Bear One Another's Burdens

As friends and family gathered for a memorial service I recently officiated, I was compelled to express my deep gratitude. This was gratitude not only for the individual whose life we were celebrating, but also for those who were seated in the sanctuary. You see,



every time, and I mean every time, I crossed over the threshold of this person's home in the final months of this person's life, someone from LOPC or a family member was already present.

Galatians 6:2 says, "Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ." The "law of Christ" is love. I see Christ's love expressed through so many of you as you carry each other's burdens; encourage or pray for one another; share a word of kindness, a meal, or an angel food cake; or simply sit in silence with those who are grieving or in the hospital.

In our recent congregational survey, we asked what our ministry focus areas should be over the next five years. Mental health is one of the priorities. There are many reasons for the rise in mental health issues, and loneliness is one of them. One antidote to loneliness is being in community with others who "see" us, are willing to listen to us, and love us no matter who we are. That is the promise of true Christian community.

I often ask people, "Who is your 3:00 a.m. friend?" In other words, do you have someone you can call in a crisis or can reach out to if you are going through a hard time? If you have someone like that, consider them to be protection against the despair of loneliness. If not, I encourage you, in what may feel like a leap of faith, to join one of the many groups here at LOPC or to reach out to one of our pastors.

May we all grow together in God's grace and love.





International Partner Update

At LOPC, our commitment to mission and service extends beyond our local community to international partnerships that impact lives across the globe. We work with a number of international mission partners who are making a real impact in communities around the world. The involvement of our members in these organizations is essential to the success of our efforts, and we are grateful for the dedication and generosity of those who actively serve all of our partners. Below is an overview of the international organizations we partner with and the work they do. For more information, visit lopc.org/serveglobal.





Congo

The Congo Mission team leads LOPC's support of the Presbyterian Church (USA) mission efforts in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). Collaborating with Congolese Presbyterian partners and the Congo Mission Network in the U.S., the team works to identify and address the critical needs of the community.

The Congo Mission's focus is on education and trauma healing, particularly for children who have experienced violence in their communities. Many schools in the DRC are run by faith-based organizations, and the team is committed to supporting the prioritized educational initiatives.

Taking a holistic approach, the team not only provides financial assistance but also organizes a weekly prayer call for the DRC, advocates with the U.S. government and the UN on key issues and supports the people of the DRC through persistent advocacy efforts. Recently, the team led a campaign for the congregation to contact our government to release funding for new malaria vaccines for Africa. In education, the team has helped build 10 schools through the Build Congo Schools initiative and continues to support teacher training, provide computers, and assist with transportation for educational personnel.

Through ongoing support and advocacy, LOPC's Congo Mission team is making a lasting difference in the lives of the people in the DRC.

Fotokids

Fotokids extends its heartfelt gratitude to LOPC for over 33 years of generous support and commitment, with special thanks for the more than \$30,000 raised during this Christmas season. These funds will be shared with Children of Faith Missions, furthering the impact of LOPC's dedication to global partnerships.

Fotokids empowers children from vulnerable communities in Guatemala City and Santiago Atitlán by teaching them photography, graphic design, and media technology. Through these creative arts, the program helps unlock the potential and imagination of each child, offering them new opportunities for the future.

Nancy McGirr, the founder of Fotokids, commented that they are extremely grateful for LOPC's contribution, especially as they have welcomed 85 new students this year, each one ready to unlock their potential and creativity.

Sony recently hosted workshops on portraiture, food product photography, and lighting – and the staff couldn't be more excited. A professional photographer is scheduled to visit before Easter week to teach a new technique, and in November, a group of five photographers will be leading additional workshops. Fotokids is staying busy with fresh additions to the curriculum, continuing to inspire and nurture the creativity of its students.

Thanks to LOPC's continued support, Fotokids is changing lives, capturing dreams, and empowering young people.



