Associate Professor of American Christianity at Princeton Theological Seminary

Christmas in August

Sometimes, saying, "Thank You," doesn't seem enough. Two small words often don't fully reflect the impact of someone else's actions and generosity. In this case, the "Thank You" is from the JF Kapnek Trust (Kapnek) and countless young children in Zimbabwe for the 2023 LOPC Christmas offering. The offering raised nearly \$20,000 for Kapnek.

For years, Kapnek focused on the prevention of mother-to-child transmission of AIDS and the curbing of AIDS in the general public. This was done by creating their early childhood development programs (ECD, ages 0-8) to provide healthcare to children, helping them be more resistant to AIDS and other diseases.

Part of Kapnek's focus on children's health is their sponsorship of health check-ups for ECD-aged children periodically during the school year. Kapnek brings government nurses from cities into rural and remote areas for the children to receive health exams. Health records are created and maintained so their health can be monitored. At these rural health clinics, parents of children younger than preschool age are invited to have their children examined and, occasionally, with the parent's

permission, be immunized against common childhood diseases.

The LOPC Christmas offering was earmarked to help Kapnek launch a pilot program in the Mhondoro District, southeast of the capital city, Harare. When learning of LOPC's generosity, a former Kapnek board member generously matched the LOPC Christmas contribution, which provided approximately \$39,000 to help with this new program. The program creates and distributes health kits to 18 clinics serving 54 ECD centers in the Mhondoro Ngezi district. The kits will be used to treat common childhood illnesses that are identified during health checks, as well as treatment for minor accidents around the home (see targeted list below). Providing on-the-spot medical care should greatly improve outcomes for common childhood illnesses and accidents.

It is expected that of an estimated 12,000 children to be seen, roughly 1,000 children will benefit from 'on the spot' treatment for various ailments. An additional 200 children are expected to be referred to a district hospital for further treatment for health concerns identified during the health checks. In 5,000 caregivers with health education and awareness during the health assessments.

Progress reports will be conducted at the end of each school term detailing activities, achievements, lessons learned, and expenditures. It is expected that lessons from this pilot program will be used to expand the program to other JF Kapnek Trust supported districts of Zvimba and Chegutu.

Blessings to all who help make this happen.

There are so many epic stories in the Bible: David vs. Goliath, baby Moses floating down the river in a basket, Jonah being swallowed by the whale, Joseph's coat of many colors, and more. This fall, Children's Ministry launches a new creative arts and tech program called **PLAY on Wednesdays!** Kids in K–4th will have the opportunity to engage with these stories and experience them in a whole new way. Each week, our Co-Director of Children's Ministry, Emily Austin, will use her theater background to introduce new ways of storytelling: stop-motion animation, shadow and hand puppetry, improvisation and tableaux, sound scape, prop and costume design, etc. We will read various accounts of Bible stories and picture books to learn the plot of the week and then break into

small groups to take on the role of actor, designer, or playwright! Our young creatives will then get to work, telling the story in their own words and expressing their ideas of what these stories might mean in today's world.

It has been such a huge blessing and privilege to be involved in the lives of the youth, families, and whole community as the director of Youth Ministries through that time. The memories we have cultivated together have enriched, nourished, challenged, and inspired me. I am so fortunate to have grown and served here in the ways I have.

Throughout my life, I have always tried to trust my intuition and listen for how God is moving in my life. Our youth, our future...

Does God care about the mental health of our youth? Yes, of course, He does. God only wants good things for our children. He invites us to *"cast all anxiety on him, because he cares for us."* 1 Peter 5:7. Anxiety? Has parenting ever been more challenging than it is right now? Hard to say for sure, but parents are dealing with a

whole new world of external influences that are

readily available. Think about how social media influences our youth. The social media personalities, called "influencers," make money influencing our children—for better, or for worse? While it is a great blessing to live in a community such as ours, along with it comes the pressure our children often feel to be successful in a success-oriented community.

For many years LOPC has partnered with an organization called Challenge Success to work with parents (and grandparents) in our community to help them prepare their children for the variety of opportunities and challenges they will encounter in school and beyond. LOPC member, Courtney Anderson, has played a key role in bringing Challenge Success into our church community, the local schools, and community at large. The organization seeks to improve well-being, engagement, and belonging for our children in school and in life. LOPC has introduced Challenge Success starting with Seedlings, followed by grades K–12. Part of the "challenge" is

spiritual formation

to broaden the definition of success. The narrow definition of success (best student, best athlete, most popular) can often lead to disappointment, anxiety, depression, or other mental health disorders. On top of that, there is the pressure associated with getting into a top college! By broadening the definition of success, all of our children find their own measure of success and happiness in whatever they pursue.

If your child is struggling with any of these challenges, please know you are not alone, and we invite you to join us as a faith community to discuss and share ways we can better support our youth. Challenge Success is on the LOPC campus throughout the year working with parents of children of all ages. On September 18, there will be a program for high school parents and on September 24 a program for middle school parents. You can learn about the Ten School-Year Resolutions for Parents. My favorite is #9: I will honor the importance of PDF (play time, down time, and family time). Kids need time to play, daydream, and just hang out.

LOPC provides financial support for Challenge Success by way of the Family Ministry budget, the Deacon Community Care Fund, and the generosity of our members.

