

Rev. Sandhya Jha has spent 15 years as an anti-oppression trainer and consultant, primarily with non-profits, youth organizing groups, universities, and faith/interfaith organizations. She is the author of Room at the Table, the history of people of color in the Disciples of Christ, and Pre-Post-Racial America: Spiritual Stories from the Front Lines on the subject of race and spirituality in America.

#### **About the Team:**

The LOPC Racial Equity and Engagement Team pursues its charge to form relationships with communities of color and to work toward racial justice, we take to heart the example of Christ and the discernment of LOPC, and embrace these values so we "bend the arc" toward God's justice. As followers of Christ, we are called to love, seek justice for, and care for those who have been pushed to the margins of society. Indeed, Jesus declared that he was called to "set the oppressed free," (Luke 4:18), and we see Jesus repeatedly seeking out those who were left out of the power structure of his day.



#### Covid, RSV, Influenza, and Polio

With Dr. Margaret Liu

February 3 at 10:00 a.m. in Fellowship Hall and on Zoom

Dr. Margaret Liu, adjunct professor of microbiology and immunology at the University of California, San Francisco, will join us to explain the current state of medical science regarding the epidemiology of Covid, RSV, influenza, and polio

and to describe vaccine and public health strategies.

She will review the current variants of concern (i.e., the dominant circulating strains) of SARS-CoV-2 and efficacy of the booster vaccines, and discuss the characteristics of different vaccines in use, their benefits and limitations, along with recommendations for other treatments to minimize infection and illness.

The very recent successful development of RSV vaccines and their strategies (immunizing pregnant women and older people) will be outlined. These diseases will be covered in the context of how vaccine development and usage and other protective measures affect individual and public health going forward,

Dr. Liu earned an M.D. degree from Harvard Medical School, served on faculty, and is a Visiting Scientist at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Renowned in vaccines, gene delivery, and cancer immunotherapy, Dr. Liu pioneered DNA vaccines, as well as bispecific antibodies for cancer. Named one of "The 50 Most Important Women Scientists" by Discover Magazine, she

is also known as "The mother of DNA vaccines" – a technology that laid the foundation for mRNA vaccines.

Dr. Liu was formerly senior advisor in vaccinology at the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, board chairman of the International Vaccine Institute, and a member of the groups that drafted World Health Organization various vaccine guidelines, and a member of Anthony Fauci's National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases Advisory Council.

"This is a rare opportunity to learn firsthand about the latest developments in vaccine research. Be sure to join us for this important discussion," says Darlene James, a member of the First Friday Team.



The crowd assembled at the Lafayette Community Center burst into applause as longtime LOPC member Andy Amstutz was announced as the winner of the First Annual Don Jenkins/Lamorinda Village Service Award.

Executive Director of Lamorinda
Village, Kathryn Ishizu, remarked, "It
is fitting that the first Village Service
Award goes to Andy. Don and Andy
were in at the inception of the Village
and became founding board members.
They worked for years to develop
the organization. I think Don would
be very pleased to have Andy as
his first honoree." Don Jenkins also
was a prominent, longtime LOPC
member, active in many of the church's
programs prior to his recent passing.

"I feel very grateful for the recognition from our Village community..." Amstutz responded.

"When I said yes to Don's request that I join the Village organizing task

force it was just what I was looking for as my next personal growth chapter. Volunteering is best when you can work on things you care about and have some experience with. I was prepared by many years in leadership at IBM and at LOPC. Lamorinda Village was a natural idea whose time had come, and it continues to develop very well. I am fortunate to have found such a good place to serve and grow."

"Originally, I did not know Andy," Ishizu acknowledged. "However, I began to look forward to his being at meetings because he'd bring joy with him when he walked into the room. He still does."

A snapshot of what Andy has done for Lamorinda Village includes Task Force for Lamorinda Village Concept, chair of Outreach and Recruitment, Founding Board Member from 2015 to 2020, membership chair, starting a men's coffee and conversation group, and was responsible for upgrading the organizations database and website.

Some of the services he provided include being a driver, handyman, grocery and meal delivery, computer help, food preparation, gardening, and visitor.

Founded by Ruth McCahan, Lamorinda Village's doors opened to serve older adults in our community in April 2015. In recent years, the organization has more than doubled in size with 249 current members.

