It was a few years ago now that we came up with the above phrase as an articulation of our LOPC vision regarding what kind of church we want to both be and become. A good mission statement is basically a promise to the larger community concerning our identity and engagement of the world around us as

people of faith. This statement has worked well for us, and I think it nicely captures the sense that we want to be genuinely faithful to Jesus Christ and serve others in his name.

After a few years, though, it's a good thing to circle back and review such statements. How are they holding up? Beyond that, a group of leaders at the church lifted up the idea that the language of our current statement might be familiar to someone in the church, but it could be confusing to someone outside the community. Can the essence of it be expressed differently so that the promise can be comprehended more widely and readily?

To that end, we've been working on capturing the stories and experiences that encapsulate why LOPC is unique, and words and phrases which express who we are as a community. Your staff and leaders are considering what kinds of ideas (even prejudices) people have about "church," and how we can simply state the essence of promise that we want to make to our community. We even held a leadership retreat to work on updating our mission statement earlier this year, so stay tuned!

At the end of the day, though, who we are is best communicated not through words, but loving action. LOPC is the kind of church where people are accepted as they are, diversity is respected, worship and formation are valued, people are cared for regardless of creed, mission abounds...and Christ is Lord. However we phrase it, that's worth celebrating!

# LOPC Finishes the Year in a Strong Financial Position

LOPC is truly blessed with the strength of its 2018 financial results. This is thanks to everyone who has given their time and treasures to the church. LOPC over the years has been very fortunate to be in such a strong financial position and we saw this again in 2018. We are truly blessed to have a faithful giving congregation, staff, and lay leadership that are able to carefully put these resources to work in our community in such a positive way.

I am happy to report that we exceeded income goals with the help of the congregation and were prudent with spending. Congregational giving was 5.3% higher than our goal and included higher Mission and Special Gift donations that can be deployed to our great mission partners. As a result of our financial strength, LOPC was able to give \$50,000 to Hope Academy, the school being built by our mission partner, Children of Faith. This, combined with pledges and other income, along with our ministry teams monitoring expenses, has allowed us to exceed our ministry needs with a \$25,894 surplus. We were able to continue to support growth in the Mission area, and Children's, Youth, Family and Seniors' ministries. The Foundation continued to strongly support LOPC with \$242,456 in funding to be used across all ministries of LOPC.

In total, income for 2018 was slightly higher than the budget, reaching \$3.5 million, \$81,634 more than budget. This was largely due to generous Mission and Special Gifts that will also show up as higher expenses as we deploy them to our mission partners. Pledges and the Faith Component totaled \$2.51 million, \$21,039 higher than budget. Non-Pledge Income, Loose Offerings, and other giving are all areas where we have seen strength, finishing 2018 \$59,514 better than budget.

On the expense side, we were higher than budget, but mainly due to the above-discussed higher Mission gifts we paid out. Expenses totaled \$3.47 million, \$55,740 higher than planned as a result of Mission giving, offset by positive management of expenses by the staff.

Overall, the net result is a surplus of \$25,894. This is a very fortunate position that we are in.

#### A Time of Rest for Pastor Jaime

One of the gifts the church has provided its pastors over the years is a sabbatical. It's a time to rest, study, and restore the soul. It's a way LOPC cares for its pastors and sustains them in their ministry. We provide a sabbatical for LOPC pastors every seven years of their ministry at the church for their first sabbatical and then every four years thereafter.

Pastor Jaime Poulson is entering her seventh year of ministry at LOPC. She will begin her sabbatical after Easter on April 21 and return to LOPC on June 8. Jaime will be in Europe for most of her sabbatical with the added blessing that her husband is on his sabbatical from St. Mary's College. Jaime will be traveling and studying the cathedrals and churches of France, Germany and Italy with her family joining the trip as well. Here is a little more about her study plans in Jaime's words:

During my Sabbatical, I plan to visit France, Italy and Germany while studying the lives of the men and women who have planned, built and created cathedrals and the religious art within these beautiful places of worship. A few of the sites I will visit include Chartes, Sainte Chapelle and Notre Dame, Reims Cathedral, San Giovanni Laterano - Cathedral of Rome (first church built in Rome), San Pietro in Vaticano, and the Cathedral of Cologne.

