"Look, the virgin Mary shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him 'Emmanuel,'

which means, 'God is with us.'" Matthew 1:23

On December 3, we begin the liturgical season of Advent. This is a fancy way of saying the church will begin a new year as marked by the Christian calendar and the season of Advent. The word advent comes from a

Latin word, adventus, which means arrival or coming.

This seems ordinary enough, but if you take a minute to really think about it, Advent is a time where we are shown that God loves each one of us so very much that he sent Jesus to come and minister directly to people. The very people God created to love God and to be loved by God! It's awe inspiring! Scripture in the book of Matthew tells us that this is God's way to come closer to us and share lived experience among us. Emmanuel – God with us. This season we are reminded to slow down and live into the joy that the birth of Jesus brings us as individuals, as a community, and for the world.

What is our spiritual work during Advent? To stand in awe of Jesus. To spend time giving thanks to God for the gift of Jesus, whether through prayer, worship, devotionals, time with family and friends remembering God's love, or service to others. To take time to quiet our minds, our busy lives, and pray for the people Jesus loves (everyone). To take time and remember the people hurting and suffering in our world and make this a season where we give generously of ourselves to others that they, too, may know that God is with them.

As a church, we will celebrate this joyous time together by worshiping each Sunday during Advent and lighting the Advent candles, seeking to live out the messages of the candles during the four weeks of Advent – hope, peace, joy, and love. Christmas Eve, we light the Christ candle – the reminder that God is love and that we are rooted in God's love. "Whoever lives in love, lives in God and God in them" (1 John 4:16b).

Beginning November 19, LOPC will provide an Advent Devotional for you and your family. We hope you will take one and participate with us as we prepare our hearts and make way for Emmanuel.

#### Special Offering of Hope and Healing

Benefitting Kapnek Trust and Healing Hearts

Each Christmas, LOPC lifts up organizations to the congregation that help improve the lives of others. This Christmas season, we want to provide an opportunity to give "a gift of hope and healing" to children in Zimbabwe and the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC).

The Kapnek Trust, led by local pediatrician, Dr. Robbins, supports programs saving thousands of children each year from HIV infection, providing early childhood education, critical daily sustenance, and regular health care for thousands more. Kapnek also improves the lives of hundreds of disabled children through treatment and reducing the stigma once associated with disability. They focus on providing nourishment daily to preschool children throughout Zimbabwe guaranteeing all children receive at least one nutritious meal daily.

This year, part of the funds we collect will be to purchase medication boxes



for over 45 schools in Zimbabwe to provide health and healing for children and families in those communities.

Healing Hearts is a trauma healing program based out of the DRC. This Bible-based curriculum was created to help those who have been harshly affected by violence. The program, with the help of trained facilitators, goes into villages where occupants have been left traumatized by ongoing war in the Eastern Congo. Healing Hearts facilitators help children and women work through their trauma and navigate toward a road of healing. Since 2016, there have been five training sessions resulting in 60 facilitators being trained, and well over 3,000 children have received benefits of this ministry.

This year, part of the funds we donate will provide training in 2024 for new facilitators and master facilitators to run the program and supervise others in this much needed ministry.

The First Friday Forum speaker series provides lectures of importance and interest to the entire community about this ever-changing world, sponsored by Lafayette-Orinda Presbyterian Church.

The programs are offered at 1:30 p.m. on the first Friday of the month. For January through May, they are available simultaneously on the Lafayette campus and virtually on Livestream. The June program is only available on Zoom.

January 5: Joe Whitehouse, world traveler and photographer, on "Iraq: Cradle of Civilization." Dr. Whitehouse's travel presentations are beautifully done and very popular at LOPC. He has pictures of Shi'a and Christian historical sites, modern Kurdistan, and the Yazidis, who were viciously attacked by ISIS in 2014.


**February 2:** Adam Hochschild, author and lecturer in journalism at UCB, "Post WWI Challenges to American Democracy." Prof. Hochschild paints a vivid picture of the repression and vigilantism that took over America in the four years following the country's entry into WWI. The U.S. government targeted anti-war advocates, passing new laws, including the Espionage Act of 1917, that were used to crack down on minorities, immigrants, socialists, and labor union members.

**March 1:** Carolyn Chen, professor of Ethnic Studies at UCB, "Work, Pray, Code: When Work Becomes Religion in Silicon Valley." Prof. Chen explores how tech companies are bringing religion into the workplace in ways that are replacing traditional places of worship, blurring the line between work and religion as well as transforming the very nature of spiritual experience in modern life.

**April 5:** William Jagust, professor of Public Health and Neuroscience at UCB, "Untangling Alzheimer's." Dr. Jagust discusses the difference between dementia and Alzheimer's, the development of Alzheimer's in the brain, and the challenges in developing effective treatments.

**May 3:** Laura Beth Nielsen, professor of Sociology and director of the Center for Legal Studies at Northwestern University. "Northwestern University's Prison Education Program." Prof. Nielsen describes a path to a university education for maximum security prisoners. She says, "My students are amazing people living in squalid conditions, and they still do all their homework."

