Hearing God's Call

"All who believed were together and had all things in common." Acts 2:44-45

During my senior year of college, I was really struggling to figure out where God was calling me once I graduated. I wasn't sure what I wanted to do with my life next and I didn't feel I had any real answers so I sought the advice of one of my favorite professors who had also been my mentor over the past four years. As I told her about my struggles, she took out a blank piece of

white paper and placed a black dot in the middle of the paper. She looked and me and said something along the lines of this – "Jaime, your biggest problem is that you are looking for a very specific plan and a perfect answer from God and you are missing God's greater call for you.

The call that is the same for everyone in the church – you are called to love the Lord your God with all of your heart, all of your soul, all of your mind and all of your strength. You are called to love your neighbor as yourself." She reminded me that no matter what I chose as a profession, as a Christian, as a follower of Christ, I was called to serve and love God through loving my neighbor in whatever path I chose – be it graduate school or a career. And that is where I should focus my heart and my work.

As we celebrate Pentecost, the commemoration in Acts 2 which marks the beginning of the church, I think about what my professor told me. So often, we as the church get so focused on planning for the church or the goals that lie ahead that we forget our call to serve God and our neighbors. Acts 2 reminds us of the ways people came together to serve others and go forth and minister after receiving the Holy Spirit, the gift that was promised by Jesus; the gift that guides and leads us in our ministry and our service to others. We all have different gifts which have been given to us by God, talents that we have cultivated and experiences that have formed us and make us unique.

As part of the Body of Christ, we are called together in this place we call church, bringing our diverse gifts and experiences, to serve our common mission as those who believe in Christ and hold our shared church mission in common – to love God above all else and to love our neighbor as ourselves.


A STORIED PEOPLE

Adult Mission Trip

Twenty-six members of the LOPC Mission Team traveled to Weed, CA for a second time to continue rebuilding work because of the Boles fire which occurred in September of 2014. 150 homes were completely destroyed along with the Catholic and Presbyterian Churches, the library and community center. They worked with the Weed Long Term Recovery Group and Siskiyou County Habitat for Humanity.

Pat "Oly" Olson, construction coordinator said, "It's people like your group coming to our aid that restores my belief in the inherent goodness of people." The volunteer coordinator, Brenda Duchi, added, "Your team's kindness and friendship is a treasured gift to the people of Weed. What you have given to us through your volunteering is immeasurable. It must feel great knowing you change people's lives."

Rich Lewis was again the team leader and was happy that he could bring along some very competent workers, who not only did a great job, but were there to help the less skilled learn how to do their jobs.

Gladys Schaible says, "Rich and Chris Johnson preceded us by doing all of the hard things, getting the posts, and gates ready so we could put up the slats. We really wanted to get the project finished, and on Friday Marty Lewis and I put up 188' of fence. This was so Shannon Kennedy, the home owner, could keep her dog enclosed, and her lot private. She had just purchased her home three days before the fire and because she'd paid cash, she had not yet gotten insurance. Shannon was always there with a smile and she kept walking around saying how blessed she was and how special she felt. You just wanted to do more for her."

"This was my fourth mission trip. The reason I started going, and continued, is because there are times that I feel I am stuck in my spiritual journey and that every now and then I need to step out of my comfort zone and allow God to stretch my faith. I know through these experiences God has something in mind for me to do. I do what I can for these families who have lost everything and it causes me to come back feeling blessed by their thankfulness, friendliness and the smiles they give us for doing the smallest little thing for them."

Rich remembers Shannon's joy when she saw the completed fence. "I love it when I look out and see the fence, and you added two arbors and a double gate—you do things right. I just love it to death," she said.

"I go on mission trips because I enjoy helping people and working with my hands. In the past I have been blessed many times by strangers or friends when I had problems to overcome," Terry Gleason explains. "This is how I can give back. I am always able to make friends on Mission trips—friendships that last. This year my crew of seven enthusiastic workers and I started to lay the foundation, setting forms and re-bar, for the future home of Lewis Powell and his family of four. They were renters in Weed and lost all their belongings in two different fires in the houses in which they were living. What a good feeling to be able to help them."

