n 2022, the Care Team focused their continuing care for our community with both in-person and online programs. January through April, the team continued offering online classes - a weekly exercise class on Tuesday mornings and a monthly Faith 'N Fun on Fridays class that focused on interesting topics and presentations, including two author series and one re-imagining of the Psalms events. Classes stopped after April as the congregation returned to their pre-pandemic activities.

The Care Team partnered with Senior Ministries to deliver Touch of Love bags to LOPC seniors who are not able to leave their homes often. These bags containing special seasonal gifts and handwritten notes, was a wonderful opportunity to let the recipients know they are cared for. The

75 Easter Touch of Love bags were thoughtfully assembled and delivered by Deacons, Stephen Ministers, families, and the choir. 70 Christmas succulent arrangements with personal notes were delivered in December. The seniors appreciated not only the bags but the visits when the bags were delivered. The Care Team also hosted a craft and note card table with Senior Ministries at the October Fall Fest that was very much enjoyed by the children of the congregation.

The Care Team hosted Soul Shop, a faith-based suicide prevention program, in October. Sessions were offered to local community members and those working with children and teens in faith-based settings. Also in October, LOPC hosted another suicide prevention presentation in partnership with the Acalanes Union High School

District. It was attended by over 400 parents, school administrators, and teachers from Lamorinda schools.

The Deacons met each month in 2022, primarily in person as the year progressed. The Deacons served at 23 memorial receptions and the Deacon Community Fund approved financial requests totaling \$23,594. They began preparing the elements for in-person communion and also continued to deliver home communion kits.

The Prayer Team continued to pray for the requests from the congregation and also for all teachers and health care personnel.

Stephen Ministry welcomed two new Stephen Leaders who helped teach the 50-hour course to four new Stephen Ministers, along with seven other trainees from four partner churches.

children's ministry

As Covid concerns continued to subside in 2022, the Children's Ministry team had a great time welcoming so many old families back to the LOPC campus and enjoyed getting to know new families in Children's Ministry.

From January through March, Children's Ministry had 20 children and eight volunteers participate in two sessions of Kids Rock which focused on Mercy and Justice. The 4th graders continued the tradition of doing a capstone video project as they graduated from the Kids Rock program.

In June they hosted 72 children and 45 volunteers for Vacation Bible Camp. The theme was "A Passport to Peace" and the children went around the world

and discussed many opportunities for service, and how to be advocates for peace in the world they live in today.

In July LOPC said goodbye to Director of Children's Ministry, Lori Robinson, as she answered a call to become a Children's and Youth minister in Oakland. Susan Wentworth, who leads the Preschool and Special Needs programs, stepped in to serve as the interim Director of Children's Ministry. Emily Austin joined LOPC staff in September as a part-time Children's Ministry Program Coordinator to help in all areas of Children's Ministry. Emily also works with LOPC Campus Operations (calendaring/facilities).

LOPC hosted Fun Friday Nights, a respite night for families who

have children with special needs. This program is open to the local community, not just LOPC members. 20 children and 20 volunteers are welcomed to the LOPC campus the first Friday of every month for an evening of social, recreational, and craft activities.

The Sunday morning "Garden" program welcomed children every Sunday, and the curriculum centered around PC(USA)'s Follow Me program. This program teaches the same concepts simultaneously with LOPC's youth program with the hope that this makes it easy for families to have conversations about Sunday morning lessons with their children of all ages.



communications

n 2022, the Communications Team achieved a major milestone with the roll-out of the new website during the summer months. Throughout the year, the Communications Team continued its tradition of operational excellence.

The new website successfully went live on the afternoon of Wednesday, August 17. The conversion to the new website went as anticipated thanks to the many hours of preparation by the Communications Team and in coordination with the contracted website developer. There have been



no critical issues of note and the web site is functioning as expected. Many thanks to the LOPC staff for a long endeavor which has finally come to fruition, and which has created such an outstanding result. There are about 3,500 visits to our website each month.


The cornerstone of communications to members and the broader community is the weekly *Staying Connected* email which is sent to approximately 2,200 subscribers each Monday.



In addition, the twice weekly devotional videos that are emailed to approximately 250 subscribers have a 70% open rate and a 20% click rate.

LOPC's monthly magazine, Focus, underwent a redesign led by Communications Associate, Jon Corry. The new modern look has been well received. Focus is the signature

communications vehicle to reach members and friends of LOPC. Digital copies may be found on the LOPC website and printed copies are mailed to



approximately 1,000 households via USPS. Focus continues to provide much needed information about the importantly ministry happening at LOPC. For many people who may not have the opportunity to leave their homes often, receiving the printed copy of Focus in the mail each month helps to continue the important connection to the church.