My intention is to understand the faith, circumstances and realities of the lives of these men's and women's everyday lives as they created places of worship and pilgrimage that have resonated with people of faith for many, many generations. I will read a collection of books about the lives of masons, architects, spiritual leaders, priests and nuns, townspeople and others who have contributed to the cathedrals and chapels throughout these countries in Europe. My trip will include studying how churches and the works of art within them can enhance and deepen our faith then and now (sculptures, stained glass, marble busts, wood carvings, etc.).

We wish them well on their adventure and look forward to hearing about her studies and travel at a 10:10 Class when Jaime arrives back home to LOPC. Thank you so very much for providing the time and resources as a congregation that make this season of renewal and study possible for your clergy!



#### Register now for the 2019 - 2020 Seedlings school year!

Seedlings will begin the registration process for the 2019-2020 school year this month. We are so excited to be moving into our 36th year of providing quality care for the Lamorinda area. This year we have served more than 115 families!

If you are interested in enrolling your child at Seedlings Preschool or know a friend who is, here are a few tips and reminders! Registration will be processed in the following order. Please read carefully for dates and directions that apply to you!

#### 1. Current Seedlings families

Currently enrolled families have priority for registering their children. After processing all of the currently enrolled students, their siblings (who are not currently enrolled) are then processed. Look for a registration packet coming home with your child in early February.

#### 2. Members of LOPC

Registration for current members of the Lafayette-Orinda Presbyterian Church (who have completed the required membership class and are currently in the LOPC membership database) will be on Thursday, March 7 at 10 a.m. in the Ministry Center Oak Room. Please look for signs on campus to direct you.

**3.** Families on the current (2018- 2019) wait list. (This wait list is currently closed.) A registration packet will be sent via email in early February.

#### 4. Community Members

Community members are those NOT currently enrolled in our program, registered on our 2018 - 2019 wait list (this wait list is now closed), or current member of the Lafayette-Orinda Presbyterian Church (LOPC). Registration for community members for our 2019 - 2020 Seedlings program will be on Thursday, March 21 at 10:00 a.m. in the Ministry Center Oak Room. When you arrive, look for "Seedlings Registration" signs. Registration will be on a first-come, first-served basis. As early as 8 a.m. a sign-in sheet will be put out. Registration will begin in the order of names on the sign-in sheet when there are eight names on it. Community members are encouraged to email the day before at seedlings@lopc.org to find out if there is available space.

- Space in all Seedlings classes is limited and may be filled by current Seedlings children and their siblings. - After the LOPC member registration on March 7, 2019, we will then slot in anyone who has turned in a Wait List Renewal form. Then we will enroll community members on Thursday, March 21.

#### **New Retreat Programming at LOPC**

Over the past five years, we have introduced more than 15 new programs at LOPC in different ministry areas. During this time, we also have been exploring new retreat ideas for our church community.

Based upon information gathered, our team of pastors, staff, and church leadership identified opportunities to enhance and expand our retreat programming at LOPC. We found that our church community desires new opportunities for transformational, cross-generational faith formation, and fellowship.

The Communion Table, Baptismal Font, plant stands in the Narthex, crosses and communion tables in church school classrooms, props for Godly Play—the list goes on and on—all demonstrate the ways Rick Burris has given back to LOPC by using his woodworking skills. "I grew up working with my hands and building things. But it was when I served on session and appointed to the Building and Grounds Team that I really became involved here. Right now my passion is getting the Love Does program off the ground. It involves taking the former One Sunday program to another level, finding projects for members to do year round that will help people. If members can't be present on the date for One Sunday, this will give them other opportunities. Steve Crocker and I are very excited about the potential of serving others who really need us, so watch for details this month about Love Does.

Rick recalls a day when four LOPC workers were replacing stair treads at the Contra Costa Interfaith Housing units. "At the end of the day the facility manager and two other people said to us, 'We can't believe you do this on your day off. It makes such a difference to us to have this work done.' Remarks like this make you want to go out and do more. I'm hooked on helping others."

Every day I learn something new—what I can do and what I can't.

Rick's parents, the late Lois and Jim Burris, joined LOPC in 1959 when Rick was three. He went to Sunday School, got his third grade Bible, and eventually attended the senior high group, but really didn't fully understand what being a Christian meant. "It was when I was in school at UC Davis and took the fall quarter off for a climbing trip in India and Nepal that it came home to me. We had brought some gifts along and the joy I saw in the face of a little boy touched my heart. It made me realize this was what God wants of us—to reach out to befriend and help others. How simple it can be?

