EASTER people

By the time this edition of Focus reaches you, we will be drawing nearer to Easter. As Christians, we believe we are Easter People. This means we are people who have been shaped by the resurrection of Jesus. Through this, we know that suffering, disappointment, and even

death can be transformed to new life. Because we are Easter People, we are people of relentless hope despite the challenging realities of this world.

Recently, I've experienced this congregation living into the role of Easter People. In late February, LOPC's session voted to endorse California Senate Bill 4 (the Affordable Housing on Faith Lands Act), a comprehensive bill that provides a streamlined process for religious organizations to develop affordable housing on their properties regardless of local zoning restrictions. Even though LOPC has no unused available land for such a build, by supporting this legislation, we are helping local churches in our county and Presbytery with their own affordable housing projects and uniting with them to work to provide promising solutions to the housing crisis in our area. LOPC's support for this bill, reminds me that we are a people of hope even in the face of incredible challenging societal problems. I've also seen our congregation live into hope and our identity as Easter People through this year's Lenten study on forgiveness. It is incredibly challenging for us as Christians to live into forgiveness, a central theme of our religion. However, I've seen and heard our members explore questions around this topic and lean-in to where we are looking for forgiveness in our own lives or to extend forgiveness to others. As people of hope, we know that suffering and disappointment can transform into new life through forgiveness.

As we celebrate Easter this year, I hope that however you engage with our church community you will see the hope that God has for us and the world through Jesus Christ and feel inspired to live into our identity as Easter People April 2023

Improving the Lives of Children: Benefiting Children of Faith Missions & Atfaluna Society for Deaf Children

How to Donate, starting March 27: (donations received will be divided equally between both organizations)

This Easter, LOPC's special offering will promote the work of two long-time mission partners, Children of Faith Missions and Atfaluna Society for Deaf Children. They will be lifted up for the work they are both doing to improve the lives of children.

Children of Faith plans to use the funds to purchase a new 10-seater mini-truck, vital to providing daily transportation for students to and from university, medical appointments, and various errands.

The funds Atfaluna receives will go to fund a classroom for a year. The work the school does for children who have lost their hearing includes a curriculum of hearing-loss rehabilitation, auditory training, speech training, and a well-rounded general education.

Atfaluna Society for Deaf Children

OPC has been a strong supporter of Atfaluna School for Deaf Children since 2003. The LOPC-sponsored classroom of second and third-grade students is currently filled with 20 wonderful kids (pictured right). A registered Palestinian NGO located in Gaza City, Atfaluna empowers children with hearing disabilities of every faith to have a fulfilling life through preschool, education, rehabilitation, advocacy, vocational training, and employment opportunities. In 2022, Atfaluna received the Humanitarian and Civic Services Award by the Takreem Foundation for 30 years of providing inclusive interventions for persons with and without disabilities in Gaza.

Atfaluna has an average enrollment of about 170 students annually, ranging in age from six to 17. Most children have additional disabilities beyond deafness and come from families well below

Children of Faith Missions

t Children of Faith, education is emphasized as the key to helping break the cycle of poverty. Based in Visakhapatnam, India, COF has partnered with LOPC for over 10 years. Founded in 2004 by Rosie and Anand Thandu, COF is both a children's home and school, serving 120 school-age children. The facility prepares students for a better future by promoting physical, emotional, social, and intellectual development. Many children served by COF are orphans or have only one living parent or extended family that struggle to provide adequate care. Children who live at COF attend school on the grounds under the care and supervision of founders and their staff. The school provides first-through-10th grade, after which the children attend junior college in the nearby community for 11th and 12th grades. After 12 years of education, most children go on to college or technical school with support from COF.



the poverty line. Curriculum includes hearing-loss rehabilitation (auditory training and auditory speech training) and a well-rounded general education curriculum. Atfaluna provides a close teacher-to-student ratio, with class size limited to no more than 12 students. Other school features include:

 Development of special educational curriculum tailored to the needs of hearing impaired

students;

- Non-curriculum activities including library sessions, arts and crafts classes, and recreational field trips;
- Healthy meals for all students to mitigate deteriorating conditions in Gaza affecting most of their families;
- Social support and counseling for deaf children and their families.



COF Founder Rosie Thandu had the opportunity to visit LOPC this past fall to thank the congregation for the support and love they received and shared plans for the future. An immediate need that Children of Faith is facing is to replace an aging vehicle (*pictured above*) which they rely on to transport students. On school days, the vehicle works overtime taking older children to and from junior college, driving COF teachers back and forth to the home's school, taking children to medical appointments or hospital visits, and for errands such as groceries and vegetables. The vehicle's age and growing mechanical unreliability have posed a serious threat to the organizations ability to serve children in their care. Your generous gifts this Easter can help replace it. Help COF continue to transform lives by providing a safe home, nourishment, and education! love protects, love hopes, love never fails

This year's *love does* Day exceeded expectations! The enthusiasm and energy were palpable. People were not just excited about serving, but also about being back on campus together in-person. It was great to see so many families working together as volunteers to accomplish amazing things in the community! Thank you to the many volunteers who gave so generously of their time to help make this year's love does Day such a success. If you were unable to participate, there will be many more opportunities during the rest of the year. Below is a summary of just some of what was accomplished on that day:

• **49 boxes of baby clothes** were packed to be delivered to new mothers.