The weekly newsletter, *Connections*, is available in printed form at Sunday worship services as well as on the LOPC website. *Connections* is the weekly communications vehicle which describes the happenings in the coming weeks for all ministry areas as well as useful finance and operational updates.

There are approximately 750 followers on the LOPC Facebook page which provides event announcements and links to the devotional videos. Instagram is used by Youth Ministry for the same purposes and has about 200 followers. There are approximately 70 Twitter followers.

finance

We are truly fortunate and thankful for everyone that has given of their time, talent, and treasure to LOPC in 2022. LOPC is blessed to be in a strong position financially, after another interesting year. Overall, total contributions came in strong for the year, and exceeded expenses by \$64,584.

LOPC received \$95,790 in higher Pledging. Congregational Giving was \$2,767,811, or \$7,689, slightly less than planned. Because of an additional Seedlings contribution of \$30,181, higher User Fees of \$19,587, and lower ministry spending, LOPC did not use

the Session Emerging Needs funds, of which \$132,694, was originally budgeted to supplement giving shortfalls and \$39,000, which was approved in May for staff bonuses. Our congregation generously contributed \$133,600 for the Faith Component in December. LOPC deployed \$415,463 in Mission, Special Gifts & Offerings, which was a \$266,365 increase, relative to budget, including gifts to Ukraine and Hope Solutions. Total Giving was \$3,763,569 and exceeded budget by \$176,021.

Year-to-date Ministry Expense of \$3,283,522 was \$154,927 lower than

planned. Personnel expenses were lower than budgeted and Worship spending was higher, due to several staff transitions in 2022. Other ministry areas were below budget, related to post-pandemic programming changes. The staff at LOPC has done an incredible job being nimble and responsive by reallocating our resources, to meet the needs of the congregation and our mission partners.

LOPC finished 2022 in a very solid position to start 2023, which will allow us to do more, in all areas of our ministry. Thank you for your ongoing support!

foundation

stablished in 1993, the LOPC
Foundation strives to be a
permanent, reliable source of
significant funding for LOPC's
ministries. The Foundation grants
funds to LOPC to support ongoing
and new ministries, expand mission
outreach, and maintain LOPC facilities.
For the 2022 fiscal year ended
September 30, the Foundation
appropriated:

- \$395,000 for LOPC's ministries:
- \$146,500 for facilities-related projects.

Grants for LOPC's 2022 operating budget included \$163,000 in general ministry expenditures relating to: church staff salary support, mission partners, deacons, spiritual formation, family ministry, children, and youth.

The Foundation closed its 2022 fiscal

year with \$10.0 million of invested net assets, including: \$3.0 million related to general ministry, \$5.8 million of restricted facilities funds, and \$1.2 million of other restricted funds (deacons, youth, leadership, fellowship, mission, and music). The Foundation has a policy of annually distributing 4% of a 12-quarter average of invested net assets for each of its funds.

In fiscal year 2022, the Foundation welcomed \$229,550 in both immediate and legacy gifts. We are tremendously grateful for, and enriched by, the generosity of those who have contributed in support of the many ministries and missions at LOPC.

In November, the Foundation organized an 11:11 event titled Caring for Aging Parents: Love & Listening on Life's Journey. Maggie Harmon of the Presbyterian Foundation and

our own Linda Fodrini-Johnson shared tools and resources to help us respect our family members' values in conversations that might encourage honest discussion about health concerns and hope. For the second consecutive year, we sponsored a taco truck at LOPC's Fall Fest in October, providing meals for 266 adults and 77 children.

generosity team

Notwithstanding the continued headwinds from the pandemic, our congregation has responded to our two most recent pledge campaigns with strong estimates of giving. This is incredibly important as it allows LOPC to prepare a budget for the upcoming year, which gives us and our mission partners some degree of certainty as we plan ahead. We thank our members and our long-time visitors for their generosity.

At the beginning of 2022, we completed our pledge campaign, What Matters Most. A total of \$2,262,381 was pledged by 467 households. Even though there was a small drop in the number of pledge cards that we received, the overall amount pledged was a nearly 5% increase from the prior year.



Last fall, we launched our current pledge campaign, We Gather Together. The printed materials and three videos that were produced highlighted the good work of the church and the increased costs as a result of inflation. Through the end of December, we have received pledges totaling \$1,867,436 from 311 households; this amount is nearly the same as was pledged at this point last year. As we still have work to do to reach our goal of \$2,450,000, we ask that those who have not yet pledged to prayerfully consider the amount that they can give in 2023.