In all the group worked on five projects. Daniel and Sarah Casorlas will soon be able to move in their new home with the two small grandchildren they are raising. Jackie Brown's home should be finished by the time she finishes her cancer treatments. Shannon has her fence and the Powells expect work on their home to continue. The team also built a storage shed for the Grace Community Presbyterian Church. Again, this year, LOPC member, Ann Loar, made a quilt for every family and the coordinators. The good news is that soon all the residents affected by the fire have either had a home built for them, purchased a replacement home or moved out of Weed. The Weed Long Term Recovery Group will close their doors at the end of November.

The LOPC Adult Mission Team began when then Pastor, Janet Russell, took a group to New Orleans, in 2005, just a few months after their devastating losses. Then in 2006 Rich Lewis organized a team to go back to the area and he's been doing it ever since. Besides Rich, and his wife, Marty, Kathy Bradshaw, Bob Heaney have been on every trip. Places where they all have worked are in Mississippi, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Missouri and California.

This year Mike Kotrick and Rita Neill again journeyed from Wyoming to pitch in and Rick Frank came from North Carolina. Bob Heaney says, "Special friendships are made when you live together and work together for a week. Most of us have been on multiple trips and we're so happy to be together in the mission setting. These trips are an important part of my life. It's a trite saying, but I truly do feel I get more out of it than I give."

The group discussed why it is important for the U.S. to aggressively work to bring peace and stability to the region. We left a list of ways the Senator could help. We offered our services to provide more information as needed and the staff replied that such a relationship would be most helpful. We also requested a meeting with the Senator at some point.

India Mission Trip Update



Olivia Toth has been attending LOPC all her life. She was baptized here and has grown up attending the children's and youth programs. Mission has always been a central focus in her faith journey, as she has been able to truly focus on what is important and commune with God without distractions.

She has attended numerous mission trips over the years, and is very much looking forward to the India trip this summer. On July 15, Olivia will travel with 65 other students and adult volunteers to Vishakhapatnam, India, where she will serve for two and a half weeks at Children of Faith (COF) orphanage and school. Her sister Melanie went there in 2014 when the LOPC youth first visited, and Olivia was immediately struck by how much her sister's outlook on life had changed. "Something was different," Olivia noted. She had a greater appreciation and seemed more mature than she was before the trip.

Olivia has felt this type of culture shock before, when going to serve with LOPC in places like New Mexico and Salinas. She feels that this trip will bring even more of a change, and she welcomes the opportunity to deepen her faith. She is excited to build, to paint, but most of all she relishes the idea of connecting with the over 100 children and youth at COF. "Some of them will be older than me!" she exclaimed.

Olivia is nervous about potentially getting sick, but sees this trip as much bigger and more important than herself and her own comfort levels. Her favorite verse in the Bible is Matthew 25:40, where it says, "The King will reply, truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." This verse is central to her faith and her outlook on how she should live. "The whole idea of being a Christian is to be a servant. To serve people no one else wants to or expects you to," she says.

She can feel anxious and depressed when just she's focused on herself, rather than others. The pressures in school and life sometimes makes it easy it is to lose perspective on what God wants for us. She asks we pray that everyone involved on the trip will come to a deeper level of faith.

Journey of Faith

Robert G. Johnson, Jr., M.D., Ph.D.

Robert Johnson says the writings of Albert Schweitzer had a great influence on his faith journey—and his career path. "I started reading his writings when I began to devote my life to science and medicine and was looking for direction. As a physician, theologian and philosopher he wrote in a way that really spoke to me, and still does, particularly about 'Ehrfurcht vor dem Leben' –

'Reverence for Life.' He says the purpose of human life is to serve and to show compassion and the will to help others. He was also an accomplished organist. Perhaps that's why there is a pipe organ in our living room now, Robert says. He has his M.D. and Ph.D. degrees and is actively trying to live a life which exemplifies Schweitzer's teaching.

A native of Altoona, Pennsylvania, Robert says he grew up in a "hurting" railroad town. His grandparents attended Christ's Second Lutheran Church and were pillars there. "Their faith and life journey was an early influence on me. The church's theology was based on the Good News of the Bible mixed in with old fashioned fire and brimstone. In the summer, revival tents went up for a week. Catechism classes were serious business with lots of memorization. I did what was expected, Sunday school, church choir, acolyte, etc. – but didn't really connect." Robert explains that his initial faith journey began at a church camp where the staff/instructors/clergy were young, rigorous and had a love for Christ. "They made the teaching relevant to everyday life."

