We believe everyone thrives when we come together in a community of faith, whether as a congregation or in a smaller group setting. We have a variety of groups to suit the needs of everyone. But all groups provide a meaningful and fulfilling way to serve others, develop new friendships and deepen our faith together.

LOPC's Fire Response

The deadly wildfires that ravaged Northern California left parts of Napa and Sonoma with scorched earth where homes and vineyards once stood. Many in the LOPC community know of someone that lost their home, job or even lost a loved one.

Our community responded to the devastation raising \$8,449 which will be deployed to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance to assist victims of the fire. In addition, Lauren and Robin delivered over 150 donated toiletry kits to Santa Rosa to be disbursed as needed to those that are suddenly without a home. We also visited Church of the Roses Presbyterian Church and were able to talk to their staff and hear their stories. They reiterated that financial contributions and housing opportunities are most needed and helpful as people rebuild their lives.

A prayer wall was erected with heartfelt prayers for recovery, strength and hope. The wall acted as a visible symbol of concern and love for the victims of the fires, first responders and those grieving the loss of a loved one.

- "I pray for the ones who have lost everything and are struggling to start over."
- "Prayers for those have lost family, friends, pets, homes, jobs in the fire.
- "Prayers for the first responders, dispatchers and support personnel"

As the days and months go by those who were affected by this experience will continue to need our help. There is currently a Presbyterian wide regional effort to find semi-permanent housing for those who have lost their homes. Year-end statements will be mailed in January. To insure the deductibility of your gifts, do not file your 2017 tax return until you receive this statement. Some of your gifts may not be tax-deductible if you file your tax return before receiving a written acknowledgement of your gifts to LOPC.

LOPC Foundation Finances Update

LOPC Foundation closed its September 30, 2017, fiscal year with \$9.9 million of invested net assets (also called equity), after deducting \$350,000 of commitments to LOPC. Net assets increased \$973,000, after disbursements and commitments to the church, due primarily to an extraordinary 13 percent investment return on three investment portfolios of 23 diversified mutual funds. The increase includes \$125,000 of estate and other gifts. Foundation trustees appropriated \$273,000 for church ministries, \$100,000 for the first installment of a three-year pledge to the Sanctuary Campaign, and \$71,000 for the Sanctuary projector project.

After additions and disbursements, net asset values of the Foundation's 10 funds and Facilities Reserve Account were:

*Restricted funds and account are available for grants for limited or restricted uses only, as designated by donors or Foundation trustees. The Facilities Reserve Account purpose is to provide funds for planned and unexpected facilities and capital equipment projects. An additional \$210,000 was set aside in the Account in fiscal 2017. You will hear more in 2018 about donor opportunities for legacy estate gifts and other gifts that will increase Foundation support of future church ministries.

Session Highlights – October 2017

As the leaves turn fall colors and drop and rains arrive, Session turns its attention to budgets, present and future. At our October meeting we were pleased to hear from the Finance Team that we were on track for this year's budget. This prediction is predicated on the assumption that pledges are paid as they have historically been, and that year-end giving is comparable to that of the past. We are also starting the budgeting process for next year. We are asking our various Ministry Teams to meet with our Finance Team to understand the goals and aspirations our teams have for next year and work together to support them. Session was also pleased to be able to pass a motion that would provide additional funding for the health-care benefits for our staff. This was done after a survey of other organizations to determine how LOPC compared. It was clear that for us to remain an "employer of choice" we needed to provide some additional support for our healthcare offering. This was passed unanimously. In the context of our budget discussions, this served as a reminder of the challenge to optimize the funding for our remarkable suite of programs and, at the same time, making sure we are supporting adequately our wonderful staff that can help make them happen. Session appreciates greatly the tremendous support that we receive from the congregation.

Spiritual Formation

Spiritual Formation emphasizes our openness and receptivity to God. The heart of Spiritual Formation is about deepening your connection to God. Spiritual Formation can be described in different ways because we experience our connection to God differently. Our diverse offerings range from the contemplative to the active, from the traditional to the current, and the spirituality discovered in nature.

We have often heard the call, "Give of your time and talents." Kristi Haigh has answered that call to the benefit of LOPC in many ways. "I often get tagged with the financial task because of my background, an MBA from Cal and a career in banking. Some of the times I've said 'yes' it has led me into paths I never would have taken and has enhanced my faith journey," she says.

