




celebrate... IT'S SUMMER!

s a result of a recently received designated gift towards global hunger relief efforts, LOPC's Mission team presented information about ways to combat hunger at a talk in fall 2022. This discussion touched on common causes of food insecurity including war and conflict, poverty, climate change, as well as race and gender inequality. The team saw this as an opportunity to expand its reach beyond the work LOPC is currently engaged in. Interested LOPC members researched and prayerfully considered how LOPC might best distribute funds to address hunger outside the United States. Two organizations, World Central Kitchen and Vijana Africa Malawi stood out as ways LOPC could impact global hunger.

World Central Kitchen

To meet an immediate need for food, a donation was sent to World Central Kitchen in the amount of \$9,470.75 following the devastating earthquake in Turkey and Syria in February. The organization served over 1 million meals in the first week alone, and over 10 million meals in total. World Central Kitchen continues supporting survivors and first responders in hard hit areas by setting up shelters and providing meals.



Vijana Africa Malawi

This organization empowers women who struggle against poverty and hunger through rabbit farming. Vijana Africa has empowered 81 widows to economic self-reliance. Most of the beneficiaries are widows, single mothers, and women living with disabilities. LOPC's donation of \$3,600 will help to build enclosures for rabbits within the refugee camp for enterprising women, creating an ongoing opportunity to provide food and income that help with school fees and other necessities.





CHILDREN OF FAITH MISSIONS

n March, for a fourth time, I had the chance to visit LOPC mission partner Children of Faith, a safe home and educational program in Visakhapatnam, India. My first trip was over nine years ago with LOPC's high school youth group. Since then, each trip to COF leaves an imprint on my heart, and each child at COF shines such a light. You can't help but be uplifted by their pure spirits, their smiles, and their resilience. For two weeks, I spent time with the children, reconnecting with the older ones, and getting to know the new kids. We laughed, talked, ate, played, and worshiped together.

As a newly appointed member of the COF Board, I took over 6,000 photos (some by me, some by the children) for COF's website, marketing materials, and social media channels. Rosie Thandu, COF co-founder, and the teachers helped me to get questionnaire responses from each child, with hope to bring more attention to children's personalities into our efforts. Witnessing Rosie and Anand at work in India, it's inspiring to see them dedicate their lives to raising these 120 children. They work 24/7 to create a better future for the children in their care and in the community.

I was also able to see some of the children I met on my first trip back in 2014, now grown up! Jeebon was 13 when I first visited COF, and he is now studying civil engineering at one of the best colleges in the area. Anjali is happily married with a one-year-old daughter. David and Amos are COF staff now, caring for small children just as they once were. It is great to see the children from COF flourish and lead happy, productive lives. My only regret is not staying longer to spend more time with them, but I know that no matter the trip length, it never seems to be long enough!

Stephen Ministers walk with those in need of care through one of life's valleys – a loss, a transition, a health challenge, and more. In such seasons, one can benefit from a loving



Believing in the church and the community, LOPC Deacons ask, "How can we pitch in?" and respond to God's call to love and serve by supporting others. Teams and individuals offer loving hands and hearts in so many ways, including leading memorial receptions, communion preparation, home visits, meals after hospitalizations, one-time urgent financial support, and more.

Teacher Appreciation Week




On May 2-5, Seedlings celebrated it's incredible teachers with a western-themed week of fun. To start off the week, the school was decorated with special sheriff badges that included

Financial Update

OPC is in a good financial position for the first four months of 2023. We are truly blessed to have a supportive congregation and staff that make this possible. Year-to-date, April total contributions totaled \$1,204,411, slightly ahead of budgeted levels of \$1,191,992. Something to note, pledge giving is below budget by \$168,801, but we are optimistic. Historical annual pledge giving trends, which are usually higher than annual pledged levels, provides some insight that this trend will self-correct as of year-end.

In 2023, LOPC was blessed with two unbudgeted gifts. In April, a member gave a gift of thanks and praise of \$70,800, which is reflected in non-pledge member gifts. In March, LOPC received \$67,500 from an estate bequest. The bequest also left a legacy gift to the LOPC Foundation. The two gifts nearly offset the year-to-date shortfall in pledge giving. Mission and special gifts of exceeded budget by \$35,793, contributing favorably to year-to-date results.

Most ministry teams are at or below budgeted spending. Year-to-date expenses of \$1,022,490, are below budget by \$23,101, excluding spending for mission and special gifts. Personnel spending is lower than plan due in part to the open positions in Youth & Children's Ministry.

LOPC ended the four-month period with \$95,057 of net contributions, close to budget. Please consider

pledging if you haven't yet done. We appreciate all those who have heeded our requests to make timely pledge gifts, to help us align more closely with budget. Thank you to those who have pledged and made contributions in 2023

Session accepted the report of the Personnel Committee approving Pastor Chris Baldwin's sabbatical to start in June. Chris then gratefully provided a great synopsis of his plans: some family resting, date nights with wife Carly, local travel, study with colleagues, and

a terrific travel itinerary in Greece and Italy. At this point, Executive Session was called, where Chris gave a moving presentation regarding his call to a ministry of serving and equipping. Session discussed and then adopted a motion to call a Congregation Meeting on May 7 to vote for approval of Chris' status from a Designated Associate Pastor to permanent Associate Pastor.

Elder Jeff Patton reported that the work of the Church Nominating Committee is underway, and requests are being made for needed 2024 Elder, Deacon, and Foundation positions.

National Geographic Expedition Through the Northwest Passage

June 2 at 10:00 a.m. in Fellowship Hall and on Zoom

ong-time member of LOPC, Dr. Joseph Whitehouse, retired dentist, world traveler, and photographer, will speak on "A National



Geographic Expedition Through the Northwest Passage: Nome to Greenland."

Joe caught the travel bug 50 years ago while in the Air Force stationed in Okinawa. Since then, he has traveled to every continent and 157 countries, along with his wife, Arnette. He is driven to travel by his curiosity and

For centuries the famous Northwest Passage has had an almost mystical reputation as one of the harshest nautical endeavors: to find a direct western route from Europe to Asia. Between the end of 15th and the 20th centuries, the European colonial powers dispatched explorers in an attempt to discover a commercial sea route to Asia traveling north and west around North America.

Joe will share his experiences on a voyage with the National Geographic ship Endurance where he visited Canadian and Alaskan Inuit villages, observed polar bears crossing the Artic Ocean, explored majestic fjords, and learned about historic failed voyages from centuries past. "A National Geographic expedition has no fixed schedule or route, only a finish date and destination," Joe says. "This initial voyage of the Endurance and the recent commercial ship traffic through

the Northwest Passage are only possible due to climate change and the associated melting of sea ice."

Joe has served as an LOPC deacon and has given many well-received travel presentations at LOPC, sharing with guests a selection of his excellent photography. He earned his Masters in marriage and family counseling, which he applied in his practice to help patients with their fears around treatment.


Paige Carpenter