In addition, our team worked with LOPC's Treasurer Staci Johnston to enable those in the pews to give online via a QR code. This was particularly important as, until recently, the plate was not being passed on Sundays. We are also surveying other churches in order to develop additional ways to make it easier to give.

Finally, our team has authored articles for Focus that have spotlighted ways in which our members have given their time, talent and treasure. We are committed to producing more Generosity Corner articles in 2023 and are hopeful that they will continue to have a positive impact.

membership & connecting

The Membership Team hosted one membership class on Zoom in March followed by a return to in-person classes in July and October in the Oak Room. Chris Baldwin redesigned the class curriculum over the summer helping to make the class more accessible and manageable regarding people's time and availability.

The Membership Ministry welcomed 24 new active members which is an increase from 2021 (19 members). The Youth Ministry hosted a Confirmation class in January which welcomed two youth as members into the community, as well. The reception of new members from the Membership Class

& Confirmation classes brings a total of 26 new members received into the community.

In December, the team completed the annual membership rolls maintenance project with a focus on caring contacts to members who moved away. Along with the maintenance project, 46 members were removed from the rolls and registers (17 requested to be removed/letter of transfer out & 29 deceased members). Total active membership at LOPC is 1,711 members (previously 1,731 members).

As a new creative ministry development, Patrick Chen,

Connecting Ministry Elder, and Chris Baldwin launched the new "Next Steps" program inviting new members to consider taking their next step of faith at LOPC by further exploring what it means to be a member at LOPC -Attend, Connect, Serve, Give. The first class was offered on November 20 and the second class was December 11. Lastly, refreshed Friendship Pads have returned to the pews of the sanctuary for worship services in December. These pads will help our teams connect with new visitors while assisting others who are looking for opportunities to plug into the church.

mission in service

he mission team continued to focus on supporting LOPC mission partners locally and internationally. MIS broadened its focus beyond financial support and service and created a sub-team that is exploring what justice looks like for each of LOPC's current mission partners and how LOPC can better support them in this work. So far, the team has visited the Monument Crisis Center and Food Bank of Contra Costa/Solano, Hope Solutions, and the Multi-faith Action Coalition, resulting in some great discussions and ideas on how to move toward. There are two other sub teams that were formed in 2022. One team is working on increasing volunteer engagement with mission and the other is working on learning more about Global Hunger and its effect on LOPC's mission partners and the world.

Special Offerings • 2022

LOPC had four special offerings last year which resulted in the following: \$15,479 for the Food Bank of Contra Costa/ Solano counties, \$28,624 to support the pre-development of Tiny Homes with Hope Solutions, \$21,885 to purchase porridge for preschool age children in Zimbabwe through JF Kapnek and a Christmas offering supporting Hunger in our community with the benefactors being the Food Bank of Contra Costa/ Solano counties, the Alameda Food Bank and Monument Crisis Center resulting in \$\$\$ not known yet.

In addition to these special offerings, LOPC had two unexpected Disaster offerings. One benefited the International Rescue Committee (IRC) supporting displaced families with critical aid (water, food, shelter and medical) in the Ukraine which resulted in \$112,598. A collection to help those impacted by Hurricane lan resulted in \$\$\$ for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance.

In addition to special offerings, LOPC was able to help several organizations meet special needs that they would otherwise not been able to meet without extra assistance from those that already support them. \$15k was given to Trinity Center to purchase a much-needed van to transport its clients and White Pony Express received 9k to be used to purchase a new refrigerated van to transport the unwanted food that they pick-up and disburse to the community.

love does love protects, love hopes, love never fails

LOPC's service model, love does continues to grow in name recognition and participation with the congregation. LOPC's annual love does in February was a smaller modified version of the large one day event of the past. The smaller hybrid version included various at home opportunities for making breakfast kits, hygiene kits and polar fleece blankets as well as on-site service opportunities at two of LOPC's mission partners; White Pony Express and the Food Bank of Contra Costa/Solano counties. In addition, a drive to collect warm clothing for both men and woman resulted in over bags of clothing being delivered to the Trinity Center for distribution among homeless in our community. Additionally, LOPC Youth took the lead sorting and packaging baby clothes for low-income mothers. Participation was strong in spite of the hybrid version. love does resulted in 300 people serving in the following ways; 59 Boxes of Baby Clothing for Loved Twice, 300 Pediatric Hygiene kits to benefit JF Kapnek, 328 Breakfast Bags split between Trinity Center & Operation Dignity, 300 Hygiene Kits split between Trinity Center and Operation Dignity, 79 Polar Fleece Blankets for Calico, 64 bags of Used clothing for Trinity Center and 40 people working off-site at the Food Bank and White Pony Express.

