Lenten Sermon Series

In Luke 8:9-10, we read that after Jesus offered the parable about the Sower, "Then his disciples asked him what this parable meant. He said, 'To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of God; but to others I speak in parables, so that 'looking they may not perceive, and listening they may not understand." But what sense does it make for Jesus to teach using parables for the purpose of concealing his message about the Kingdom of God? Perhaps Jesus was simply pointing out an obvious truth that some people heard his marvelous parables and received them, while others heard them and either couldn't or wouldn't let the deeper truth (mystery) penetrate. In this series we look at a few of the great parables of Jesus from Luke's gospel and ask two questions:

How can someone hear this parable in a way that allows them to miss what Jesus is trying to reveal about the Kingdom of God? How can another person understand this parable so that it reveals what Jesus is trying to teach about the Kingdom of God?





Addressing At-Risk Youth

Every Easter, LOPC has a tradition of raising funds for one or more mission partners. This year's Easter Special Offering is focused on supporting at-risk youth both locally and internationally.



Supporting Monument Crisis Center's Youth Programs

For over two decades, Monument Crisis Center (MCC) has been a lifeline for local children and families, providing essential services and resources to those most in need. MCC's Youth Programs offer a wide range of services aimed at supporting academic achievement, personal development, and emotional well-being for at-risk youth in our community.

Here's what your gift can do:

- \$25 covers a week's worth of milk for a family of 6; or a gas card to help parents transport students to MCC Summer Camp.
- \$50 provides healthy snacks for the After School Café for one week.
- \$75 buys a week's worth of food for a family of 4 (MCC helps feed an average of 320 families three days a week).
- \$150 helps purchase workbooks and supplies for adult English Language Learners.





Supporting Vulnerable Children in the Congo

In 2021, the Congo Presbyterian Church (CPC) shifted its ministry to focus on "vulnerable children" — those who have lost contact with their families and ended up on the streets. The church switched to a comprehensive congregation-based approach, placing vulnerable children in Presbyterian

foster homes where they attend school, while at the same time, congregational child protection committees work to reunite children with their families and promote their rights.

We need \$12,000 – \$20,000 to fund the remaining synod's transportation, training materials, food, and trainer fees. Here's an idea of what your gift can do!

Contribution amounts towards one synod-wide training include:

- \$5 for printed materials for one participant.
- \$20 for transportation or meals for one participant.
- \$55 for training one foster family.
- \$220 to train a 4-member child protection committee.
- \$500 for trainer fees for child protection volunteers or host families.
- \$1,000 for transportation of the training team.

We want to take a moment to extend a heartfelt thank you to everyone who participated in this year's *love does*! It was great to see so many people of all ages coming together to serve, both on-campus and off-site. Your energy and hard work made the day a success, and it's clear that, together, we were able to make a real difference in the lives of those we served. Here's a recap of some of the impactful work done during this year's event:

On-Campus Projects:

- Thousands of diapers were sorted and bagged for distribution to low-income mothers in need.
- 60 shopping carts were assembled for Monument Crisis Center, providing much-needed support for clients without vehicles or seniors who can no longer drive.
- Over 60 fleece blankets were made to offer comfort to children at Calico, an organization helping children who've experienced abuse.
- Boxes of donated clothes and household items were sorted for Youth Homes, in support of their thrift store.
- Hundreds of breakfast bags and toiletry kits were assembled for our unhoused neighbors through Trinity Center.

Off-Campus Projects:

- We worked at STAND! and Loaves and Fishes to deep clean and organize their kitchens.
- We volunteered at White Pony Express to sort and repackage donated food for redistribution.
- We partnered with Habitat for Humanity to work on the Esperanza Place development.

These are just a few highlights from the many incredible efforts that were made possible by your generosity. We couldn't have done it without you!

January/February Session Highlights

Cession met on January 21 and February 17, 2025.

- Notable motions that were approved at these meetings included:
- Approving the 2025 annual budget of \$3,811,027 to be presented to the congregation at the Annual Meeting on February 2.
- Scheduling 2025 special offerings to benefit LOPC mission partners presented by MIS.
- Receiving designated gifts for mission and youth ministry.
- Approving a second worship service on Sunday mornings at 8:30 a.m. in the chapel beginning March 9.
- Allowing communion to be served every Sunday at the new 8:30 a.m. chapel service beginning March 9.

2025 clerk of session, Chris Johnson, provided information regarding session's annual calendar of events (session meetings, congregational meetings,) annual session policy review, and presbytery meeting commitments.

