Lighthouse Service-Learning Program





session

November Session Highlights

The November session meeting was held on November 19. Elder Sally Roberts opened the meeting by sharing her faith journey with us, after which we approved the consent agenda.

Clerk of Session Mark Weaver began his report by acknowledging receipt of Elder Catie Dole's resignation effective as of

year-end. Catie shared that she and her family are moving to Houston because of a job change; we expressed our thanks for her service and will certainly miss her. This creates an elder opening on the Children's Ministry Team and, together with another opening on Spiritual Formation, the Church Nominating Committee will be hard at work to fill these spots in 2025.

During the meeting, elders cast their votes for the two at-large positions to serve on the 2025 Session Planning Council. Those elected will join 2025 Clerk of Session Chris Johnson, Pastor Peter Whitelock, and Finance Elder Jim Nagle.

Elder Bettie Graves and Pastor Chris Baldwin then updated session on the Presbytery meeting that was held online on November 12.

The annual Leadership Retreat (for elders, deacons and Foundation trustees) will be on February 1 and will focus on 12 Keys of an Effective Church. The next day, on February 2, we will have our annual congregational meeting immediately following the worship service in the sanctuary.

A discussion followed regarding the potential addition of a second service. Because we do not yet have the volunteer framework in place to staff a second service (particularly with respect to children), more discussion will take place in early 2025.

Finance Elder Jim Nagle then reported that we expect to finish 2024 with a balanced budget if the Faith Component goal of \$175,000 is met. We anticipate approving the 2025 budget at the session meeting on January 21.

Generosity Elder Linus Eukel reported that the pledge campaign is off to a good start. The Generosity Team will continue to send out reminders in early 2025 so that we can meet our goal of \$2.5M. Peter shared statistics on our giving trends that were compiled on a complimentary basis by the Presbyterian Church Foundation.

We closed the meeting with the Lord's Prayer.

Economist Jon Haveman Addresses the Economics of Immigration

Friday, January 3 at 1:30 p.m.

ith the new administration promising to deport illegal immigrants, you may wonder about the economic and social implications of this. Economics has something to say about both. Attend this event for an opportunity to receive answers to your questions.

In his talk "The Economics of Immigration," Haveman will shed light on several aspects of immigration that tend to overwhelm the narrative, such as crime, government support programs, and jobs, and will raise other issues that ought to be contemplated when developing appropriate immigration policy.

Haveman is the executive director of the National Economic Education Delegation (NEED.) NEED unites the skills and knowledge of a vast network of professional economists to promote understanding of the economics of policy issues predominately through presentations to the public. Presentations are written by a team, reviewed by two wellknown economists with different perspectives on the subject, and distributed to all NEED participants for comments.

Prior to starting NEED, Haveman was a principal at Marin Economic Consulting, a founding principal at Beacon Economics, and the director of the Economy Program at the Public Policy Institute of California. He has been a senior economist with the President's Council of Economic Advisers, an economist with the Federal Trade Commission, and held a faculty position in the business school at Purdue University.

Haveman is an expert on economic policy issues and speaks regularly at events across California, including UC Berkeley's Osher Lifelong Learning Institute. He has a reputation for providing audiences with accessible economic information to better understand the issues of the day.

Haveman holds a Ph.D. and Master of Science in Economics from The University of Michigan and a Bachelor of Science in Economics from the University of Wisconsin.

LOPC Foundation Annual Repot

LOPC Foundation closed its September 30, 2024 fiscal year with \$13,884,000 of invested net assets (equity), after deducting \$177,200 of remaining commitments to LOPC in 2024. Legacy estate and other gifts in the amount of \$297,700 were received in the fiscal year September 30, 2024.

A 26% investment rate of return for the fiscal year was earned on the Foundation investments, made up of 14 diversified mutual funds and exchange traded funds. Environmental, social, and governance (ESG) focused funds are no less than 51% of the investments.

Foundation trustees appropriated \$435,000 for church ministries plus \$185,000 for facilities reserve-study project expenses and facilities capital expenses. The operating expense incurred by the LOPC Foundation were 0.5% of the net assets.

Net asset values of the Foundation's 11 funds and Facilities Reserve Account at September 30, 2024, after additions and disbursements to the church:

In fiscal year 2024, \$170,000 was set aside in the account.

Giving through Fellowship One


Each year, Finance needs approval from donors to continue credit card giving through Fellowship One's recurring payment option.
