

in person for the generosity demonstrated in last fall's special offering. The offering raised over \$20,000 to help feed pre-school children in Zimbabwe, and over 600 hygiene kits were created by LOPC members and distributed at the only children's hospital in Zimbabwe.

Dr. Robbins will also provide a review of the LOPC - Kapnek Trust partnership, now in its 10th year, update us on recent developments in women and children's health concerns in Zimbabwe, and answer questions.

If time allows, Dr. Robbins will also discuss how international support, such as that from LOPC, is becoming a model for other non-governmental organizations in Zimbabwe. Like other non-profits, Kapnek Trust benefits from grants from large international agencies such as USAID. But such grants do not cover all expenses.

Support from groups like LOPC make a significant difference in filling the financial gaps for organizations like Kapnek Trust. The Kapnek Trust - LOPC partnership is unique and deeply valued by Kapnek Trust.

This is the perfect opportunity to learn more about this amazing organization and its efforts in Zimbabwe. Initially focused on the AIDS/HIV crisis and reducing the transmission from mother to child, Kapnek has since expanded its programs to include helping vulnerable children, children with disabilities, reducing violence against women and girls with disabilities, and women's health issues.

Trinity Center's New Van to Serve the Unhoused

Recently, Trinity Center took possession of a new van, partially funded by LOPC, which will be instrumental in transporting clients to medical and dental appointments, as well as other essential service appointments with the DMV, Social Security, Public Records, Legal Aid, and others. During the winter months the van will be used to transport 20-30 individuals nightly to the Walnut Creek

Amory, which provides much needed shelter during inclement seasonal weather. As a requirement from the City of Walnut Creek, clients can only access the Armory through Trinity Center, thus making the purchase of the van all the more urgent. It is projected that the van will allow the Trinity Center to provide approximately 10,000 rides per year—crucial to its mission to serve the unhoused in the community.



People of Faith Respond: The Supreme Court and Us

March 5, 4:00 - 5:30 p.m., in Fellowship Hall and on Zoom - Sponsored by Neighbor 2 Neighbor

Join us for this timely discussion covering the historic 2022 Supreme Court decisions related to abortion and prayer in public school. The discussion's overall focus will consider the impact of these decisions on our religious freedom and the doctrine of separation of church and state, through the lens of the three Abrahamic faiths—Judaism, Christianity, and Islam.

Panelists will be LOPC's Pastor Peter

Whitelock, Jill Perlman, Senior Rabbi at Temple Isaiah, and Sheik Hassan Maseehullah, Imam at the San Ramon Valley Islamic Center. Each panelist will review scriptural passages on which each tradition bases their beliefs, and how that relates to the Supreme Court's recent decisions. Lawyer and LOPC Elder Terry Clark will facilitate the discussion while also unpacking these key cases, how the Court arrived

at its decisions, and growing trends in these areas.

Audience questions will be welcomed at the conclusion of the discussion. Participants are encouraged to attend in person, but a Zoom link will be available to attend online. Ministering to 120 children, program Founders Anand and Rosie Thandu say it's always a busy time at Children of Faith Missions in Visakhapatnam, India. On a recent visit, Rosie Thanadu was able to meet with supporters in the LOPC community and provide an update on the program's recent successes. The children have been working hard in school with help from their dedicated teachers, making up for learning time lost during the

pandemic. As a result, children have been scoring among the highest in the region on recent government tests. She also shared stories of children who are now in college, studying advanced fields such engineering, education, and nursing. While visiting, Rosie also had a chance to meet with LOPC youth and tell them about life at the Children's Home— helping with chores, playing games like cricket and ping pong, and making friendships that will last a

lifetime. Finally, supporters expressed concern and asked Rosie about current state of health for children in their care. Rosie revealed that not only had they been spared COVID outbreaks, a recent medical camp proved the children are also healthy, growing, and thriving.

ave you noticed the growth of the number of children that are engaged in our Sunday morning programs? It hit me as I observed the long parade of children and our youth that join us in the sanctuary for a blessing on Communion Sunday.

The morning starts with quiet rituals: putting art supplies around small tables, marking the page for the current Bible passage, placing a few resources on the community carpet. Friendly faces enter Room 205 in ones and twos, some familiar and others just finding their way for the first time. After five minutes, the room hums with energy and the stacking cup towers surpass the height of the

kids. The Garden is packed, and God's love is being abundantly passed from person to person. None of this works, however, without volunteers.

"Coming out of the pandemic, I believe many people are seeking to be part of an authentic, real, and meaningful faith community – for themselves and their children," says Pastor Jaime Polson. "It's been a blessing to see so many new families find a welcoming community at LOPC and see our existing families returning."

