announce a service trip to Guatemala with 20 high school youth to visit long-time LOPC mission partner, Fotokids. Serving over a thousand at-risk children affected by poverty and violence, Fotokids gives children a chance to dream of a better life, using photography, graphic design, media technology, and vocational training experience as a tools for self-expression, creativity, leadership, and future employment. LOPC youth are looking forward to working with the students and learning how they document their lives through the lens of a camera as they share what they have learned about

photography and digital art. This cultural exchange of thoughts, hopes, and dreams between the students will leave a lasting impact on our youth. In addition to working alongside the students of Fotokids, LOPC will help prepare food baskets for Fotokids families and plant avocado trees.

for Pediatric Patients and Their Mothers in Zimbabwe

# Hygiene Kits for Pediatric Patients and Parent

(All contents should be placed in a gallon-size Ziploc bag)

- Adult toothbrush
- · Child toothbrush
- Travel-size tube of toothpaste
- A full-size bar of soap, preferably Dove or similar
- A travel-size container of shampoo
- A travel -size container of hand sanitizer
- A simple 'Get Well' message or drawing

JF Kapnek Trust, one of LOPC's mission partners, has worked for decades to support women and children's health in Zimbabwe. In recent years, the Kapnek Trust spearheaded the creation of the only children's hospital in the entire country, located in Harare. This 250-bed hospital treats children who are seriously ill, struggling with burns, trauma, appendicitis, or infectious diseases such as pneumonia. Most of the patients come from rural areas and parents often stay with the child during the hospitalization.

Last spring, the LOPC community created over 600 personal hygiene kids that were distributed to mothers and children at the hospital. Many of the kits also included written words of encouragement to the

patient and family— tangible messages of God's love, good will, best wishes for a complete recovery, and safe travels home.

On May 14, an opportunity to help is offered us once again. You are invited to create a Hygiene Kit for the Zimbabwe children and family reaching half way around the world with a message of hope. Please drop off completed kits to the church office by Mother's Day, Sunday, May 14. Kapnek Trust will ship them as part of a large relief container to the Children's Hospital in Harare, Zimbabwe.

### **Interfaith Update**

After conversations with Temple Isaiah about how LOPC can be a good neighbor to the synagogue, the unfortunate need for increased security measures to address the steep rise of antisemitism over the past few years has become abundantly apparent. To this end, LOPC thought that it was appropriate to show support with a financial gift. This past March, the Mission Team in partnership, with the Deacon Community Fund, made a



\$5,000 donation to Temple Isaiah for their fundraising efforts for much needed security improvements on their campus in Lafayette.

While we also desire more programming and events that speak to an increased awareness of the rise

of antisemitism and how to respond to hate, we view this contribution as a continued step in a long-valued friendship with Temple Isaiah and LOPC's important interfaith work in the community.

Senior Rabbi of Temple Isaiah Jill Pearlman, responded: "We truly value our friendship and look forward to the many ways we will stand by one another in the years to come."

### **LOPC Helping Refugees**

A little over a year ago, as we began to witness the many refugees fleeing the ongoing war in Ukraine, a group of LOPC members asked the question, could we do more to help the growing numbers of those seeking refuge right here in our own community? Since last May, this group has been exploring ways to help.

In May 2022, the group met with Dr. Jane Pak, co-director of Refugee and Immigrant Transitions (RIT), a nonprofit operating in the Bay Area that provides free education, family engagement, and community leadership programs for refugees. Dr. Pak enlightened us to the formidable and often multiyear process required for refugees and other displaced persons to fully integrate into our communities. Since that initial introduction, the group has been educating itself on the many different classifications of refugees which include asylum seekers, immigrants, visa holders, Temporary Protected Status, and more. The group has also become more aware of the various local service providers working with refugees in Contra Costa County. From multiple interviews with over a half dozen organizations, we've learned what each organization does and how long each assists a given family.