Kristi says she stepped out in a new way when her husband. Art. was transferred to Moscow where they lived from 1998 to 2001. "We worshipped at the Protestant Chaplaincy which was supported by five denominations, including ours. There were many African students in the congregation who were trapped there as the Russians, who brought them over, no longer, supported them. They suffered a lot as Moscow was a violent, racist place and they were very often beaten on the Metro. I, with them, volunteered in the three soup kitchens the Chaplaincy ran, which fed 1,500 Russian pensioners a day. For them, and the Africans, too, who got to eat there, it was probably the only hot meal of the day. Being right there with these people who endured such hardship was such a different experience than I had living in Orinda. I wanted so much to help them. I did serve as bookkeeper working hard to keep money from the Russians in authority."

Looking back, Kristi says she's a lifelong Presbyterian, having been baptized in a Presbyterian church in Pittsburgh, PA, as a toddler and feels lucky that church has always been a part of her life. "My parents were involved in the church and we had a dynamic minister. Church was an exciting, fun place. All through high school it was the place to be and we were counted on.

"The high school group sang in church every Sunday. I love learning, history especially. So, thinking about how far back the Bible goes, the changes Jesus brought, and learning about how the church developed intrigued me." Kristi's college was Duke, where religion courses were required. "They were taught by great professors, Bible, Christian literature—fabulous!" It was there she met Art Haigh. After graduation he was in the Navy and was gone 12 of the first 18 months they were married. This was Journey of Faith

during the Vietnam war and he served four years. He then received his MBA at Tulane. A move to San Francisco followed. Kristi admits even though Art, too, had been raised in the church, they hadn't been going that often but they began to feel something was missing and realized they needed to get involved. That's when they became active in Calvary Presbyterian. When they bought a house in Concord they visited many Presbyterian churches and finally LOPC. That was it. Dr. Jim Little was the senior pastor with a great staff, and a fine children's program, which was important because Caroline and Emily were now part of the family. "Like many parents we got involved in whatever the children were doing. I remember teaching first grade Sunday School with Sandy and Doug Landin. We were junior high advisors. Art became an elder. I was asked to be an elder and my first-year assignment was for Youth, then Finance and Personnel the following two years."

The Haighs have a special spot in their hearts for the Atfuluna School for the Deaf in Palestine. "These children have such a bleak future without our support," Kristi says. The family also treasures the Kurth Memorial Garden. Kristi serves on its board and says she hopes LOPC members fully appreciate how wonderful it is. "My parents and Art's parents are there. It's a lovely place. For those who haven't walked through it, I recommend their doing so. Even if you don't have family members there, it is a tranquil place where we can think of all who have gone before us and give thanks for them."

Kristi now serves on the Foundation Board. "We are going through a long transition from being rather small to a bigger entity, but we are making progress in becoming and even better partner with LOPC to help it expand its ministries and missions as well as taking care of all the wonderful resources we have. It's a glass more than half full."

"I'm grateful I've been able to give back with my time and talents at LOPC," Kristi says. "Hopefully, we all will consider, what talent do I have to which I could give my time that will help our church in its mission to be 'Alive! In Christ...In the World."

Spiritual Formation

Christmas and the Incarnation: the Stories of Jesus' Beginnings.



Christmas trees, lights, presents, and, of course, a Nativity scene: all of these represent Christmas to American Christians. But how does each Gospel narrate Christ's birth? You might be surprised to know that only two of the four Gospels even include stories of Jesus as a baby.

Kathy Timpte, PhD student at Princeton Theological Seminary and adjunct professor at St. Mary's College of California, is teaching a series on unique introductions to Jesus. Each Gospel is intent on conveying certain themes about who Jesus is: King, Servant, God, Social Revolutionary. And each of these themes is central to how they chose to begin each Gospel.

Sunday, December 3, at 9:00 a.m. in Davies Room

The Gospel of Matthew: In Matthew, Jesus is deeply tied to a Jewish lineage, tracing decent back to Abraham and through David. Jesus is represented as the King, and also narrated to show his status as a second Moses.

Sunday, December 10, at 9:00 a.m. in Davies Room

The Gospel of Luke: Luke's Gospel contains most of the "Christmas Story" as told in Christmas pageants. Luke consistently focuses on God's promises being fulfilled through the Spirit. These promises are often given to unlikely and socially marginal people: women, and shepherds. Jesus is the great servant, born to help the outcasts.


