#### **March Session Highlights**

Iders and pastors
gathered together
on March 19 in
the Oak Room.
After sharing my
own faith journey,
attendees shared
their joys and concerns,
and session proceeded to

approve our consent agenda.

Elder Royce Nicolaisen, one of 15 participants on the adult mission trip to Children of Faith Missions in India, reported that the trip enriched the lives of both the students and also those who attended. Pastor Peter Whitelock reported that our Director of Music, Bryan Dunnewald, has organized a special concert at LOPC on May 3 that will raise funds to purchase musical instruments for Children of Faith. The concert will feature a combined 16 Grammy awards among seven musicians, led by notables such as Tom Scott of Steely Dan and Tony Lindsay of Santana.

Peter noted that, on March 20, Elders Terry Clark and Chris Johnson would lead a group to the San Ramon Valley Islamic Center to participate in the breaking of a fast for Ramadan. Chris also reported that, on March 23, he and others would join an interfaith March for Peace in connection with the Israel/Palestine conflict.

Peter observed that the Rev. Dr. Anne Stewart's visit to LOPC was a success. The Executive Vice President of Princeton Seminary led a women's retreat on March 9 which was extremely well received. The next day, she preached to the congregation, met thereafter with children from Temple Isaiah who were in attendance to learn about the Christian faith, and then led a discussion on understanding God in the Old Testament.

Peter will be taking his sabbatical from April 17–June 13. In addition to his planned travels, he will be studying how the Book of Genesis relates to cosmological models, which he hopes to use in a sermon series in the fall.

During Peter's absence, Pastor Jaime Polson will serve as head of staff and Pastor Chris Baldwin will be moderator of session.

Jaime reported that team goals are in the process of being finalized, which will allow LOPC to plan its ministry for the upcoming program year, which runs from August 1, 2024 until July 30, 2025.

Jaime then shared with us that the Racial Equity and Engagement Team is planning ways to celebrate and lift up Asian Americans during the month of May. Church members will share their beautiful traditions, a speaker will be invited to discuss her life of faith as a second-generation Asian American Christian, and there are plans for a read-together of George Takei's graphic novel about his childhood in an internment camp during World War II.

At the conclusion of our meeting, elders voted for next year's Clerk of Session, which will be announced prior to next month's meeting.



This month, Thursday Fellowship will celebrate 45 years of service to seniors in the Lamorinda community. We are excited to acknowledge this milestone with a party and a catered lunch on May 9. Save the date!

Thursday Fellowship began in 1979 as a follow-up to the LOPC deacon's program "Friendly Callers." Many volunteers had been shopping for and visiting senior "shut ins" in the community. A special tea party at LOPC was held for this group in May of 1979. It was so appreciated and well attended that the volunteers decided to invite the Seniors for tea on a more regular basis. The "Drop-In Center" was started, and it met in the former Oak Room every other Thursday. It was an instant success, and volunteers helped with coffee, crafts, exercises, lunch, and entertainment. The program grew into a weekly program and moved to Fellowship Hall to accommodate the growing program. Crafts were made and sold at a Christmas bazaar to raise money to support the program until funding became more secure. The volunteers began meeting for



prayer and planning each Thursday morning, and this gathering grew into an important time of spiritual formation for the volunteers. The volunteers grew close as a group and their faith journey became an important part of the program as they ministered to others. This tradition continues as an important part of the volunteer's day. Years ago, an article about Thursday Fellowship in the *Contra Costa Times* called it the "best kept secret" in the area!

## A CHAT WITH MISS DAWN: INSIDE THE TULIPS CLASSROOM AT SEEDLINGS

At Seedlings Preschool, each teacher has a unique role in shaping our little ones' early- learning experiences. Among them is Miss Dawn, the nurturing force behind the Tulips class. With years of experience and a heartfelt approach to teaching, Miss Dawn plays a crucial part in our preschool's community. This month we explore Miss Dawn's background, her approach to teaching the Tulips class, and what makes her classroom a special place for our preschoolers.