June 7: Gordon Chang, Oliver H. Palmer Professor in Humanities at Stanford University, "Forgotten, Even Ignored, the Chinese Who Built the Western Portion of the Transcontinental Railroad." Dr. Chang says, "They should be remembered and honored for their contributions; my talk will help restore their lives, work, and sacrifices to our history." His published research has focused on the relationship between race and ethnicity in America and its impact on U.S. and Asian diplomatic and cultural relations. *This program is available on Zoom only.*

#### **October Session Highlights**

Session met in person this month, and the opening Spiritual Formation by Elder Betty Graves fittingly spoke to the need for community and coming together. The horrors and tragedies of the Israel/Palestine conflict and the impact on our friends and neighbors locally were then discussed as matters of great community concern.

Adoption of the consent agenda included approval of a motion to apply a Foundation grant to replace obsolete video equipment in the sanctuary. Session also passed a motion to schedule the 2024 Annual meeting on February 11. Lastly, following discussion and a presentation by Foundation Trustees Jim Beckemeyer and Mike Ross, session approved changes to the LOPC Foundation bylaws on trustee terms and years of service and required qualifications. It was then approved to schedule a congregation meeting on November 19, 2023, to consider the election of three Foundation nominees.

Pastor Peter Whitelock outlined the annual process of adopting team ministry goals; and the other pastors each provided a summary of the goals adopted by their respective teams:

Pastor Jaime Polson highlighted those of Personnel (including review of staff compensation and housing), Seedlings, Children and Youth (all of which need more volunteers), and **Deacons** (building intergenerational and support groups.)

Pastor Lauren Gully reviewed the goals of Mission (responding to justice issues, working with other diverse churches, more direct service opportunities), Worship (welcoming more people back to in person worship, increasing diversity representation in worship/music), and Digital Outreach (externalizing extensive ministry content, activating YouTube Channel).

Pastor Chris Baldwin noted how all the ministry teams were working together, and then summarized the complementary goals of both Community Life and Spiritual Formation (retaining existing, and building new, large and small group ministries to engage new people; and creating opportunities for teams to serve together and to build pathways for taking the next step of faith.)

A report on the 2024 Generosity/ Stewardship pledge campaign, entitled "The Generous Heart," was presented by Elder Mark Weaver, highlighting the explanatory brochure mailed to members and emphasizing how necessary pledges are to session's development of the annual budget.

Under new business, Pastor Lauren noted LOPC's hosting of Winter Nights families the first two weeks of November, and Pastor Peter reminded session of Lauren's maternity leave starting December 11, when we will need interim assistance to fill in all that Lauren does for LOPC. The meeting then adjourned with prayer.

#### **Financial Update**

OPC is thankful for the many ways the congregation gives of their time, talent, treasures to LOPC! Consequently, the church is in a solid financial position as we approach the end of 2023.

For the 10 months ended October 31, contributions totaled \$2,854,612, ahead of the \$2,657,360 budget. Many components factored into that. While pledge giving was lower by \$44,841, we are optimistic for the full year. Non-pledge and loose offerings, and other income, were \$61,560 ahead of plan. LOPC was blessed by a total of \$138,328, from a member's gift of thanks and praise and an estate bequest. These gifts eliminated the need to draw \$93,210 from the session's reserve fund.

Mission and special gifts exceeded budget by \$106,243, contributing favorably to year-to-date congregational giving. Seedlings closed the 2022-2023 school year with an additional contribution to the church of \$23,541, resulting from higher summer tuition rates. LOPC had a \$15,332 reduction in memorial giving and campus user fees, offset by \$20,962 of investment income, which wasn't budgeted.

Most ministry teams operated at or below budget. Excluding spending for mission and special gifts, year-todate expenses totaled \$2,681,877, which was \$108,025 below budget. Much of this improvement stems from reduced spending for personnel, and children's ministry, offset by higher spending for utilities and repairs to the heating, air conditioning and ventilation systems.

Overall, we ended the 10 months with expenses exceeding contributions, resulting in a shortfall of \$12,579, instead of the expected \$211,283 deficit. LOPC is truly blessed to have strong support from the congregation and staff. All who have heeded requests to make timely pledge gifts are appreciated, helping the church align giving more closely with budget. Thank you!

#### **December Finance Giving Deadline for Tax Purposes**

f you plan to make a year-end gift, LOPC must receive your mailed donation (postmarked 12/30/2023) or in-person by on December 31, 2023. There can be no exceptions.

If you are making a stock gift, please notify our accountant, Farah Mohammadzai, (x229) with the type of stock it is, and how the gift should be applied. It must be in LOPC's brokerage account by December 30, 2023.

Please do not file your 2023 tax return until you receive your year-end

LOPC statements, with written acknowledgment of your gifts to LOPC, which will be mailed in January 2024. Thank you for your generous giving to LOPC!

#### Double Your Blessings

There are many ways to give of your time, talent, and treasure to LOPC. In the past few years, some of LOPC's seniors have found that federal income tax law changes provide an even more tax-efficient pathway for giving arising from Investment Retirement Accounts - IRAs.

Seniors may benefit more directly from federal tax law changes because qualified contribution deductions directly reduce adjusted gross income. This has allowed some seniors to increase their giving to LOPC because of new income tax benefits:

- Higher standard deductions available to all taxpayers increased concurrently with limitations on certain itemized deductions.
- New qualified contribution deductions are available to taxpayers who are required to take age-related distributions from their IRAs.

If you are a senior and interested in learning more, please confer with your tax advisor to learn if it is advantageous to fund your LOPC giving out of your required IRA distributions. Thank you for remembering LOPC in your end-of-year giving.