LOPC member Graham Wiseman has dedicated almost two decades of his life raising awareness about mental health and fostering well-being among students in our local community, and beyond. We will have a look at Graham's work in the February 2025 issue of *Focus*.

Jaime Polson, Pastor of Care and Executive Leadership, oversees LOPC's engagement in these varied programs that support and nurture both parents and our youth. Jaime is also available as a resource to parents who want a trusted and safe avenue to talk about the challenges facing their children.

HOME VISITS

Deacons arrange and participate in visits to members who are homebound, hospitalized, or in various types of care facilities.

HOME COMMUNION

Upon request, home communion kits are available to members not able to attend worship services in person.

MEAL DELIVERY

Deacons order and deliver food to persons recuperating from illness, those recently discharged from the hospital, new parents, grieving families, or anyone who might need a meal in a time of crisis.

Stephen Ministry Training

Stephen Ministers are lay congregation members trained to provide confidential, one-to-one care to those experiencing a difficult time in life, such as grief, divorce, job loss, illness, family member estrangement, or relocation. Stephen Ministers come from all walks of life, but they all share a passion for bringing Christ's love and care to people during a time of need.

LOPC's Stephen Leaders, together with those from neighboring churches, will be conducting the required 50-hours of training for Stephen Minister candidates, from September 14, 2024, through January 2025. Classes will be held Tuesday evenings via Zoom and in-person on a few Saturdays, with long holiday breaks.

Financial Update

OPC is off to a solid start for the first half of 2024. Year-to-date total giving was \$92,198 improved from budget. Several factors related to the stronger giving: \$74,568 of unbudgeted member gifts of thanks, \$24,958 in higher special gifts and offerings, \$9,632 in higher pledge giving, offset by a \$48,658 in lower giving for non-pledge giving and loose offerings. 2024 investment income is higher than budget, which is a nice upside for 2024.

Ministry Team spending of \$1,776,548 was less than budget by \$33,052,

OPC's May Session meeting

was held on May 28, one week later than normal as a result of LOPC hosting the San Francisco Presbytery meeting on May 21. With

Pastor Peter Whitelock on sabbatical, Pastor Chris Baldwin moderated the meeting; Pastor Jaime Polson has served as Head of Staff while Peter has been away.

After Elder Jeff Eyet shared his faith journey, Clerk of Session Mark Weaver reported that LOPC pastors, staff, and congregation made the Presbytery meeting a success. The church campus was used for meetings, a full worship service, dinner, and the Presbytery meeting itself. Pastor Chris Baldwin, who leads the Personnel Working Group for the Presbytery, successfully shepherded two motions related to the recent departures of the three-person team serving jointly as Executive Presbytery, as the Presbytery seeks to hire a single Executive on a going-forward basis. Elizabeth Ball, LOPC Administrative Manager was honored by Leticia Williams, the stated clerk of the Presbytery, for organizing what was the first in-person meeting for the Presbytery in nearly five years.

As part of her operations update, Pastor Jaime Polson shared metrics regarding changes to participation in our youth and children's ministry programs as we have come out of the pandemic. Jaime then informed us that LOPC Treasurer, Staci Johnston, who has provided invaluable leadership with respect to our church's finances during and following the pandemic, intends to retire early next year. We are grateful that Staci has provided ample notice, which will allow for a seamless transition as her replacement is hired and trained.

Elder Jeff Patton, who leads the Church Nominating Committee, reported that his team's work is nearly complete. His team has had great success filling the slate of nominees for leadership positions beginning January 1, 2025.

Jim Beckemeyer and Linda Rosenthal, Foundation Trustees, shared an informative presentation with Session that highlighted the Foundation's vision, mission, giving, and growth. They emphasized that the LOPC Foundation is a faith operation that acts in trust, serves in faith, and builds relationships.

Finally, in executive session, it was approved to provide funding to enable our temporary pastor Jane MacKenzie, to remain in her current position through year-end.

June's session meeting was held at Elder Andrea Hilsabeck's home and included a delicious al fresco dinner and some time for elders and pastors to connect with one another. It was a lovely evening and a perfect setting to welcome back Pastor Peter Whitelock following his eight-week sabbatical. During Spiritual Formation, Elder Royce Nicolaisen shared a heartfelt testimony of his faith and the importance of giving back to both our local and global communities.

Session approved one motion, to call a meeting of the congregation on September 29 to approve the Congregation Nominating Committee's (CNC) slate of nominees for leadership positions (elder, deacon, CNC, foundation) with terms beginning January 1, 2025.

During the meeting, Peter Whitelock shared some highlights of his sabbatical, one of which was travelling to Spain to walk the Camino de Santiago.

Jaime Polson discussed the ministry team goal planning process which will wrap up in August for the upcoming program year. She also reported on personnel matters such as current staff transitions with the open Treasurer and Youth Ministry positions, staff performance review process, and the state law mandating staff training/ policies for de-escalation and workplace violence. This important training will take place for staff in August. Jaime concluded her report with an update on Kurth Memorial Garden construction and the new roof on the Ministry Center.

Lastly, Elder Jeff Patton, chair of CNC, presented an update on the slate of elder, deacon, CNC, and Foundation nominees which will be presented to the congregation in September.


