As a belated birthday present from loved ones, I recently attended a concert to see professional surferturned-musician Jack Johnson at The Greek Theatre at UC Berkeley. Jack played one of my favorite songs that seemed to hit me differently that night



than it had at other times. The song is entitled "Inaudible Melodies," and the chorus lovingly goes like this:

Slow down everyone you're moving too fast. Frames can't catch you when you're moving like that.

Slow down. Breathe. Look around. Rest. Enjoy. Notice. Let go. It's a counter-cultural invitation of living a life of joy and gratitude which is all too familiar for Christians (Exodus 20:8: Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy).

What has your pace of life been lately? If you're like me, autumn can often feel like a season of rush and hurry; the start of the school year, youth sports with the family, the launching back up of church programs, and so much more. Financial Update

The month of August was a great month for Congregational Giving, although year-to-date Congregational Giving was lower than budgeted by approximately \$84,000. Mission Special Gifts and Offerings were \$208,000 higher than planned levels due to the deployment of unbudgeted gifts, including \$110,000 to Ukraine and \$50,000 to Hope Solutions.

Ministry teams continue to spend less than budgeted levels. Personnel has experienced many unplanned staff transitions and open positions relative to budget. Year-to-date expenses include the \$208,000 of unbudgeted Mission items mentioned above.

LOPC closed August, with a shortfall of \$43,849 which is less than the budgeted shortfall of \$125,268.

Winter Nights Family Shelter is a traveling shelter for families experiencing hardship whether it be from loss of a job, death in the family, domestic violence, or other unfortunate circumstances. Unlike most shelters, Winter Nights Family Shelter allows families to stay together. Many families who are homeless find themselves couch-surfing or living in their cars for fear of being split apart. When they discover they can stay together at

Winter Nights Family Shelter there is a sense of relief and hope.

Winter Nights Family Shelter depends on multiple faith communities throughout Contra Costa County to house families for two-week commitments. This year, LOPC will host the shelter on campus November 7 -21. As host, LOPC makes sure guests are provided healthy, hot meals and a comfortable, clean environment in Fellowship Hall to call home during their stay. Many volunteers are needed to make this a reality. Opportunities include preparing meals, tutoring, and creating fun activities for guests to participate in. Past activities have included movie nights, outdoor games, crafts, music, and even sharing a family pet with the guests.

Refugee Study Group Meeting

November 13, 9:00 a.m., in the Chapel and on Zoom

When viewing most newscasts, it is difficult to remain unmoved by reports of atrocities occurring around the world, even as we go about our daily lives. Our faith leads us to be involved and to love neighbors near and far. When we witness a country invaded such as Ukraine, or the Taliban overtaking Afghanistan, or violent gangs threatening the lives of citizens in Guatemala, our hearts are touched. We are motivated to reach out, to not remain silent, and to do whatever we can to help those impacted.

Ever since the invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, LOPC has heard the

cries of those displaced by the war. A special collection raised over \$100,000 for Ukrainian relief and was sent to the International Rescue Committee (IRC) to help feed the people fleeing to Poland. Additionally, since May, nearly 40 LOPC members have been meeting and discerning how LOPC can respond to the humanitarian crisis of helping displaced persons around the world. The invasion of Ukraine is new, but thousands of other displaced persons are also pleading for our help. How can we help? We have held several meetings to answer that question, to review findings, and to discuss possible next steps.

We invite you to gather in the Chapel at our next meeting to hear reports of efforts being taken by agencies working in Contra Costa County and partnering with other local Presbyterian churches to help find housing for immigrants. We work to put hope into action. Please join us and discover ways you can help make a difference.

Building the NATIVITY

session highlights

Session gathered September 27 in hybrid format. Coming together, whether in person or online, always proves energizing for elders and staff!

Pastor Peter Whitelock started by sharing plans for an October presentation to the congregation entitled, "The Post Pandemic Church." It aims to shed light on current national and local trends and how LOPC is responding. Rebuilding the lay volunteer teams is a priority as church programs develop and grow. Needs in the community have changed as a result of the pandemic, he said, and LOPC is focused on addressing them.

Peter reported on the process the Church Nominating Committee (CNC) made with its work to put together a full slate for the positions of elders, deacons, CNC members, and Foundation trustees. Terms for the new officers start January 1, 2023. We are blessed to have dedicated members willing to give their time and talents to serve in these important roles. Also discussed was the annual pledge campaign, which starts in October. The Generosity team is working to inform the congregation about the current state of LOPC's finances and the critical support that is needed to operate all phases of church life. There will be a finance presentation on October 23 with Finance Chair Jim Nagle and Executive Leadership Pastor Jaime Polson, which Peter encouraged elders to attend and also help get the word out to the congregation.

Session received an update on staff transitions. A strong turnout celebrated Pastor Gerald Chinen's luau/goodbye luncheon, where he received heartfelt thanks for his years of service to the church. A step toward finding a full-time choir director has been the arrival of Mitchell Covington as interim director. It is a blessing to hear the choir again! We also welcomed to staff Emily Austin as a program coordinator for both Campus Operations and Children's Ministry.

Pastor Jaime Polson reported about

the ministry team goal-planning work, a process that occurs each fall when staff, elders, and lay leaders develop programs for the next year. Jaime shared the goal highlights from each team. The event is an exciting one as teams re-imagine ways to meet the needs of our community and how to share our blessings with the world.

The next session meeting is slated for Tuesday, October 18 at 7:00 p.m.

journey of Faith

eslie Finertie's Faith Journey began in an unlikely way. Both of her parents were in groups for alcoholism, and she began attending a group called Adult Children of Alcoholics. "When I went to the Adult Children of Alcoholics meetings, I found that this group of people became my 'Higher Power.' Attending four meetings a week, I learned a lot. Expressing envy to a friend in the program about their relationship with God, he invited me to pray as if there were a God - something I had only done one time when I was in lonely agony. Peace came. God showed me, in one moment, all the occasions my husband and I had built walls and stopped trusting each other, which almost doomed our marriage. I've believed in God ever since.

"God is patient, and he waited many years before I opened the door further. I was the breadwinner, married to Bob, who had colon cancer. We had twin babies when my mom was diagnosed with early onset Alzheimer's. I returned to my therapist who had been an adult Sunday school teacher. She knew of a class for folks who had questions and doubts.

"I became a seeker, attending Sunday School and church every week. I took communion, praying for forgiveness, thinking perhaps I didn't believe enough. Over time I came to believe that Christ was my Savior. In God's perfect time, I was invited on a "Walk to Emmaus" weekend where I experienced God through talks, music, and one-on-one conversations. My visit from God was so tangible that I trusted him enough to turn my life over to him that very day. Sadly, my last church family led me on a journey of rejection, which was followed by my very loving acceptance at LOPC as I dealt with LGBTQ issues in my family.

"It's a joy to be a member of the Body of Christ in times when I can serve and in times when my husband, Bob, and I receive support. I love choir, Stephen Ministry, and serving in Kairos (prison ministry). I look forward to joys and heartbreaks ahead, all part of being fully alive in Christ.

"God speaks to me through music as well as scripture. I'll never forget singing Great is Thy Faithfulness and realizing it wasn't up to me to be a "good girl" as I had learned in childhood. Instead, God had cared for me all those years, even when I didn't believe.

"About 15 years later, words from the following verse also hit me as I was holding on by my fingernails with my job. 'Strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow, blessings all mine and ten thousand besides.' God wants me to thrive and be fully alive, not just survive in this gift of life he has given me. So, with gratitude, I embrace his many gifts."