"My journey became more personal when I was badly burned in junior high, at a different camp. It was touch and go for a while, followed by many painful surgeries. I ended up missing over half the academic year. As like most kids of that age, I had not pondered my own death in real terms but while recovering I began to read a wide range of theological and religious literature. 'Where did I fit in the universe?', 'What was expected of me?' I realized that death, even at a young age, can be just around the corner.

"Around this time, another tremendous influence on me was a trip I took to the South. Seeing segregation for the

first time, particularly the inequity of it all made battling against inequities, and for equalities very important to me, then and now."

Robert attended the University of Pennsylvania for his undergraduate degree as well as his M.D. and Ph.D. His internship was the Massachusetts General Hospital, which is associated with Harvard Medical School. That's where Margaret Liu obtained her M.D. and began her internship the same time as Robert. They met, married, now live in Lafayette, and have two children, Matthew and Ariana. "Margaret has had an immense influence on me in her strong belief and faith in Christ and the ways she displays her faith in her daily life."

Fast forward to a few years ago when family began attending LOPC. "I'd been an elder at a local church, but was dissatisfied with the way things were going," Robert says. "I was very cynical about the established church, but found LOPC a breath of fresh air – relevant, inclusive. It is a church of action. The staff and congregation make a difference through every-day acts, as the focus is not just a Sunday focus. There are tremendous examples of individuals living their faith—amazing LOPC members, with loving hearts, who are out contributing to changing the world for the better. Being an active member has brought back my equilibrium and allowed me to regain my path toward entering the maturing phase of my journey of faith.

"Considering activities in which I have participated that helped me on my faith journey, I think of small groups, retreats, teaching Sunday School (you only really understand something when you try to teach it!), supporting mission initiatives, listening to sermons, and an active reading list. I am currently reading the 'Letter to My Congregation', by Ken Wilson and 'Soren Kierkegaard' by Joakim Garff. Continuing to work close to the hospital setting and recently dealing with my mother's terminal illness and preparations for death have also strengthened and boldened my journey.

I have many favorite Bible verses, but two of my dear are: "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." (Philippians 4:13) and "...the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control (Galatians 5:22-23) to which I add hope and forgiveness and recite to myself multiple times a day."

First Friday Forum

"Tough on Crime is not Smart on Crime" is the topic Judge Peggy Hora will present at First Friday Forum (FFF). Judge Hora retired from the California Superior Court after serving 21 years and is now President of the Justice Speakers Institute.

Judge Hora says, "It is clear that the 'War on Drugs' and 'Tough on Crime' initiatives succeeded only in increasing the number of people in prison in the United States. In the 40 years from 1970 to 2010, incarceration rates increased 700 percent. Alcohol and other drugs are the drivers for the vast majority of crimes. Drug treatment courts have a quarter century of research and experience to show that they are the best solution to the high-risk/high-need offender. These 'problem-solving courts' reduce recidivism and cost less to operate than business as usual."

A global leader in the solution-focused court movement, Judge Hora has written comprehensively on justice issues. She explains, "Drug courts that focus on solutions rather than punishment became my passion. I've done trainings all over the United States and I've taught all over the world. Throughout the 21 years I spent on the bench, the best part of my job was presiding over the drug court."

Raised in Oakland and Castro Valley, Hora began her education at Chabot Community College in Hayward after her youngest son started kindergarten. She then graduated magna cum laude, with a B.A. degree in political science, from Cal State, Hayward. She obtained her law degree from the University of San Francisco.

Hora is the former dean of the B.E. Witkin Judicial College of California and has been on the faculty of the National Judicial College for over 20 years. She was a Senior Judicial Fellow for the National Drug Court Institute and the Global Centre for Drug Treatment Courts. Her international work includes speaking at conferences worldwide and hands on training on drug courts in 12 countries, including Japan, Russia and South Africa. She is the recipient of the Bernard S. Jefferson Judicial Education Award from the California Judges' Association and the winner of the Rose Bird Award from California Women Lawyers. She was honored as Woman of the Year by the California Legislature.

"With her years of experience, Judge Hora is well equipped to discuss how 'Tough on Crime is not Smart on Crime' and ways she knows the court system can do better. Don't miss her lecture on this pressing problem," says Caroline Giers, FFF committee member. "Come at 1:00 p.m. for refreshments in Fellowship Hall." For further information call 925-283-8722.