- **53 polar-fleece blankets** were made to comfort abused children.
- **40 carts were assembled** to help those without a car access food at Monument Crisis Center.
- **35 bags of warm clothing** were sorted for distribution to homeless men and women.
- **226 hygiene kits** were assembled for Monument Crisis Center to distribute to clients.
- **10 people worked at White Pony Express** sorting and packing food for distribution into the community.
- **10 people worked with Habitat for Humanity** on-site at Esperanza Place in Walnut Creek.
- **94 hygiene kits** were assembled by at-home volunteers.
- 194 breakfast bags were assembled by at-home volunteers.
- **14 people sorted and packed food** for distribution for the Food Bank.
- A love does special offering resulted in \$9,136.80 donated to LOPC mission partner STAND!

Each day campers sing songs, play team-building games, devour yummy treats, perform experiments, and create themed crafts, all while developing connections with peers and group leaders. This year, children will participate in hands-on service activities focused on the non-profit organization, and long-time LOPC mission partner, FotoKids. Camp attendees will then travel to Guatemala later this summer with LOPC's Youth mission trip. Each day at camp concludes with a Canyon Closing that

Stephen Ministry Lookouts Needed

Ctephen Ministry began its ministry Jat LOPC in 2003. Over the course of its 20-year history, Stephen Ministry has benefited many in the congregation. You may have read some of their testimonials in previous issues of Focus or viewed their video testimonials in worship or on the church website. It is worth noting that several previous care receivers who were not LOPC members were so appreciative of the care this ministry provided, that they became active members of LOPC! Still, the fact remains that some are unlikely to reach out and ask for help. Nevertheless, many who are dealing with a difficult time are in fact very receptive to having the spiritual care of a Stephen Minister when it is offered.

Stephen Ministry would love to recruit more Lookouts - individuals who become aware of people in the congregation and in the community who are hurting and could benefit from the care of a Stephen Minister. Lookouts pave the way by telling a potential care receiver about Stephen Ministry, perhaps giving them one of our informative flyers, and, if the person is interested, asking for permission to pass on the person's name and phone number to the Stephen Ministry Referrals Coordinator. The coordinator will then meet with the person to answer any questions, determine if Stephen Ministry is appropriate for the specific situation, and if so, assign an available Stephen Minister who would be a good fit.

In addition to pastors and other Stephen Ministers, lookouts are comprised of deacons, LOPC staff, and more importantly people just like you, who can seek out others in the community who are dealing with grief, illness, family issues, or any number life's challenges, and let them know about the care they can receive from a Stephen Minster.

When AI Meets Neuroscience: Making Your Child's World Their Screen, Without a Screen. April 14 at 10:00 a.m. in Fellowship Hall and on Zoom

ntrepreneur, Jim Marggraff, is the featured speaker at April's First Friday Forum (FFF). Marggraff says, "New brain research can be combined with Artificial Intelligence (AI) to create multi-sensory experiences that accelerate learning at any age. When this happens for young

children, we will be preparing our next generation to lead the world to new heights and to solve our world's most challenging issues." Marggraff will present a hands-on sneak-peek demonstration of the new technology he is creating to show how this is possible.

A serial inventor and entrepreneur, Marggraff has been Ernst and Young's Entrepreneur of the Year, Father of the Year, and a TED speaker. For more than 30 years he has dedicated his energy, vision, and inventiveness to developing standards, applications, technology and products for companies committed to creating innovative solutions, improving learning, and advancing



human creativity, curiosity, and communication. In 2020, he founded his seventh company, Kinoo. com, a breakthrough literacy and learning platform for young children and family members to develop critical skills without screens. Children interact with ordinary paper,

books with sounds, light, and motion.

Among Jim's achievements was helping to grow the startup LeapFrog from \$16 million to \$680 million in annual sales in five years. Jim's dedication to technology-based learning helped LeapFrog sell over \$1 billion of Leappads and educational content worldwide in less than five years. Jim's work as lead voice-over talent for LeapFrog, has been used by tens of millions of LeapPad users. His inventions and content have impacted more than 100 million children and adults in reading, math, and language skills and have sparked and fueled a passion for lifelong learning for people around the globe. Jim's LeapPad

invention is also listed in the "MIT 150." the top 150 inventions and contributors from MIT graduates.

In February 2019, Jim was awarded the "Rotary STAR Humanitarian Award" for his work in propagating information and education. Jim received his BS and MS in electrical engineering and computer science from MIT and holds more than 60 granted patents.