One myth that needs to be dispelled is the need to be a parent to volunteer with youth. As volunteer Conrad Breece says, "nothing could be further from the truth." Conrad has been joined by his wife Joan in actively volunteering with youth programs for over 20 years at LOPC. "The children have enjoyed being with us because we are different from their parents — we are more like grandparents who delight in being able to give and

receive ideas, thoughts, and wisdom."

journey of Taith

Colleen Fawley shares her journey:

was raised in a family that went to church at least once each week at the First Presbyterian Church of Salt Lake City, Utah. My father was a college professor and also taught adult Sunday School. From my earliest memories, we were at church for at least two hours every Sunday. I was baptized at six months old, got my first bible in third grade, and joined the church when I was about thirteen. I remember accepting Jesus in my life at that time.

When I started college, I lived in the dorms and did not have a ride to church. My attendance fell by the wayside. I did continue to read the Bible and study the footnotes. Later, I moved to California and attended a small church in Oakland. They did not have many activities that interested me, so I joined a dance club and started staying up late on Saturday nights. Again, I quit attending church on a regular basis.

In 1997, I was told I had ovarian cancer. I prayed to God and with his help got through the surgery, chemotherapy, CAT scans, and blood tests. At this time I felt very close to God, for each

night when I went to sleep I felt I was sleeping on God's hand and that all would be well. Praise God that the cancer has not returned in 25 years. This experience did not get me back to church, but I was praying more. I also read the Bible from cover to cover with a commentary.

I started to sporadically attend Sunday services at LOPC, usually when I was dealing with an issue that was causing me some trouble. Very often, the sermon that day had the answer I was looking for. I also observed how

the members were supportive of each other in a kind and loving way. During these years, my parents passed away. I remembered the loving community in which I was raised and wanted to be part of one again. I had never stopped believing in God, and now it was time to belong to a Christian community again – and I have never looked back.

Being a member of LOPC has given me an opportunity to financially help people having hard times around the world. As a child, I wanted to be an usher, and now I am one. Recently I have started helping at The Garden on Sundays and appreciate being around children. I enjoy the Bible studies the church offers which are interesting and thought provoking. These are just some of the many great ways to grow in the Christian faith at LOPC.

My favorite Bible verse is John 3:16 "For God so loved the world, that he
gave his only Son, so that everyone
who believes in him may not perish but
may have eternal life." This was the
one I memorized in third grade when I
got my first bible and is still my favorite.
I believe that love always wins in
the end.

Healing a House Divided

with Professor Emeritus Steve Wolpert

March 3 at 10:00 a.m. in Fellowship Hall and on Zoom

rofessor Emeritus Steve Woolpert will engage the audience in an exploration on the rise of negative partisanship, the erosion of democratic norms, and the increasing support for political violence in the United States. He explains. "America's democratic institutions do not operate

in a vacuum. They are nourished by deeply rooted democratic beliefs and practices. Recently, however, significant numbers of Americans have come to endorse values that jeopardize our democratic republic. Deepening partisan animosity has made it easier for Americans to demonize and stereotype one another and harder for them to share resources and power. In a recent survey of

registered voters, 87% of respondents worried that U.S. is 'becoming less of a democracy.' In this talk I will explore not only how we got here, but more importantly what we can do together to improve the health of our democracy."

He also will discuss

his plans to launch The Center for Engaged Democracy at Saint Mary's College in Moraga. The Center will be dedicated to strengthening the foundational principles of American democracy by fostering respectful, authentic dialogue across partisan differences, promoting nonpartisan civic habits and competencies, building on a record of excellence in student voting at Saint Mary's College, and making common cause with outside

organizations that contribute to the health of American democracy.

Steve Woolpert grew up in Washington D.C. and studied history at Grinnell College in Iowa. After having received his PhD in political science from Stanford University in 1975, he embarked on a 47-year career of college teaching, specializing in the Courts, the U.S. Constitution, and environmental politics. During that time, Wolpert was named Saint Mary's College Professor of the Year and served for 12 years as the Dean of Liberal Arts. He has published numerous articles in academic journals, and he provides political commentary for Bay Area print and broadcast media. Last year he was named a distinguished alumnus of the Sidwell Friends School in Washington D.C.