Children of Faith Missions

Founded in 2004 by Rosie and Anand Thandu in Visakhapatnam, India, Children of Faith (COF) provides life-changing care and education to 120 at-risk school-age children. Their curriculum, which includes both academics and the arts, prepares students for junior college and university studies, offering them the tools to build brighter futures.

LOPC has been a dedicated partner of COF for over 11 years, with several LOPC members serving on the COF US Board and many others directly supporting the mission through child sponsorships. In 2024, 15 volunteers from LOPC traveled to COF to teach subjects like writing, reading, sewing, and carpentry, and to lead daily devotional sessions with the children. This hands-on involvement strengthens the connection between LOPC and COF, bringing valuable skills and inspiration to the students. This past Christmas, LOPC held a special offering that raised funds to continue the transformative educational work at Children of Faith, ensuring that these children have the opportunities they need to succeed and thrive.

Through this long standing partnership, LOPC has made a significant impact in numerous ways, including funding the construction of a new dormitory, providing relief after a cyclone, purchasing land for future growth, and sending both youth and adult volunteers to support COF's programs.





Kapnek Trust USA

Founded in 1983 and currently headquartered in Lafayette, CA, the Kapnek Trust USA has been dedicated to serving Zimbabwe and transforming the lives of children and families in need. The Trust's mission is to change the trajectory of a child's future by improving family health, reducing child mortality, and addressing the transmission of HIV from mother to child.

Over the past three decades, LOPC members have had the opportunity to visit Zimbabwe, teaching in local schools and clinics, and fostering relationships with the community. Through these partnerships, the Kapnek Trust has been able to work alongside Zimbabwe's governing bodies to directly minister to families in need.

LOPC recently played a key role in launching a new initiative in partnership with the Kapnek Trust—distributing health kits to district nurses serving rural communities. These kits are a game-changer, allowing nurses to test, treat, and medicate patients directly in the field, significantly improving access to healthcare in rural areas. In addition to advancing health services, Kapnek continues its educational outreach, sponsoring fortified porridge to 22,000 children—ensuring they receive at least one nutritious meal daily. Please note the importance of LOPC's helping to launch the health kits and the increase in the number of children receiving the porridge daily. LOPC funds about 6,000, but Kapnek feed 22,000 daily. Obviously, the difference is funded by other sources.

LOPC's contributions have been vital in supporting these efforts, helping to provide food and health resources that make a significant impact on the lives of children and families in Zimbabwe.

Atfaluna

Founded in 1992 in Gaza, Atfaluna began as a school and clinic dedicated to serving the deaf community, providing both educational and vocational services. Over the years, Atfalna's reputation for innovation and care attracted students from all religions, including both Jewish and Palestinian children and their families.

LOPC first became involved with Atfaluna by supplying hearing aid batteries, and over time, our support grew. LOPC sponsored a room in the educational wing of the school, and many of our members have sponsored individual children, helping to ensure their access to education and vital services.

Sadly, the school has been destroyed by the Israeli military, and some leaders of Atfaluna have lost their lives. We pray for an immediate and permanent ceasefire, the immediate delivery of humanitarian aid, and for lasting peace and freedom for all who live in Palestine and Israel.

Additional Mission Gifts: What is better than four grandparents?

f you attended LOPC's annual meeting on February 2, you heard that LOPC finished 2024 in solid financial shape. With that understanding, session authorized \$40,000 from the Session Emerging Needs Fund to augment Mission in Society's (MIS) giving for 2025. After much consideration, MIS recommended donating \$20,000 to the Food Band of Contra Costa and Solano Counties; \$2,500 to each of the four Bay Area pantries in impoverished neighborhoods - all sponsored by Presbyterian Churches; and \$5,000 to PC(USA)'s Disaster Relief Fund to help victims of last year's Hurricane Helene.

