




Giving Thanks

What are you the most grateful for these days?

Whenever November rolls around on my calendar, I'm immediately transported to one of my favorite holidays – Thanksgiving! I LOVE Thanksgiving Day – a feast with family and loved ones centered on the practice of gratitude. In my family, we generally have a potluck meal to which everyone contributes so that not just one person or family is or the hosting responsibilities. We cook



I like Thanksgiving because for me it's a reminder of our Christian practices of being a people who rejoice and give thanks regardless of our circumstances – which can actually be a pretty challenging practice when life is just downright dark and we've been through a tremendous amount of pain. Paul writes in 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18:

"Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."

Acknowledging that many of us have entered November in various places in our walks of faith with Jesus, I wonder, how do you practice gratitude in all circumstances? A radical gratitude, no matter what life throws at you.

I want to invite you into a prayer practice of gratitude that you can do any time of day. This practice is a breathing prayer and here's how to play with it: take a deep breath in, counting to four and then breathe out, counting to seven. On each breath in, breathe in gratitude, "Thank you, God." Then on each breath out, breathe out gratitude, "Thank you, God." Maybe a specific person, activity, project, or blessing will come to mind as you do this...or maybe not. Regardless, it's an opportunity to give thanks for another gift of breath, a grace of life that we freely take in and blow out.

Friends, what are you most grateful for these days? May we bask our lives in gratitude, giving thanks in all circumstances because that is God's will for each of us in Christ Jesus. Happy November!



Financial Update

OPC is thankful for a generous congregation! Consequently the church is in a solid financial position after the first nine months of 2023.

Contributions totaled \$2,681,527, ahead of the \$2,522,215 budget. Many components factored into that. While pledge giving was lower by \$63,348, we are optimistic for the full year. LOPC was blessed by a total of \$138,328, from a member's gift of thanks and praise and an estate bequest.

These gifts eliminated the need to draw \$93,210 from the session's reserve fund. Non-pledge and loose offerings, and other income, were \$31,142 ahead of plan. Mission and special gifts exceeded budget by \$105,743, contributing favorably to year-to-date congregational giving. We raised and deployed more than \$27,000 for Maui relief. Seedlings closed the 2022-2023 school year with an additional contribution to the church of \$23,541, resulting from higher summer tuition rates. LOPC had a \$11,985 reduction in user fees and memorials, offset by \$29,101 in investment income, which wasn't budgeted.

Most ministry teams operated at or below budget. Excluding spending for mission and special gifts, year-to-date expenses totaled \$2,431,256, which was \$64,602 below budget. Much of this improvement stems from reduced spending for personnel, children's ministry, and worship teams, offset by higher spending for utilities and repairs to the heating, air conditioning and ventilation systems.

Overall, we ended the nine months with contributions exceeding expenses, resulting in a surplus of \$65,497, instead of the expected \$52,714 shortfall. LOPC is truly blessed to have strong support from the congregation

December Finance Giving Deadline for Tax Purposes

f you plan to make a year-end gift, LOPC must receive your mailed donation (postmarked 12/30/2023) or in-person by 5:00 p.m. on December 31, 2022. There can be no exceptions.

If you are making a stock gift, please notify our accountant, Farah Mohammadzai, (x229) with the type of stock it is, and how the gift should be applied. It must be in LOPC's brokerage account by December 30, 2023.

Please do not file your 2023 tax return until you receive your year-end LOPC statements, with written acknowledgment of your gifts to LOPC, which will be mailed in January 2024. Thank you for your generous giving to LOPC!

Double Your Blessings

There are many ways to give of your time, talent, and treasure to LOPC. In the past few years, some of LOPC's seniors have found that federal income tax law changes provide an even more tax-efficient pathway for giving arising from Investment Retirement Accounts - IRAs.

Seniors may benefit more directly from federal tax law changes because qualified contribution deductions directly reduce adjusted gross income. This has allowed some seniors to increase their giving to LOPC because of new income tax benefits:

- Higher standard deductions available to all taxpayers increased concurrently with limitations on certain itemized deductions.
- New qualified contribution deductions are available to taxpayers who are required to take age-related distributions from their IRAs.

If you are a senior and interested in learning more, please confer with your tax advisor to learn if it is advantageous to fund your LOPC giving out of your required IRA distributions. Thank you for remembering LOPC in your end-of-year giving.

Kim Brooks is one of the amazing teachers at Seedlings. Students and families know her as the kind, friendly, and fun teacher of the Petunias class. This month we interviewed her so you can get to know her as well.