With the school year more than halfway through, our Seedlings students have been making great progress in their classrooms. They are learning and growing while having a fun time with each other along the way! Here's a look at what the children have been up to in a couple of our classrooms:





Petunias

2 to 3-year-olds, taught by Miss Kim and Mr. Max

In the Petunias class, we have been busy sharing our favorite books! With the help of our awesome room parents who created a sign-up list, children have been taking turns each week bringing in a favorite story to share with friends. The Petunias get very excited to collect their books from their backpacks. announce the title or theme of the book, and pose for a picture holding their book. One friend even brought in a bag of books checked out from the library! We often hear, "I have that book at my house!" from a fellow classmate which has been a fun way to build community in the class. Children love to share about themselves and learn about their friends' favorite things. Our All About Me book filled with pictures of each child in our classroom and a list of everything from their favorite place to their favorite song, is the most well-read book in our classroom library. Sharing a loved story from home is just another special opportunity for children to share a piece of themselves with their friends.

Marigolds

3 to 4-year-olds, taught by Miss Cayte and Miss Jules ne of our goals for the Marigolds has been to incorporate more science experiments and experiences in our classroom. We've been implementing Science Fridays and it has been a hit! We've enjoyed building our students' curiosity, talking about cause and effect, and supporting them in making their own discoveries. It's been a great opportunity to introduce them to some new topics, as well as provide opportunities for turn-taking and collaboration. For our food curriculum, we recently did an experiment to find out if a variety of fruits and vegetables would sink or float. The Marigolds loved voting beforehand for team sink or team float, and then putting the veggies and fruits in the water tub to find out if their hypothesis held up. LOPC budgeted \$67,509 this year for our Per Capita obligation. We are hopeful the congregation remembers to donate to Per Capita, as we make the shift from using Pledge envelopes Wouldn't it be wonderful if a significant portion of this could be covered by your extra contribution, enabling us to add additional support to LOPC?

Financial Report

January 31, 2023

OPC was blessed to end the 2022 year strong with contributions exceeding spending by \$64,584 which has been placed into the Session Emerging Needs Fund for future ministry.

The church closed the first month of 2023 with Pledge Income trailing budget by \$112,202, with \$336,798 of contributions being received in January. Historically, January is a stronger month for Pledge giving. We will be watching the first quarter giving carefully. Non-Pledge and Loose Offering Giving were less than plan by \$9,136. Total Giving for the month was \$374,400.

Ministry Team spending of \$193,466 was less than budget by \$16,191.

January 2023 closed the month with actual net contributions exceeding ministry spending by \$180,934. Budgeted results were \$280,370, resulting in an actual shortfall relative to budget of \$105,436...

Thank you to all that have pledged so far. We encourage anyone who has not pledged to consider making a pledge so that we can continue our great ministry.

January Session Highlights

ur January 17 session meeting was hybrid and began with an enriching Spiritual Formation sharing by Elder Peter Shumaker, and the relating of recent "Joys and Concerns" by elders and clergy. Moving into the Consent Agenda, the Clerk presented matters such as plans for upcoming events and meetings, the requested annual review of LOPC policies, and the required attendance at Presbytery meetings by session members.

An overview on our Annual Leadership Retreat (see more details below) was given by Pastor Peter Whitelock, and more than 50 participants were set to attend. Peter then made the exciting announcement that Bryan Dunnewald will become our part-time Director of Music on February 1, thus enabling the Choir to return to its regular scheduling in March. Peter highlighted other staff changes including Kevin Miller's starting as Technical Operations Manager, and, very regrettably, Allison Kunz's resignation in March as Co-Director of Youth Ministries.

Elder Jim Nagle presented a positive update in his Financial Report regarding the continuing receipt of pledges and Faith Component contributions, the reduction of expenses, and progress toward our budget goal. Elder Mark Weaver lent a further expectation-perspective from the Generosity Team's involvement, reflecting on both current and past giving patterns.

In executive session, Pastor Jaime Polson gave a detailed presentation regarding the thorough process undertaken to review and consider salary and benefit increases for clergy and staff based upon all they have done and continue to do despite the challenges of this past year. After discussion, session approved motions adopting the recommended 2023 budget and the proposed salary and benefit increases. The ordained clergy increases were scheduled to be voted upon at the February 5 annual meeting.

At the on-campus Leadership Retreat on Saturday January 28, Peter made a very informative presentation covering the demographics of the LOPC congregation and surrounding counties. We viewed and discussed data in many key areas, such as age groups, race and ethnicity, employment, household income and children, social media preferences, and (perhaps most importantly) peoples' lists of major concerns and what they are looking for in a church. Pastors Jaime, Lauren Gully and Chris Baldwin gave their reflections into the impact on their respective ministries and ways in which they are responding. Leaders then broke out into small groups that had very insightful discussions and reported back on what else they have noticed on these issues and how we can better connect and meet the needs of our church community going forward.

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