Other Service Projects in 2022

In addition to the month of love does in February, LOPC offered other various opportunities to serve throughout the remainder of the year. LOPC members volunteered to help with three Build Days at Habitat for Humanity's Esperanza Place in Walnut Creek. The congregation responded well to the Monument Crisis Center Backpack Drive in July with 130 donations and participation in four Food Bank opportunities throughout the year. The Freebirds as a group served at Loaves and Fishes deep cleaning the kitchen and dining room located in Martinez that serves 175 people daily. In addition, LOPC offered three collections of toys for Harbor House and White Pony Express and food boxes for the Monument Crisis Center.

Mission Events

LOPC Mission continued to offer opportunities for the congregation to learn about the most current



mission topics. Mission hosted several speakers in 2022 including Dr. Jane Pak, the Co-Executive Director of Refugees & Immigrant Transitions (RIT) who spoke on the complexities of gaining refugees status. In May, Hope Solutions visited the LOPC campus to share their vision of building 50 new housing units (tiny homes) on Faith Institution land and even brought a real model to campus. In September Rosie Thandu visited LOPC and gave an update on Children of Faith and all the children.

operations

A new Operations/Facilities team was formed and included LOPC members Diane Voellering, Jeff Budke (2023 elder), Rich Lewis, Don Couch, along with staff Jaime Polson and Dave Engelbrektson. This team met throughout 2023. The Operation team welcomed a new part-time Campus Operations Program Coordinator (campus scheduling/facilities), Emily Austin, in September. Emily also works closely with the Children's Ministry Team.

As in a typical year, numerous repairs and inspections were required, some of which included:

- Repairing chair lift in Chapel/Lower Youth room
- Control board on our main fire panel was replaced and re-programmed
- Replaced circulating pump in CLC which resulted in a significant savings in PG&E (gas)
- Parking lot lighting was repaired, and all pole fixtures converted to LED
- Repaired our utility golf cart
- Title 19, 5-year fire sprinkler inspection completed
- Load testing of both chair lifts

Our Thursday Work Crew volunteers, for whom we are very grateful, repaired:

- Two large irrigation water leaks on the hillside
- Assessed and repaired the wood chairs in the Chapel
- Replaced broken and chipped tiles in Fellowship Hall
- Replaced several light fixtures with LED fixtures (Ladies Restroom in Fellowship Hall; janitor's closet in the CLC; and stair lights to the Sanctuary sound loft)
- Installed a new convex mirror at the exit to our parking lot
- Installed two new plaques for Presbyterian Women which honor Vickie Hipkiss and Diane Steuber

Routine maintenance was performed in the form of painting and staining:

- Front facing bay of the Sanctuary
- Entire south side of CLC
- Five offices in the Ministry Center;
 and the Small Conference room
- Select areas of the Chancel Annex
- Several utility doors such as the garbage enclosure and electrical doors

Other maintenance included:

- Removal of dead trees (3 pines and 6 redwood), and considerable tree trimming on back hillside for fire prevention
- Sanctuary rain gutters cleaned and unplugged
- Honeybee removal from soffit on backside of the Chapel

The artificial turf on the Seedlings playground was replaced at the end of October.

Many of the larger maintenance and replacement projects were funded by the Foundation, for which we are very grateful for their support.

For the office, a new postal machine was installed, and several staff computers were replaced.

We also worked with the Kurth Board to help launch an expansion of Kurth Garden.

In October, a CPR training class was given for custodians, staff, ushers, and Thursday Fellowship volunteers.

AT&T completed a cell tower upgrade of new antennas and equipment.

We are blessed to have such a gifted and dedicated staff that helps carry out the important ministry we plan at LOPC. Our clergy, program and administrative staff, and teachers are such a vital part of what makes LOPC such a warm and welcoming community of faith.

As the challenges of the pandemic leveled off in 2022, we entered a new place of re-imagining the various ministry areas and how best to meet the needs of our members. The staff rose to the challenge and demonstrated the ability to think creatively while caring for LOPC members and those in the broader community.

This past year brought changes in our staffing configuration. LOPC is

We give thanks to God for each person who serves with us on the Worship and Music Team and for you our Congregants. You are each appreciated and are a Blessing. To God be the Glory!


youth
