Fotokids

Ancy McGirr, founder of Fotokids, began her journey as a Reuters photographer in Guatemala and was compelled to help children living in the Guatemala dump dream of a brighter future. She started Fotokids as a means of using photography, graphic design, and media technology as tools for self-expression and ultimately a way to rise up out of poverty. Fotokids is so thankful for LOPC's 33 years of support working together to empower children from vulnerable communities through photography, design, and the latest in media technology. Families in both Guatemala City and Santiago Atitlán are facing huge challenges, but their struggles look different. In the city, people are crammed into tiny spaces, dealing with rising food costs, unstable jobs, and gang violence that makes even going to school

dangerous. In rural Santiago Atitlán, many homes lack reliable water, electricity, or sanitation. Families there rely on seasonal farming and traditional crafts like beadwork and embroidery, but income is scarce and unpredictable. Despite all this, parents everywhere are deeply committed to their kids' education, seeing it as the key to a better future. Fotokids works with these families, offering creative and vocational training that gives kids the skills and hope they need to overcome obstacles and aim for a brighter future. This year, we're excited to welcome 85 new students, each one ready to unlock their potential and creativity. But we need your support to make this happen! Your help doesn't just teach skills, it opens doors, builds confidence, and transforms lives. Thank you for your continued support in changing lives and capturing dreams.

Children of Faith

hildren of Faith Missions (COF) provides a secure home → and valuable education to 120 vulnerable school-aged children in Visakhapatnam, India. Many of the children served by Children of Faith come from broken homes and are at risk of living on the street. Most are orphans or semiorphans (meaning they have just one parent) and were in the care of extended family prior to being welcomed at COF. Shelter, nutrition, healthcare, and education are the primary services of COF, all of which are offered in a loving Christian environment. The program was founded by Rosie and Anand Thandu in 2004, who felt God calling them to return to their home country and help children. This past winter, 15 adults from LOPC visited COF, the first visitors from LOPC since the pandemic. Among these visitors was Carrie Wiseman, a retired elementary school teacher. Carrie led the team in several classroom projects that augmented the student's curriculum. This included science projects, writing, and reading. Carrie observed how well the children

work together and care for each other, and they appreciate the opportunity to learn. Graduated children have gone onto careers in nursing, engineering, operating their own small businesses, and more. Carrie said, "They wouldn't have the opportunities for successful careers that lift them out of poverty if not for Children of Faith." COF couldn't continue to transform the lives of young people in India without the generous support of donors like LOPC.

Our goal this Christmas season is to raise \$20,000 to support children's education in both of these organizations! Thank you so much in advance for your generosity!

First Friday Forum Begins in January Put these Dates on Your 2025 Calendar

The First Friday Forum speaker series provides lectures of importance and interest to the entire community about this ever-changing world sponsored by Lafayette-Orinda Presbyterian Church.

January 3: John Haveman, economist, consultant, author, and media commentator, will present on "The Economics of Migration." Haveman will shed light on several aspects of immigration that tend to overwhelm the narrative such as crime, government support programs, and jobs and will raise other issues that ought to be contemplated when

developing appropriate immigration policy.

February 7: Thomas Boyce, Professor Emeritus of Pediatrics and Psychiatry at UCSF, will speak on "Unlocking the Science of Sensitive Kids: Why Some Children Struggle and How All Kids Can Thrive." Boyce will discuss his research as a developmental pediatrician working with children living in difficult situations. Some can thrive anywhere,

while others have special sensitivities and strengths and need to be nurtured and taught in special ways.

March 7: Robert Todd, innovator, tech executive, and lecturer, will present on "The Dawn of the Artificial Intelligence Age." Todd has built innovative teams and products at McKinsey & Co, LinkedIn, and San Francisco State University. He has taught a very popular AI course with Berkeley Osher Lifelong Learning Institute.

April 4: Betty Ann Hagenau, director and founder of Freedom Insight will speak on "The Story of Human Trafficking in the Bay Area." Hagenau, who spent 18 months interviewing former human traffickers, will discuss the suffering, challenges, and successes in addressing this important local tragedy.

May 2: Craig Clements, professor in the Wildfire Interdisciplinary Research Center SJSU will present on "What You Need to Know about Wildfires." Clements initiated the fire research center in 2007. His insights on the structure of a wildfire help explain how wildfires become so powerful that they

create their own weather.

June 6: Danny Wan, Port of Oakland executive director, will speak on "Port of Oakland: Leading Innovative Climate Change and Air Quality Initiatives." The Port of Oakland generates vital economic activity, community benefits, and environmental innovation. The Port oversees San Francisco

Bay Oakland International Airport, the Oakland Seaport, and nearly 20 miles of waterfront.



If you are making a stock gift, please notify our accountant, Farah Mohammadzai at farah@lopc.org with the type of stock and how the gift should be applied. The stock must be received in LOPC's brokerage account by 12/31/2024.

Please do not file your 2024 tax return until you receive your year-end LOPC statements, with written acknowledgment of your gifts to LOPC, which will be made in January 2025. Thank you for your generous giving to LOPC!

October Session Highlights

After Cati Dole
opened the
meeting by sharing
her faith journey,
Session approved
the consent agenda
which included
several motions from

our Finance Team. Of particular importance, session approved (1) additional personnel costs related to the hiring of a new Treasurer, Suzanne Ferraro, and (2) a request to receive a \$200,000 grant from the LOPC Foundation to fund the previously approved Kurth Memorial Garden refurbishment and expansion project.

In his report, Clerk of Session Mark Weaver highlighted key upcoming dates, including the Leadership Retreat for Elders, Deacons and Foundation Trustees in February 2025. Pastor Peter Whitelock explained that the retreat will focus on strategic planning and will highlight what we are doing well as a church and determine how to build upon those strengths.

Peter then reported the results of our worship questionnaire, which

received a high number of responses (300+) and had participation across all generations. After reviewing the survey results, discussing with ministry teams, and evaluating budget considerations, session decided not to add a second service at this time, but that there will be continued conversation in the future.

Pastor Lauren Gully then provided a report on Mission. As a church, we engage in three types of mission: (1) direct service (e.g., love does), (2) financial support (e.g., special offerings); and (3) advocacy (e.g., Port Chicago, SB4). We have many mission partners (four of whom we raise up for planned special offerings each year). Lauren reported that although volunteerism has improved since the early years of the pandemic, the level of commitment is not at 2019 levels. The number of people in their 50s and 60s who previously were key service program participants (along with their children) has declined. To address this, Lauren, along with Chris Baldwin, developed "community groups" - i.e., larger groups of volunteers who can

be called upon to participate on an as-needed basis.

Next, Finance Elder Jim Nagle stated that ministry teams are working on their 2025 budgets, and that a proposed budget will be brought to session in December, with a request for approval in January. Generosity Team Elder Linus Eukel then provided an update on the Amazing Grace pledge campaign. We seek 100% member participation in giving so that we can fully fund to ministry plans for 2025. Linus urged elders to lead by example and submit their pledge cards right away.

Finally, during Executive Session elders were informed that Pastor Chris Baldwin and his wife, Carly, were in the process of a home purchase in Lafayette. This would not have been possible without the help of LOPC's Pastor Housing Fund, in which LOPC becomes a part-owner of a pastor's home and will ultimately recoup its investment (with appreciation) at the time of sale. This benefit attracts and keeps pastors at our church.

We closed with the Lord's Prayer.