Although LOPC's congregation has already donated over \$45,000 for general help to LA Fire victims, the remaining \$5,000 went to Monte Vista Grove (MVG) in Pasadena to help house families who lost their homes in the fires. MVG is a retirement community primarily for Presbyterian pastors. At the time of the fires there were a few vacant homes, and MVG residents spearheaded the decision to offer these vacant residences to fire victims who lost everything. The \$5,000 paid for necessities from beds and bedding to kitchen utensils and furniture. One of the new residents is a family with young children. Not only does this reduce the average age of the community, but the children are now surrounded by 100 adoptive grandparents!

Session Report - March and April

ession met on March 18 and April 15, 2025. Notable motions that were approved included:

Approve the purchase of a new refrigerator in LOPC's commercial kitchen, funded by Foundation grants.

- Approve capital project to replace CLC windows, funded by Foundation grants.
- Approve revisions to session policy #4 Spiritual Direction.
- Approve net proceeds of ticket sales for the May 9 Big Band concert be directed to Monument Crisis Center.

2025 Clerk of Session, Chris Johnson, provided information regarding session's annual calendar of events (session meetings, congregational meetings) and presbytery meeting commitments. The vote for 2026 Clerk of Session occurred and Linus Eukel accepted this important role.

Rev. Peter Whitelock provided an update on the new Sunday morning service in the Chapel which will run through early June. Discussion about adding a second service in the fall will occur at the May and June session meetings. Peter shared that the strategic planning team reviewed the results from the recent congregational surveys and work accomplished at the leadership retreat in February. A few task forces will be put together to further review and plan in the areas of a) community outreach to address mental health and loneliness, b) relational groups to provide community and connection, and c) programs for parent and family support. Peter reminded session that the CNC will begin their nomination season soon, and session approved two elder team changes. One of the two Care Ministry elder positions will become a Family Ministry elder role, and the Digital Outreach elder role will transition to an Interfaith Ministry elder position. Session was reminded that Pastor Lauren Gully will be on sabbatical from May 19 – July 23.

Lauren Gully provided a report on LOPC's Racial Equity and Engagement Team. She shared information on who serves on the team, how the team has been developing programming, and recent program offerings.

Jaime Polson provided a report on LOPC's Care Ministry, primarily focusing on the important work of the Deacons. Deacons meet monthly and provide loving care and support to our community by making home visits, serving communion, providing meals to people experiencing hardship, and planning and serving at memorial receptions.

Thursday Fellowship began in 1979 as a follow-up to the LOPC Deacon's program, "Friendly Callers." Many volunteers had been shopping for and visiting Senior "shut ins" in the community. A special tea party at LOPC was held for this group in May 1979. It was so appreciated and well-attended that the volunteers decided to invite the seniors for tea on a more regular basis. The "Drop-in Center" started, and they met in the old Oak Room every other Thursday. It was an instant success, and volunteers helped with coffee, crafts, exercises, lunch and entertainment. The program grew into a weekly offering and moved to Fellowship Hall to accommodate the growing numbers. Crafts were made and sold at a Christmas bazaar to raise money for the program until funding became more secure. Youth Alive!

Youth Alive, our Sunday morning youth Bible study for 5th – 8th graders, at 10:00 a.m. in CLC Room 201. Our last Youth Alive of the school year will be on May 25.

May Lesson Focus: Do Justice. The biblical command to "do justice" in Micah 6:8 (see also Hosea 12:6; Proverbs 21:15; Amos 5:24; Isaiah 30:18–19; and throughout Scripture) reminds us that righteousness in the world is never completed but always in progress and incumbent on us to pursue, create, and establish. It requires that we see injustice in our midst and in our own behaviors. It necessitates that we check our prejudice to understand victims of injustice. It requires that we speak up: to power, to our own communities, and to ourselves. And it demands that we actually do the work, changing systems and practices that prop up injustice. Through these four aspects, the pursuit of justice demands we keep moving forward as we embrace this work as a lifelong facet of our identity as Christians.