Throughout the process, we've considered how the LOPC community might become involved. At the most recent group meeting, it was decided to work with the Extended Family Program (EFP), organized through Walnut Creek United Methodist

Church. EFP assists recently unhoused and refugee families by providing furniture and household items to transform empty apartments into homes. It is an all-volunteer organization serving families with dignity and a warm, loving, hands-on personal touch as they move forward into their new lives.

Last year saw EFP helping 59 families.

With no end in sight for the demand in their services, volunteers from Walnut Creek UMC as well as Lafayette Christian Church are now in the process of obtaining a 501(c)3 status as a nonprofit, making it much easier to secure funds through grants.

LOPC member Randi Long has generously agreed to coordinate LOPC's initial collaboration with EFP. Volunteers meet weekly on Tuesdays at Walnut Creek UMC (1543 Sunnyvale Ave) to sort donated furniture and household goods. On Fridays or Saturdays, volunteers move furniture and boxes of household items into a family's new apartment.

The group will continue to meet to identify other volunteer opportunities, seeking to fully understand the time commitment organizations request and training required so that they can better communicate needs to those in the LOPC community interested in volunteering.

ontinuing in its work to form →relationships with communities of color, the Racial Equity and Engagement Team at LOPC has completed six months of consultation work with Rev. Sandhya Jha which included two recent church-wide events: "Our History, Our Power, Our Possibilities" in early February and "The Spiritual Practice of Advocacy" in late April. After the team's time with The Rev. Jha and after these two church educational events, The team is now planning opportunities for LOPC for the fall and next spring. True to our founding documents, our team continues to prioritize bringing about a new ERA for our church. For our team, ERA stands for:

**Education:** In an effort to grow in our understanding of racial inequity, including systemic and institutional racism, the team is planning to offer a book study and video series in partnership with LOPC's small group ministry this fall, including a final gathering across all participating groups. Please look for more information in late summer.

Relationships: Part of the team's initial charge is to form relationships with communities of color. We are excited to look forward to building relationships with other churches of color in an awareness trip to a local Japanese Internment Camp that we plan to offer in conjunction with other churches in 2024.

Advocacy: Throughout the past year, our team has been piloting a partnership with a local non-profit that focuses on advocacy and the overlap of current social issues with racism. We're continuing to evaluate this relationship and explore advocacy opportunities with them. Meanwhile, the team is also planning an event on responding to hate crimes, including hate crimes that target other faith traditions.

As always, we would like to thank the LOPC congregation for it's continued support of the team's efforts. We look forward to having you join us for one of our upcoming programs or events!

### **Deacons: Serving the Congregation & Community**

OPC Deacons are a group of about 30 members, each serving a three-year term, to care for members of the LOPC community. As one of the elected, ordained bodies of the church, deacons are charged to show "compassion, witness, and service, representing the ministry of the church in the world and the presence of the world in the church." Their compassionate volunteer spirit puts a friendly face on service to our brothers and sisters at LOPC. Below is a list of just some of the many ways deacons serve the LOPC community:

#### **Memorials:**

Deacons help facilitate memorial receptions. We work alongside families and LOPC staff to provide a gracious and supportive venue for family and friends to gather following a memorial service. In coordination with the family, we serve refreshments to the attendees - who may number several hundred - and receive and display catered and floral deliveries. In addition, deacons provide coffee, tea, water, punch and homemade cookies, as well as table settings and paper goods. In 2023, Deacons hosted 23 memorial receptions – that's more than 120 individual volunteers.

### **Sanctuary Communion:**

Deacons prepare the elements of grape juice and bread for Communion services on the first Sunday of each month, plus some special Sundays. As you probably realize, this task changes as times require. Prior to the pandemic, LOPC routinely used intinction (dipping a piece of bread into the juice). Since then LOPC has moved to individual packets of juice and wafers, and currently we provide squares of bread and individual cups of juice. Deacons, along with elders, help the pastors in serving all who come forward to receive Communion.

# Home Visits & Home Communion:

After years of severely limited social opportunities, deacons can now visit you at home, in-hospital, in a care facility, or meet you wherever you are. During your visit, if you would like the deacon team to serve Communion, let us know and we can do that! They can also provide at-home Communion packets for those who would like to use them along with the Livestream service.