Q: How long have you been at Seedlings? What was your background before joining?

Kim: This is my eighth year at Seedlings. My background is in interior design, working in design for 15 years. I took a pause to stay home with my girls (now 13 and 16) for five years. When it was time to go back, I just wasn't excited about returning to my design career. I had fallen in love with preschool, with both of my girls going to two different preschools in two different states. When my little one was ready to go on to elementary school, I wasn't ready to leave preschool, so I decided not to.

I went back to school myself and got my early childhood-education credits. I was thinking that I would start by substituting at first, but going to church at LOPC, I saw in the bulletin that Seedlings was looking for another preschool teacher. I went in and interviewed and got the job. I went from intending to sub and learn more about teaching, but ended up with a full-time job right out of the gate. Looking back, it was the perfect timing and the perfect place. I found a home at Seedlings, and it has been fantastic ever since.

Q: Tell us more about the Petunias class!

Kim: Most teachers at Seedlings have taught in a variety of classrooms, but

I've been with the Petunias the whole time! Petunias are two-to-three years olds, and I just love the age. They grow so much in the course of this year. A lot are new to preschool. We work on the most simple things, like the routine of the day, lining up together, opening our own lunch boxes, etc. We start out with basic skills, but by the end of the year they are so capable. They'll be cleaning up the room in two minutes, helping each other tie shoes, and getting their backpacks together. It makes it hard to let them go!

What I love about the Petunias is just how curious and inventive they are. They ask "why" all the time, and they are excited to learn new things and do things for themselves. Plus, at this age, children don't get embarrassed yet. They are free to be silly and dance and have the most fun!

Q: What are your typical days like at Seedlings?

Kim: On Mondays we collaborate with teaching teams. We've already established the curriculum for the month, but sometimes the kids express what they want to do, and we incorporate that. We try to be flexible.

For the Petunias, it's all about free play. We give them opportunities to get involved in whatever project they want to do, whether it's building, dramatic play, or art. We do a lot of free art, where we give them materials and let them create. Lots of paint ends up on their hands and faces, and that's okay too! They love being read to. At this age, books really calm and excite children at the same time. We have outside time as well. The Petunias

are learning in all of their play: how to share space, share materials, and share attention. We start to hear things like "excuse me" and "can I use that when you're done?" These are all good lessons.

Q: What do you like best about Seedlings? What makes it special?

Kim: The people! Our administrators, Coleen and Kathy, are fantastic - so supportive and encouraging. That trickles down to the staff, who are all so professional and creative. They each make you want to be a better teacher. And also the community that we serve. The parents are awesome, and we feel very appreciated and supported by them.

Q: Favorite Seedlings memory?

Kim: My family are backyard beekeepers. One day during insect week at Summer at Seedlings, my family came in and did a presentation on beekeeping. My husband came in his beekeeper suit, and my daughters came, and we did a skit. We worked on it as a family and memorized it and presented it to all of the students. The preschoolers were so enthralled listening to my girls, it was so fun to see. We turned all the kids into honeybees, putting tape on their pants and shorts to make pollen pockets and hid paper balls of pollen around the playground for them to collect and trade in for a spoonful of honey when they were done. It was such a special day because it was my two worlds coming together: my family and my school.

September Session Highlights

Session gathered for its September meeting in the welcoming home of Elder Lee O'Haver, who not only served a wonderful dinner, but also fittingly opened our meeting with Spiritual Formation based upon a "Blessing" poem for a season of change as a new beginning.

Under the Consent Agenda, Session approved motions to revise the LOPC By-Laws for the election of Deacons to include no less than 20 and no more than 30 active members, including two youth active members; and to approve the slate of CNC nominees for elder, deacon and CNC terms starting January 1, 2024, to be presented to the Congregation for election on Sunday, September 24. Elder Jeff Patton, chair of the CNC, thanked the members of the CNC team for all their efforts in solidifying this great group of potential new officers.

The Clerk's report included plans for all future Session meetings to

be in person, and consensus was also reached that we would gather early at 6:45 pm with snacks and the opportunity for some "catch up" and "getting to know you better" time together. Installation/Ordination of nominees elected on September 24 will be held during worship on November 12; and the new elders will be invited to the November and December session meetings so they can meet and get to know members of session.