The Rev. Peter Whitelock provided a report on the annual LOPC leadership retreat on February 1. Elders, deacons, Foundation trustees, and clergy attended this event during which the results from the congregational survey in January were reviewed and led to engaging discussion for future strategic planning. Increased worship attendance was discussed and plans for the new early morning chapel service were shared with elders.

Lynn Trowbridge, from the Kurth Memorial Garden board, shared information on KMG statistics, number of niches and plaques remaining/sold, account information, and details on the successful KMG expansion. Elders expressed gratitude to Lynn and the rest of the KMG board for their exceptional management of the garden.

finance

We are truly fortunate and thankful for everyone who gave their time, talent, and treasure to LOPC in 2024. Total Giving of \$4,229,854 exceeded the budgeted giving by \$484,778. Year end giving came in especially strong with the Faith Component of \$218,145 exceeding the budgeted goal of \$175,000. The total giving number also includes a special gift of \$175,000 that was designated for the Kurth Memorial Garden expansion.

Expenses in 2024 included \$3,544,581 for Ministry Operations and \$304,237 for Mission & Special Gifts. The expenses for 2024 also included a special disbursement of \$300,000 for investment in Pastor Housing. This investment is included as an asset on LOPC's balance sheet.

The Mission and Special Gifts were \$130,182 more than budgeted, and the funds were deployed for global and local organizations. The larger gifts went to Atfaluna School for Deaf, Congo Education, Zimbabwe, Ahli Arab Hospital, Habitat for Humanity, Monument Crisis Center, and Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano.


A Full-Circle Journey: From Preschool Student to Devoted Parent

Deacons order and deliver food to persons recuperating from illness, those recently discharged from the hospital, new moms, grieving families, or anyone who might need a meal in a time of crisis.

March 7: Joe Whitehouse Presents Stunning Photographs of Japan

On March 7, Dr. Joe Whitehouse, world traveler and photographer, will speak on "Japan – An Unmatched Wonder." Dr. Whitehouse's travel presentations are beautifully done and very popular at First Friday Forum. He will share photographs from

his multiple visits to Japan, his favorite country of the 158 he has visited. Whether you're drawn to its rich cultural heritage, stunning natural landscapes, or cutting-edge technology, Japan has something of interest for everyone.

One of the most compelling aspects of Japan is its rich history and culture. From ancient temples and shrines to traditional tea ceremonies and samurai heritage, or World War II history, Japan offers a glimpse into a fascinating past. Kyoto, the former imperial capital, is home to stunning temples like Kinkaku-ji (the Golden Pavilion) and the Fushimi Inari Shrine with its famous red torii gates. Meanwhile, photos of Tokyo showcase a modern twist on Japanese culture, blending historic sites with neon-lit skyscrapers and futuristic technology.

Another highlight of Japan is its breathtaking natural beauty. Whitehouse's pictures will include cherry blossoms in the spring, the hot springs, and Japan's diverse landscapes. He will speak of the 88 Shinto shrines on Shikoku Island and its famous 720-mile pilgrimage.

The presentation will also feature Okinawa, Japan's southernmost prefecture, which offers a distinct cultural heritage shaped by its historical role as the independent Ryukyu Kingdom. Here, he will explore a subtropical paradise where ancient customs persist among coral reefs and castle ruins.



April 4: Betty Ann Hagenau Reveals the Tragedy Human Trafficking

Betty Ann Hagenau, director and founder of Freedom Insight will speak on "The Story of Human Trafficking in the Bay Area." She will discuss the suffering, challenges, and successes in addressing this important local issue.

Hagenau has been a prominent leader and speaker in community-based strategies to fight human trafficking for over 18 years. Starting her career as a director at International Justice Mission after earning a Master's degree from Stanford University in International Policy Studies/Conflict, she spent 18 months interviewing former human traffickers in San Quentin Prison to better understand their lucrative business practices and to inform the development of Freedom Insight's current strategies and programs.

Freedom Insight, formerly known as the Bay Area Anti-Trafficking Coalition, was founded in 2011. It focuses on equipping frontline industries, such as airports, apartments, and hotels, with the knowledge and tools they need to intervene where victims are most vulnerable—in the places where they are forced to work, move, and sleep. Ivar Satero, SFO Airport Director, says, "Freedom Insight's Airport Initiative helped us equip over 1,000 employees to recognize and report signs of potential trafficking. We're sending a message to traffickers that SFO will not be complicit in their illegal business."