Ishizu explains, "Our Mission is to actively build a community that embraces connections, caring, and choices in how we live and thrive. We believe that Villages run on the power that comes from connecting people who possess abundant energy, creativity, knowledge, and the determination to make the world a better place with each other. At Lamorinda Village, we make every effort to meet the needs of our members through programs, services, and referrals."

Roberta Spaulding shares her journey:

I had thought I wanted to be. During this time, I read Conrad's Heart of Darkness and bolted awake on realizing that the heart of darkness lies within. Reflection led me to return to church and to a

welcome detachment from some preoccupations.

"When I moved to San Francisco I found myself only a block and a half from a church. When I first attended Calvary Presbyterian I had the same feeling that I had when I visited my grandmother. It truly was 'coming home.' After I purchased my home in Concord, I looked for a church that

also felt both welcoming and diverse. I found it at LOPC. The gift of time after retiring allowed me to commit to joining ongoing groups. Being on the Congo Mission Team has been especially important. I have seen and learned from those who truly are companions in faith, who walk with those they serve, not trying to be the director or manager of others' journeys.

"If you had asked me years ago what type of group I thought I would join, I would have said Science and Religion. But now I think faith is the dominating factor in all that we do—a gift one accepts, or not. The blessing is that God is kind and forgiving, offering His gift of faith when He knows one is ready to accept it.

#### **Financial Report**


We are truly fortunate and thankful for everyone that has given of their time, talent, and treasure to LOPC in 2022. LOPC is blessed to be in a strong position financially, after another interesting year. Overall, total contributions came in strong for the year, and exceeded expenses by \$64,584.

LOPC received \$95,790 in higher Pledging. Congregational Giving was \$2,767,811, or \$7,689, slightly less than planned. Because of an additional Seedlings contribution of \$30,181, higher User Fees of \$19,587, and lower ministry spending, LOPC did not use the Session Emerging Needs funds, of which \$132,694, was originally budgeted to supplement giving shortfalls and \$39,000, which was approved in May for staff bonuses. Our congregation generously contributed \$133,600 for the Faith Component in December. LOPC deployed \$415,463

in Mission, Special Gifts & Offerings, which was a \$266,365 increase, relative to budget, including gifts to Ukraine and Hope Solutions. Total Giving was \$3,763,569 and exceeded budget by \$176,021.

Year-to-date Ministry Expense of \$3,283,522 was \$154,927 lower than planned. Personnel expenses were lower than budgeted and Worship spending was higher, due to several staff transitions in 2022. Other ministry areas were below budget, related to post-pandemic programming changes. The staff at LOPC has done an incredible job being nimble and responsive by reallocating our resources, to meet the needs of the congregation and our mission partners.

LOPC finished 2022 in a very solid position to start 2023, which will allow us to do more, in all areas of our ministry. Thank you for your ongoing support!

Finally, Bill De Wolf, Personnel chair, led an executive session reviewing Peter's accomplishments and goals for himself. In addition to providing an example for other staff members who undergo the review process, it gave session a better understanding of achievements and objectives for the future.

ach year from October through mid-May, LOPC, alongside other congregations in the Interfaith Council of Contra Costa County, takes a turn sharing their facilities with homeless families. For two weeks, LOPC hosts and supports families with peace, love, shelter, nutrition, and respect at Winter Nights Family Shelter.

Last November, more than 160 members of LOPC welcomed 28 unhoused guests! Staff and volunteers set up a warm, safe, private tented neighborhood in Fellowship Hall. Adults and teens tutored kids after school, teams cooked nutritious and varied warm meals, and both youth and adults showed up before dawn to prepare coffee and breakfast cereals so families could leave by 7:00 a.m. each morning.

A key weekday activity offered at the shelter is a 5:00 p.m. tutoring session for children. Winter Nights volunteer tutors work one-on-one with school-age children to focus on learning and literacy skills. This time also gives parents a chance to catch their breath, freshen up, or be fully present with younger children and infants.

One un-sung hero, Ursula Klier, has annually picked up, washed, folded, and delivered guests' linens. "It's unbelievable how so many single moms carry it all on their shoulders, yet manage to take care of kids and get them to school,"she says. "This year, the families rose extra early on their last LOPC day, to wash and fold all the linens before they left. They are amazing."

It is amazing what our LOPC community can do using its time, talents, and treasure! In this case, not only did LOPC members provide a safe and nurturing space for our Winter Nights guests, but they also gained a sense of fulfillment by giving of themselves for others. We look forward to hosting again next year
