond measure.

In November, we will extend this project both to further provide service/donations to our local homeless community and to offer opportunities for members of our churches, mosques and synagogues to join an interfaith activity that builds on our shared beliefs of supporting charity, repairing the world, and giving to those in need.

Journey of Faith

Lori Robinson is the new Associate Director of Children's Ministries. Here is the story of her Faith Journey. "I grew up in the rural town of Seymour, Indiana," she said. My grandparents were the founding members of the small All Saints Episcopal Church which was my spiritual home. In our small church, everyone had to pitch in to get things done. I spent

many Saturdays with my family at church mowing the lawn, cleaning bathrooms, mopping floors, polishing silver and washing linens. We worked worshiped and enjoyed countless potluck dinners at church. When there were baptisms, weddings and funerals everyone was there. When someone was sick or in trouble all the members rallied around them. So, my faith journey was shaped and formed by observing and participating in the communal care of one another and in worshiping together."

When she was 13 Lori had a life-changing experience when she took a trip with an Episcopal youth group to Haiti. "This was in the 1970s s during a time of political unrest in Haiti. I experienced for the first time what oppression and poverty looked like. Also, I met people who didn't look like me, learned about a culture very different from mine and observed soldiers with weapons on the street corners. What was truly amazing to me was the joyful spirit of so many of the people I met. People who had literally nothing found great strength and joy in their faith. I thought this was incredible and the whole experience opened my eyes to a much larger world of need which I had never realized existed."

There were the later teen years when she questioned her faith, "as only a teenager can. In my 20s I drifted from family, church, and community. I remember a telephone conversation with my dad after I moved to California when he asked me if I'd found a church community. I mumbled some excuse about being busy; the truth was I wasn't that interested in finding a church home.

close to God. After I met and married my husband, Ty Robinson, suddenly it seemed like the most natural thing in the world to find a church to attend together. I'm sure my parents were relieved. Somehow, my reflexive response to getting married was to reconnect with my faith. But, in hindsight, that's the way God has worked in my life, always present, very patient, waiting for me to catch up."

In her late 30s, Lori began to feel something was missing in her life. "As I began to explore what this was about, I prayed a lot. My prayer was really simple. 'Please God, show me who you would have me be.' As I continued to pray I also began to take steps into an unknown future. I went back to school and finished my B.A. I left a very secure and well-paying job to become a children's minister.

After ten years as the family minister at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in Danville, Lori has joined the staff at LOPC where she felt God had called her to be. "I put a lot of thought in the decision to come here and it feels very right for me. I hope to make a contribution to the excellent Children's Ministry program here and love working with Ryan Timpte and Susan Wentworth.

"In every transition my prayer has been the same, 'Please, God, show me who you would have me be'. Along the way I've learned that God invites me to be who I am in new, exciting, and sometimes scary ways. Although I prefer the comfort zone, the very best things that have happened in my life, including being here at LOPC, have occurred when I trusted God and stepped out in faith."

About her family, Lori says, that her husband, Ty, grew up in Pleasant Hill. They are the parents of a son, David, who is 23 and two adult daughters, Charlene and Christine. They also have three grandchildren, Sienna, seven, Ethan, four, and Sofia, two.

Lori chooses as her favorite Bible verse, "But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel. Do not fear for I have redeemed you, I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you, and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through the fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you for I am the Lord your God, The Holy One of Israel, your Savior."