As explained by Pastor Peter Whitelock, the reconfiguration of Session will involve new elders for digital outreach to connect a broader audience with LOPC's programs and ministries, and for representation of the Racial Equity and Engagement Team on Session. Peter also announced that review of the Communications position has determined that the digital design/graphic work formally done by the departed Jon Corry will be outsourced and the print-related responsibilities

are being taken over by Lexi Morrissey.

Elder Jim Nagle, on behalf of the Finance Committee, provided a positive report on LOPC's financial position as we look forward to year-end giving and outlined the working dates for processing next year's budget prior to its submission to Session in December.

Trustee Andy Gill, in an update on Foundation deliberations, noted that their By-Laws provide for between 7 to 9 members, but with all but 2 having served on Session. They are working on a proposal to build some more flexibility into membership criteria while still requiring a majority of the Trustees to have Session experience, and they hope to present a final proposal to Session for approval in October.

Pastor Peter Whitelock closed the meeting in prayer.

Thursday Work Crew

Preserving LOPC by focusing on projects big and small.

You only have to set foot on campus to be blown away by the majestic beauty of the grounds and buildings of Lafayette-Orinda Presbyterian Church. The towering sanctuary with its stained-glass windows, the lively Christian Learning Center, and the peaceful Kurth Memorial Garden with its seasonal flora and soothing fountain all blend to make the church a living testament to faith, community, and history. Maintaining an array of buildings and grounds requires dedicated effort, and a group of passionate volunteers have risen to the occasion: the Thursday Work Crew. Their call to action is rooted in a deep love for their church and the desire to ensure its prosperity. They meet each Thursday with lists of tasks in hand and set about their business improving the campus.

The volunteers who make up the Thursday Work Crew come from varied backgrounds, but they share a common passion for sustaining LOPC. Some are skilled craftsmen with experience in carpentry, painting, electricity, or plumbing, while others are simply enthusiastic individuals with a willingness to learn and help. The crew currently consists of seven core members under the leadership of longtime church member, Rich Lewis. With Susie Able, Don Couch, Kathy Bradshaw, Bruce Kronmiller, Terry Gleason, and Jeff Spires on the case, a multitude of tasks is achieved in quick time.

The projects undertaken by this dedicated group are as diverse as the skills they bring to the table. From keeping rain gutters free of debris to refurbishing gates and fences and even building new lids to accommodate the organic waste











requirement for the bins on the plaza, their work spans a wide range of tasks. Fixing leaky faucets and repairing exterior lamps in the parking lot are tackled while simultaneously trees are trimmed and old remnants are demolished.

One of the most significant projects taken on by the Thursday Work Crew was the creation of the Howard Robbins Room. While many churchgoers may never visit this space, the room, which sits on the back left side of the sanctuary, provides much needed storage for less-often used items for the chancel and narthex of the sanctuary such as pedestals, ladders, and flower-arranging supplies. It is used each week by the facilities crew and improves the flow of supplies, making changeovers smooth and seamless.

LOPC Responds to Needs of New Refugees

xtended Family Program (EFP), a **L**joint partnership between Walnut Creek United Methodist Church and Lafayette Christian Church, has extended its thanks to LOPC for helping turn empty apartments into homes for refugees, as well as previously homeless families from Shelter, Inc. and Winter Nights Family Shelter, two of LOPC's mission partners.

Since August, numerous LOPC members have been generous in their donations of tables and chairs, small -to-medium-sized dressers, and sofas for small apartments. These items are generally accepted immediately because of the need to furnish apartments quickly.

However, acceptance of furniture also depends on current inventory since storage space for furniture is so limited. It can depend on an item's size as the apartments being furnished are small and can't usually accommodate large pieces. If you have furniture to donate, please send photos and dimensions to Randi Long at hrlong13@sbcglobal.net. If it's approved, EFP will arrange for pick up.

Besides furniture, EFP also thanks LOPC members who have given smaller household items that turn these apartments into homes, such as: towels, bedding, lamps, kitchenware, clock radios, ironing boards, hair dryers, children's books and toys, new stuffed animals, and similar items.

Donations can be dropped off Tuesday mornings from 10:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. at the United Methodist Church at 1543 Sunnyvale Ave. (near the Treat Blvd. exit). Please park in the lower parking lot, descend the stairs, enter a large room, and proceed to its rear left corner to the donation storeroom. Donated items must be in very good condition with no damage. Please note EFP can't accept clothing, mattresses, bed frames, cribs, tall bar stools, motoroperated recliners, or glass-top tables.