Currently Jim is CEO, chairman, and co-founder of Kinoo, Inc; board member, Foresight Mental Health: Advisor JIBE; chairman and co-founder, The Global Impact Group; board member, Gleason Family Foundation; and Leadership Council, One Shared World.

ow do we love each other? Let us count the ways – or at least name one: LOCP's many Small Groups. We humans are community creatures. With our varied interests and gradual emergence from Covid isolation, small groups offer vital, life-giving, respectful mini-communities in which we can share our time and talent.

LOPC sponsors small, long-term or short-term groups for personal growth, for service, and for fun and fellowship.

- **Belong**: Many join purely social groups, like Voyagers, Freebirds, and Young Families Connect in the back playground.

When reflecting and praying together (like Companions and Prayer Team), we join our hearts, minds, and presence to listen to and learn from the wisdom of others as we discern where God might be acting in our lives.

When serving together (like Stephen Ministry, mission efforts, visiting the homebound, hosting memorial receptions), we learn we can count on each other when we're in need, because we serve those in need when we are able. We enrich the lives of others – and ourselves in the process.

Whether focused on belonging, growing, serving, or caring, fellowship in an LOPC small group is a central component of faith in our community.

February Session Highlights

Session continues to meet in hybrid format. Our February 28 meeting began with a moving spiritualformation story from Betty Graves that highlighted being attentive to helping strangers in need and how we may be entertaining angels unaware. This correlated well with a report Pastor Peter Whitelock gave later in our meeting on the recent leadership retreat and the 25 Good Ministry Ideas that emerged on loving your neighbor by getting to know your neighbor.

Among its many discussions and actions, session completed its annual review and approved all LOPC's Policies; considered attendance at upcoming Presbytery meetings, with the possibility of one being at LOPC; approved financial motions to deploy available funds to complete the remaining CLC lobby update and to assist Temple Isaiah in their need for a security fence.

Under LOPC's Social Justice Advocacy Policy, a motion was considered by session on providing (non-monetary) support for pending California Senate Bill 4, the Affordable Housing on Faith Lands Act. This bill would not implicate any land of LOPC. But it would greatly expedite the process and expense of other churches in seeking approval for the much-needed affordable housing they would like to build. The request for support came from several of our mission partners that would also be assisted by SB 4, and had been vetted and approved unanimously by LOPC's Mission team and the Session Planning Council. After considering that all of the Advocacy Policy criteria had been satisfied, session unanimously approved the motion to support.

Session also received the annual report on Kurth Memorial Garden (KMG) from its chair, Lynn Trowbridge, highlighting its positive financial status, current reduced availability of single and double niches, and quality plans at the ready to expand capacity for future additional niches and plaques. Financial Update

OPC is off to a good start for the first two months of 2023. We are truly blessed to have supportive congregation and staff that make this possible.

Year-to-date, February total contributions came in at \$573,391, trailing budgeted levels of \$637,799. The shortfall is due to lower pledge giving, relative to plan, offset by higher mission and special gifts giving of \$23,544, due to deployment of Christmas offerings for mission partners. Historically annual pledge giving is stronger than pledged levels. We are hopeful this giving trend continues in 2023.

Year-to-date expenses of \$435,035, are slightly below budget, excluding spending for mission and special gifts. The favorable spending variance was due to lower spending across all ministries, offset by higher gas utilities expense.

LOPC ended the two-month period with \$58,811 of net contributions. The budgeted net contribution was \$140,072 for the same period, resulting in a shortfall relative to budget of \$81,261. If you have not pledged yet in 2023, please consider doing so. Thank you to those who have submitted pledges for 2023.

CNC

Seeking New Church Leaders for terms beginning January 1, 2024!

Nominations can be submitted in April.

One of the cornerstones of our Presbyterian heritage is the annual election by the congregation of church officers to provide leadership for the church. It is a privilege and responsibility to nominate members to serve as elected lay leaders. It is also necessary for us to participate in the essential process that will influence our church in the near future.

The primary qualifications for nominees are:

Elders, Elders, together with the pastors, lead and direct the ministry of the church. They are persons of faith, dedication, and good judgment. Elders serve on session, the governing body of the church. They also chair various church teams through which all ministries are conducted. Eight elders are ordained annually to serve three-year terms. At the time of producing this issue of FOCUS, the following teams need an elder assigned in 2024:

Care, Children, Communications, Fellowship, Mission, and Youth. Once the 2024 Clerk of Session is determined, there will be an additional team that will need an elder.

Deacons, as set forth in Scripture, are leaders who serve as the caring, compassionate arm of the church. They provide loving support to all those in need within the church community. The primary area of Deacon service is care of members. Ten deacons are ordained annually to serve a three-year term and two deacons of high-school age to serve a one-year term.

Foundation Trustees serve on the LOPC Foundation. This nine-member foundation receives gifts in various forms and designations, manages investments, and provides funding for LOPC needs that cannot be accommodated in the church's annual operating budget. Trustees serve an initial term of four years and are eligible to be re-elected for one threeyear term. Members who have served in the past can be nominated for a two-year term.

The Congregation Nominating

Committee (CNC) members are elected for a one-year term. Their duties include receiving and reviewing nominations for church officers and selecting candidates to present to the congregation.