### **Deacon Community Care Fund:**

The DCCF is a special service for LOPC members and friends who need one-time confidential financial help. This can be a life-saver for someone with a sudden unexpected need, a leg-up, or some special care for one of LOPC's mission partners.

### **Outreach:**

LOPC has a special place in the Lamorinda Community, and deacons look for ways to extend outreach into the community. The Outreach team has a special interest in coordinating with local schools around mental health support for children, youth, and their families. For instance, in 2022, in partnership with the Acalanes School District, LOPC hosted an event on suicide prevention that served over 350 community members. Last March , deacons hosted speaker Julie Lythcott-Haims as she spoke on "Raising Healthy Adults." More than 400 community members attended the event, whichwas co-hosted by Acalanes, Moraga, and Orinda School Districts.

### **Home Meals:**

Deacons have historically kept home-cooked meals in the freezer for delivery to those who are sick, just home from the hospital, have a new baby, or other need. That is now being expanded and may eventually be replaced by catered or takeout meals. Deacons can provide meals for families of any size, or who have special requirements, gluten-free or vegetarian as an example.

### **Transportation:**

Deacons hope to begin offering this service in the Fall, to members who sometimes need a ride to church or Thursday Fellowship. Check back in future issues for further developments.

### Other:

Deacons also help with various church events and activities such as the Fall Fest and more!

### **Gaining Ground**

The Importance of Conserving Land and the Critical Challenges Facing Our Society. May 5 at 10:00 a.m. in Fellowship Hall and on Zoom

inus Eukel's topic for this month's First Friday Forum is "Gaining Ground: The Importance of Conserving Land and the Critical Challenges Facing Our Society."

Issues of land conservation will be addressed at this month's First Friday Forum, featuring speaker

Linus Eukel. Eukel joined John Muir Land Trust (JMLT) in 2004 where he serves as executive director. He works closely with the board of directors, staff, and regional community to help achieve JMLT's ongoing mission of permanently protecting the places that make the East Bay special. Eukel is also a member, elder, and past clerk of session of LOPC, board member and past board chair of the California Council of Land Trusts, board member and co-chair of the East Bay Leadership Council's Infrastructure Task Force and board member of the Warren W. Eukel Teacher Trust.

As he explains, "The John Muir Land Trust (JMLT) protects and cares for open space, ranches, farms, parkland and shoreline in Contra Costa and Alameda Counties. Since its founding

30 years ago, JMLT has become one of the leading forces for conservation in northern California. With more than 3,500 acres protected, many beautiful places in the East Bay are permanently preserved for recreation and wildlife habitat. The JMLT team believes that the vitality of

our natural open spaces is essential to the health of our earth, air, water, native plants and animals - and all of us." Acquiring land is at the heart of what the Land Trust does. It identifies and purchases open spaces that should be conserved in a natural state and enjoyed by everyone. It carefully stewards these properties by providing low-impact opportunities for public recreation while protecting the needs of wild residents.

The energetic JMLT community of supporters has protected a diverse collection of special places. These range from small community gardens to former ranches covering hundreds of acres. These remarkable places all have one thing in common, they have been preserved forever by the John Muir Land Trust, providing outdoor recreation, protected habitat for wildlife, stunning scenic beauty, sources of pure drinking water, natural economic benefits, and close-tohome places where young people can experience nature and learn about our shared environment.

"Foresighted people shaped the beautiful natural landscape where we live today," Eukel explains. "The lands protected by JMLT are an inspiring window into that past and a hope for what's to come. The challenges of waves of population growth in the last century were huge and population pressure will become even more intense over the coming years. It's an endgame; the next few decades will shape the East Bay forever. We urgently need to permanently protect our remaining essential wild lands to ensure an abundant, biodiverse future for nature...and all of us. JMLT is proud to be advancing a many decades-long effort to conserve the places that make the East Bay special. The next few decades will define the character of this region for generations to come likely forever. Come see how the Trust is working to make this happen."