**Kaylin:** How long have you been at Seedlings? Can you share a bit about your background before joining?

Miss Dawn: My journey with children began when I was 19, at a center in Oakland called the 24-Hour Children's Center, where I worked with 2-year-olds. After that, I moved to a before and after school program called City Kids in Tracy, and then to Kindercare in Livermore, where I worked with 3-year-olds. I took a hiatus to stay home with my daughter for five years. Upon

returning to the workforce, I found my home at Seedlings, where I've been for 12 years.

**Kaylin:** Tell us about the Tulips class. What makes this age group so special?

Miss Dawn: The Tulips class, with children ages 3 to 4, is a joy to work with. This age is all about emerging independence and self-discovery. We embrace this by allowing the children significant input in planning our activities and themes throughout the year, making each school year distinct and exciting. For instance, one class's fascination with bugs led us to construct a giant ant wall, while another's interest in space transformed our room into a cosmic exploration

Kaylin: What does a typical day or week look like in the Tulips class?

Miss Dawn: Our days are structured yet flexible, beginning with Circle Time for discussions on themes, Alphafriends, and announcements. This is followed by Free Choice, where children engage in various activities based on their interests. The remainder of the day includes lunch, outdoor play, and quiet time, providing a balanced mix of learning, play, and rest.

**Kaylin:** What aspects of Seedlings do you appreciate the most?

Miss Dawn: Seedlings' warm, caring, friendly, and welcoming environment is what I cherish the most. It's a place where both children and staff are nurtured and valued, making it a wonderful community to be a part of.

Kaylin: Can you share some of your favorite memories from Seedlings?

Miss Dawn: Attending the NAYCE conference in LA with my colleagues is a standout memory, marking the first off-site staff activity since my tenure began. Another precious memory was our teacher's day retreat in Napa. Despite my initial reservations due to not drinking alcohol, it turned out to be an exceptionally fun and bonding experience.

#### church nominating comittee (CNC)

#### Seeking New Church Leaders for terms beginning January 1, 2025!

One of the cornerstones of our Presbyterian heritage is the annual election by the congregation of church officers to provide leadership for the church. It is a privilege and responsibility to nominate members to serve as elected lay leaders. It is also necessary for us to participate in the essential process that will influence our church in the near future.

#### The primary qualifications for nominees are:

**Elders:** Elders, together with the pastors, lead and direct the ministry of the church. They are persons of faith, dedication, and good judgment. Elders serve on session, the governing body of the church. They also chair various church teams through which all ministries are conducted. Eight elders are ordained annually to serve three-year terms. At the time of producing this issue of FOCUS, the following teams need an elder assigned in 2025. CNC, Membership, Fellowship, Racial Equity/Engagement, Spiritual Formation, and Youth. Once the 2025 clerk of session is determined, there will be an additional team that will need an elder.

**Deacons,** as set forth in scripture, are leaders who serve as the caring, compassionate arm of the church. They provide loving support to all those in need within the church community. The primary area of deacon service is care of members. Deacons

serve a three-year term. Two deacons of high-school age serve a one-year term.


**Foundation Trustees** serve on the LOPC Foundation. This nine-member foundation receives gifts in various forms and designations, manages investments, and provides funding for LOPC needs that cannot be accommodated in the church's annual operating budget. Trustees serve an initial term of four years and are eligible to be re-elected for one three-year term. Members who have served in the past can be nominated for a two-year term.

The Congregation Nominating Committee (CNC) members are elected for a one-year term. Their duties include receiving and reviewing nominations for church officers and selecting candidates to present to the congregation.



#### **Financial Update**

The church closed the first quarter of 2024 with pledge income of \$726,625 which is ahead of budget by \$103,625. Non-pledge and loose offering giving were lower than plan by \$21,575. Year-to-date March total contributions were \$850,166 as compared to the budget \$736,279. Part of this increase relates to higher mission giving for the Kapnek Trust and the Congo related to the successful 2023 Christmas special offerings.

Ministry Team spending of \$909,813 was less than budget by \$48,761,excluding additional mission and special gifts spending. No unusual items were noted in ministry expense.

Year-to-date March 2024 closed with net contributions of \$39,713 favorably exceeding the projected year-to-date budget shortfall by \$128,948. Thank you to those who have pledged and made their pledge contributions early in the year. LOPC is grateful the first quarter of the new year is off to a strong start. We encourage anyone who has not pledged to consider making a pledge so that we can plan and continue our great ministry. It is never too late to pledge!