May 2: Craig Clements Explains the Science of Wildfires

All of us in California are concerned about the growing threat of wildfires. The danger was clear in 1991 when the Oakland firestorm, a devastating urban-wildland fire, caused an estimated \$1.5 billion in damage and destroyed over 3,300 homes. Again, last year we experienced the Pacific Palisades-Altadena fires which damaged over 12,000 homes and may cost over \$30B. Even if our homes are not

touched, many homeowners have seen huge increases in fire insurance premiums, if they can get insurance at all. We have also experienced days of wildfire smoke which has become the main source of air pollution and fine particles that can get into our lungs and enter the bloodstream.

Dr. Craig Clements will speak on "Improving Prediction of Extreme Wildfires and their Behavior" at the First Friday Forum June program. He will explain



Dr. Clements is a Professor of Meteorology at San Jose State University and the founder and director of the Fire Weather Research Laboratory. He leads research on fire weather, extreme fire behavior, fire-atmosphere interactions, and conducts wildland fire field experiments. He received his Ph.D. in Geophysics from the University of Houston, his M.S. in Meteorology from the University of Utah, and a B.S. degree in Geography from the University of Nevada, Reno. His research has been featured in *PBS NOVA*, *Rolling Stone*, *The New York Times, CNN*, and *Scientific American*.

June 6: Robert Todd Explains Artificial Intelligence and Its Implications

Is Artificial Intelligence hype or will it have a profound impact on our culture? Will my PC become an Al assistant that helps me to access knowledge and provides tools that improve my life? Robert Todd, Innovator, Tech Executive, and Lecturer, will answer these questions and more in his talk "The Dawn of the Artificial Intelligence Age".

In his talk Todd will introduce the history, concepts, vocabulary and current breakthroughs in Al. He will help us understand why Al is getting so much attention recently and why some people are concerned about the risks and others are excited about the great benefit to humanity,

Todd is an innovator and tech executive who now writes and teaches about AI and builds products and companies using AI technology. As a pioneer in online education at SFSU and as a digital learning luminary at DigitalThink, McKinsey & Co. consulting services, and LinkedIn, he developed an interest in AI. He splits his time between communicating the societal impact of AI and advising a portfolio of AI-powered edtech startups. Todd taught three classes on AI in 2024 with Berkeley Osher Lifelong Learning Institute and is currently teaching "Hands-On AI: Going Deeper."

WHAT ARE WE LOOKING FOR?

RULING ELDERS (three-year term)

Together with the pastors, ruling elders lead and direct the ministries of the church, and serve on Session, the governing body of the church. Ruling elders should be persons of faith, dedication and good judgment. Ruling elders also chair church teams through which all ministry is conducted.

DEACONS (three-year term)

Deacons are leaders who serve as the caring, compassionate arm of the church, providing loving support to our community. Deacons primarily serve in ministries of member care and involvement. Two youth, of high school age, will be selected to serve one-year terms.

Congregation Nominating Committee

The goal of the CNC is to keep a balance of talent and energy in leadership to continue to build on the amazing work being performed. Four members will be elected at-large from the congregation.

Foundation Trustees serve on the LOPC Foundation. This nine-member foundation receives gifts in various forms and designations, manages investments, and provides funding for LOPC needs that cannot be accommodated in the church's annual operating budget. Trustees serve an initial term of four years and are eligible to be reelected for one three-year term. Members who have served in the past can be nominated for a two-year term.

WHAT POSITIONS NEED TO BE FILLED?

- Elders to serve on one of the following teams: Care, Family, Finance, Generosity, Interfaith, Operations, Seniors, Spiritual Formation, Worship
- Ten Deacons
- Four CNC members
 - Three Foundation trustees

WHAT IS THE PROCESS?

April - May

Nomination forms are submitted to CNC.

May - July

CNC will email people who submitted a nomination to let them know their nomination was received. CNC will contact people who are being considered to let them know of their nomination and to provide additional information about what expectations are for the position. At that time nominees will let CNC know whether or not they would like to be considered.

Nominees are finalized by the CNC.