Pastor Lauren Gully opened with Spiritual Formation based on Howard Thurman's "The Sound of the Genuine" and the quest for each of us to find our own true inner guide.

Reports included a summary of the March 5 Interfaith Program held at LOPC regarding the recent U.S. Supreme Court decisions on abortion and prayer in the public schools, presented by Elder Terry Clark, who spoke on the legal issues, and Pastor Peter Whitelock joined by clergy from Temple Isaiah and the San Ramon Valley Islamic Center. The program

focused on how the Court's decisions impact our freedom to practice each of our faiths. About 130 people (in person and online) from our respective faiths attended.

Peter discussed the annual goalplanning process where each LOPC ministry team is requested to deliberate on its goals for the coming year. The "25 Good Things" we learned from the January Leadership Retreat were offered as resources for goal-setting consideration; and the templates for the criteria and goal determinations will be sent to each elder for their respective teams' deliberations to be concluded by June 15.

The status of the pending search,

screening, and interview process planned for Co-Youth Director and Children's Ministry Director was presented by Pastor Jaime Polson. She then provided highlights of her well-deserved sabbatical (starting after Easter, until June 2) involving a good mix of study on prayer in our lives, time with family, and travel stays in South Carolina and Europe.

Elder Jeff Patton reported that the Church Nominating Committee (CNC) is beginning its annual process to identify candidates for the 2024 Classes of Session and Deacons.

### **Financial Update**

OPC is off to a good financial start for the first quarter of 2023. We are truly blessed to have a supportive congregation and staff that make this possible.

Year-to-date, March total contributions came in at \$820,644, slightly trailing our budgeted levels of \$821,470. Pledge giving is lower than planned by \$104,441. We are encouraged by historical annual giving trends which are usually higher than annual pledged levels. A generous estate gift to the church of \$67,500, and higher mission and special gifts giving of \$34,393, offset the shortfall in pledge giving. The donor also left a legacy gift to the LOPC Foundation.

Most ministry teams are at or below budgeted spending. Year-to-date expenses of \$877,442, are lower than budget by \$9,752, excluding spending for mission and special gifts. Operations is experiencing higher gas utility rates than plan by about \$15,000, despite measures to lower and conserve gas usage on campus.

LOPC ended the three-month period with a \$56,798 shortfall of net contributions. The budgeted net contribution was also a shortfall of \$31,431 for the same period. Please consider pledging if you have not done so already. Thank you to those who have pledged and made contributions in 2023, you are making LOPC's ministry possible.

### Seeking New Church Leaders for terms beginning January 1, 2024!

ne of the cornerstones of our Presbyterian heritage is the annual election by the congregation of church officers to provide leadership for the church. It is a privilege and responsibility to nominate members to serve as elected lay leaders. It is also necessary for us to participate in the essential process that will influence our church in the near future.

## The primary qualifications for nominees are:

Elders, Elders, together with the pastors, lead and direct the ministry of the church. They are persons of faith, dedication, and good judgment. Elders serve on session, the governing body of the church. They also chair various church teams through which all ministries are conducted. Eight elders are ordained annually to serve three-year terms. At the time of producing this issue of FOCUS, the following teams need an elder assigned in 2024:

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Care, Children, Communications, Fellowship, Mission, and Youth. Once the 2024 Clerk of Session is determined, there will be an additional team that will need an elder.

**Deacons**, as set forth in Scripture, are leaders who serve as the caring, compassionate arm of the church. They provide loving support to all those in need within the church community. The primary area of deacon service is care of members. Ten deacons are ordained annually to serve a three-year term and two deacons of high-school age to serve a one-year term.

Foundation Trustees serve on the LOPC Foundation. This nine-member foundation receives gifts in various forms and designations, manages investments, and provides funding for LOPC needs that cannot be accommodated in the church's annual operating budget. Trustees serve an initial term of four years and are eligible to be re-elected for one three-

year term. Members who have served in the past can be nominated for a two-year term.

The Congregation Nominating Committee (CNC) members are elected for a one-year term. Their duties include receiving and reviewing nominations for church officers and selecting candidates to present to the congregation.