"Back at Davis, I met Kim. Her faith was very strong, as was her family's. I knew this was what I wanted. It was the start of a journey which I'm still on. Every day I learn something new—what I can do and what I can't. I rely on the verse in Luke 1:37. 'With God nothing shall be impossible.' That's made me realize if I can't do something the first time, I can probably make it happen if I work at and if it's the Lord's will."

Rick has stepped out in faith various times at LOPC. He remembers when he and Kim learned Clayton Cobb (a former LOPC pastor) was their neighbor. Hosting a senior high group that evening, he invited them to come. "We did and, later, Clayton asked us up and introduced us as two new advisors. A bit of a surprise, but we wanted to get involved, and right away, we were. God put us in the right place. Being with someone who was nurturing, like Clayton, made me feel anything was possible, even though I was a little unsure about working with kids. But I loved it and stayed on for 15 years.

"When I was asked to serve as an elder for youth I wondered am I really able to do this? But I stepped out in faith and it worked. People of LOPC have really supported me in this learning experience. I've now been chosen as a Deacon and will be chairing the Deacon's Emergency Fund. New challenges and new ways to grow."

#### **Destigmatizing Mental Health**

February 1 1 p.m. – Refreshments, Fellowship Hall 1:30 p.m. – Speaker, Sanctuary



Prof. Stephen Hinshaw will present a lecture, "Stigma, Mental Illness and Families: The Next Frontier."

His latest book, Another Kind of Madness: A Journey Through the Stigma and Hope of Mental Illness, chronicles his father's recurring mental illness and the doctorenforced silence surrounding it, plus

the huge need to combat the stigma that encompasses it. Because he has lived with this problem, Prof. Hinshaw is eminently qualified to discuss the subject.

"Despite far great knowledge of the 'facts' about mental disorders in present time, attitudes have hardly budged since the middle of the twentieth century," Prof. Hinshaw says. In his presentation he defines the concept of stigma, emphasizes how it thwarts the seeking of assessment and treatment, and provides vivid examples related to his own personal and family story.

He also portrays the consequences to families when shame and silence are ordered by doctors, in the name of protecting children. Much of the material in this presentation is based on his book, which was recently awarded the "Best Book" of 2018 in the category of Autobiography/Memoir by American Book Fest.

Prof. Hinshaw is professor of psychology at UC, Berkeley, where he was department chair from 2004 to 2011. Hs is also professor of psychiatry and Vice-Chair for Child and Adolescent Psychology at UC San Francisco. He received his BA from Harvard (summa cum laude) and, after directing school programs and residential summer camps, his doctorate in clinical psychology from UC, Los Angeles. His work focuses on developmental psychopathology, clinical interventions with children and adolescents, and mental illness stigma.

Hinshaw's research efforts have been recognized by his receiving the Distinguished Scientist Award from the Association for Psychological Science, its highest award, and the Distinguished Teaching Award from UC Berkeley. He has been featured regularly in the media, including the New York Times, Washington Post, Huffington Post, Wall Street Journal, Today Show, CBS Evening News, ABC World News, and many more. He lives in Berkeley with his wife, Kelly Campbell; they have three sons.

"Family secrets still abound, whether they pertain to parents, children, siblings, or multiple generations. Some of the most telling relate to the still-hidden and still-shameful topics of mental illness," he says.

"This will be a rare opportunity to have the topic brought out into the open and discussed by such an eminent scholar," says Bobbie Dodson-Nielsen, member of the FFF team. "Come and invite your friends to this free lecture."

#### **December Session Highlights**

Our final session meeting of 2018 included a presentation by Chris Baldwin about the Connecting, Membership, and Fellowship ministries. He shared the progress, structure, goals and challenges for each ministry. In 2018, LOPC gained 51 new members and six confirmands, a 38% increase over 2017. Chris noted we are seeing a rise in younger members joining LOPC --55% between ages 14 and 40. I love this church, and I love my fellow elders who have served alongside me these past three years. We have awesome leadership in this congregation, and we are led by an incredible pastoral team that works tirelessly to help LOPC be "Alive! In Christ...In the World."


